## **Medications Commonly Used for PPCM Treatment**

Medications Commonly Used for PPCM Treatment				
Medication Name	Purpose	Notes & Considerations		
Beta-Blockers (e.g., Carvedilol, Metoprolol)	Reduces heart rate and blood pressure, improving heart function	Some may not be safe for breastfeeding; consult a doctor		
ACE Inhibitors (e.g., Lisinopril, Enalapril)	Lowers blood pressure and reduces heart strain	Not safe during pregnancy; alternative needed if breastfeeding		
ARB (Angiotensin Receptor Blockers) (e.g., Losartan, Valsartan)	Used if ACE inhibitors are not tolerated	Generally not recommended during pregnancy		
<b>Diuretics</b> (e.g., Furosemide, Spironolactone)	Helps remove excess fluid and reduce heart workload	Electrolyte levels should be monitored		
Aldosterone Antagonists (e.g., Spironolactone, Eplerenone)	Reduces fluid retention and improves heart function	Spironolactone not recommended during pregnancy		
Anticoagulants (e.g., Warfarin, Heparin)	Prevents blood clots in cases of severe heart failure	Warfarin requires close monitoring, especially postpartum		
Ivabradine	Reduces heart rate in patients who cannot tolerate beta-blockers	Requires specific heart rate conditions		
Bromocriptine	May help with heart	Needs to be closely		



## **Additional Treatment Options**

Treatment	Purpose	Notes
Implantable Cardioverter Defibrillator (ICD)	Helps prevent sudden cardiac arrest in severe cases	Recommended if ejection fraction (EF) remains low
Cardiac Resynchronization Therapy (CRT)	Improves heart efficiency and function	Used when electrical activity in the heart is abnormal
Left Ventricular Assist Device (LVAD)	Supports heart function in advanced heart failure	Considered for patients awaiting heart transplant
Heart Transplant	Final option for severe, unresponsive cases	Requires extensive evaluation and matching
