Renew. Restore. Refresh - Strengthening the Mind, Body, and Spirit Connection. This was the focus of Sligo Church's recent women's retreat held at the Mount Aetna Camp and Retreat Center in Hagerstown, Maryland, on May 6, 2023. The keynote speaker, Ann Roda, Vice President of Adventist HealthCare, blessed us with her message on how to "Be Still" and experience the presence of God.

There were also breakout sessions focusing on renewing a personal relationship with God and attaining behavioral health and wellness. The presenters for the breakout sessions were Janet Salazar, a teacher and published author, Dr. Rhoda Gottfried Perez, a psychiatrist with Adventist HealthCare, and Dr. Samuel Perez, Department Chair of Biology and Chemistry at Washington Adventist University.

In addition, the women enjoyed a nature walk for prayer and spiritual renewal, a refreshing hour of creative canvas painting with Griselda Jobe, and the inspirational music ministry of a praise team with recording artist Denise Barclay. The goal of bringing the hope and restorative power of Christ was satisfied as some of the women who attended commented:

WOMEN IN MINISTRY STILL NEEDED

My mother tells me that when I was a child I would sit in the front pew at church and watch the pastor preach. I would be attentive and ask her questions, such as, why was the pastor yelling at us when he preached. I do not remember much of that scenario but I do remember watching Sister Cooper. She was composed and stood tall and confident. She would address the congregation in a manner that demanded attention and respect, and held our interest.

I also remember Sister Noverola, my Sabbath School teacher. She always had our full attention! She maintained order in her classroom and also made sure we had what we needed to succeed as her students. She ensured we had necessities such as our weekly lesson, a Bible, and even books with stories to help us grow. Recently I met Josephine Benton. In 1975 she was the first woman ordained as a local Seventh-day Adventist church elder. She also served as an Associate Pastor at Sligo Church. This is important to me because I too was the first woman ordained as a local elder at my home church and today I am the fourteenth female pastor to serve at Sligo.

Women need to continue being trailblazers, making a significant impact on the Christian Church and the world by continuing to support other women and mentoring them through Women's Ministries and many other ministries.

The Disability Action Team (DAT) is a vibrant ministry at Sligo! And we need you! Read on and I'll explain. About fourteen years ago, I was asked to chair a committee to promote awareness of the needs of persons with disabilities. I gladly agreed because I had experience with disability policy.

So, what does DAT do? The sole purpose of DAT is to enable persons with disabilities and their families to participate in the congregational life of Sligo. Examples of past DAT accomplishments include:

- Sensitivity training of Sligo's Youth to explain some of the problems faced by persons with disabilities.
- Providing input into the renovations of the Greenwood Entrance to make it more accessible.
- Assuring that those with hearing disabilities have access to assistive technology so that they can hear the worship service.
- Sponsoring Disability Sabbath annually to highlight the needs and contributions of persons with disabilities within our faith community.

Recently, DAT members took part in a Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats training. SWOT allows an organization—even this little ministry we call DAT—to take a step back and think about what your purpose is and how you plan to realize your objectives.

While DAT is still mulling over the results, guess what the number one goal of the SWOT was? Team building so that we attract new DAT members! And that's where YOU come in. I can hear what you're thinking. (I'd love to help with DAT. But I know nothing about disability. Where on earth would I begin?) Yet, remember last year when you hurt your ankle and used crutches for six weeks? And didn't you help your aunt get to some appointments because her glaucoma means that she can no longer drive? And the little boy who lives next door who has Downs Syndrome who sometimes plays with your kids in the afternoon. The truth is that we are ALL impacted by disability—either personally or by association. Aging, of course, teaches its own lessons in disability policy!

Let me leave you with this fun fact: when we meet in person, DAT provides free pizza! Plus, we're a fun group to get to know.

Sligo's Prison Ministry team conducts Sabbath Worship Services inside the facilities. Bible Studies are offered during the week to inmates and their families. And this ministry also serves in other ways, such as counseling, mentoring, and letter writing.

New Beginning also partners with other organizations, such as Angel Tree through Prison Fellowship. This ministry offers opportunity to pray for inmates, re-entry individuals and their families through Prayer Warriors.

NAD CONFIRMS ITS FIRST WOMAN TREASURER, JUDY R. GLASS

On June 29, 2023, the Seventh Day Adventist (SDA) Church's General Conference (GC) executive committee confirmed Judy R. Glass as the treasurer for the North American Division (NAD). Glass is the first woman to serve in that capacity. She had served as NAD's under-treasurer since November 2019. In that role, she helped manage the division's budget and oversaw the day-to-day operations of the NAD treasury and its staff. Previously, Glass served as the chief financial officer of AdventSource, leading the ministry to pay off its debt and build a building, among many other accomplishments.



Glass received her Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from Union College in Lincoln, Nebraska in 1991. In 2008, Glass earned her Master of Business Administration degree from Columbia Union College (now Washington Adventist University) in Takoma Park, Maryland.

We congratulate Judy and we all are praying that God will bless her and guide her as she takes on the leadership role of treasurer.

WOMEN OF THE BIBLE



ONE FEARLESS PRINCESS

Many know of good king Joash, king of Judah, but do you know of the brave princess Jehosheba who saved his life?

It was a time of violence and political unrest in Judah. Families were fighting, the northern and southern kingdoms were at odds, and wickedness was all around. Israel, which was united during Solomon's reign, had split into Israel in the north and Judah in the south. Neither nation followed God.

After Jehoram, king of Judah, died, his son Ahaziah reigned for one year and then was killed. At his death, Athaliah, Jehoram's wife, took control as ruler and killed anyone with a royal claim.

However, princess Jehosheba, a daughter of Jehoram, also decided to take control, but in another way. Without regard for her own safety, Jehosheba snatched Joash, the baby son of Ahaziah, who should have been king, and hid him for six years in the temple.

When Joash was seven years old, Jehosheba and her husband, the priest Jehoida, made a plan to install Joash as king and destroy the evil queen Athaliah. Thus Joash, rightful heir to the throne, became king because of the bravery of Jehosheba. Seeing a crisis, she rose to the occasion. Courageous princess Jehosheba saved the life of Joash and thus preserved the line of David. (Read the entire story in 2 Kings 11 and 2 Chronicles 22.)
