### The Three Wonderful Women

## Anna, Local Missionary Nurse

**Anna Virginia (Hafenmayre) Hadley**, nurse, medical missionary, and Director of Nurses, served underprivileged patients in Washington, D.C. for over 60 years.

Born in Virginia in 1894, Anna was one of the first graduates of Shenandoah Valley Academy in New Market, Virginia. She began nurse's training at the Washington Sanitarium (now Washington Adventist Hospital) and met Henry Hadley while he was studying medicine at George Washington University Medical School. In 1917, after she had completed her nursing course, they married, and two years later she joined him in his work at Washington Sanitarium Mission Hospital, known as "the clinic," which opened in 1914 at 1252 Sixth Street SW. Nurse Hadley served as Director of Nursing at the clinic, which served the city's neediest citizens. She also trained postgraduate nurses and foreign missionary appointees.

### The 1923 Purchase

Anna and her husband purchased the clinic in 1923, operating it as a self-supporting institution. They made additions to its facilities, increased its services, and in 1930 donated it to the General Conference.

### Building a Hospital

She and her husband and two young sons lived on the top floor of the clinic despite the dangers in that area. Her husband was mugged, the boys had to play inside, and many times Anna cared for the wounded alone. When her husband decided to build a hospital in , D.C. on Nichols Avenue SW, she supported him. Dedicated as Hadley Memorial Hospital in 1955, it became a thriving medical institution and was transferred to the Columbia Union Conference in 1957.

### Off to California

Anna and her husband moved to Loma Linda, California, in 1981 to be near their sons. While there, her husband died in 1983. Three years later, Anna, age 92, returned to , D.C. for the grand opening of a newly renovated and expanded Hadley Memorial Hospital. There, Anna unveiled a bronze bust of her husband. In 1993, Anna passed away at age 98 and was buried next to her husband in Colton, California. Anna Hadley was a true local missionary, a woman who demonstrated Christ's healing ministry right here in this area.
