Known affectionately as the Bard of Ayrshire, Burns penned iconic works like Auld Lang Syne and Tam o' Shanter, capturing the heart and soul of Scottish culture. Burns Night is a celebration of his life, his poetry, and the enduring heritage of Scotland." (The History and Modern Celebration of Burns Night: A Timeless Scottish Tradition)

Every year, The Ingersoll Pipe Band and all their guests celebrate Robbie Burns' life with a delicious meal, fantastic entertainment, the sounds of pipes and drums, and of course, multiple toasts to Robbie! An excerpt from Burns' poem 'Tam O'Shanter', this quotation gives its readers a much-needed reminder that happiness is contagious. When you "seize the flower" of happiness you shed the seeds onto the ground, giving them the opportunity to bloom and grow. If you embrace the happy times when they come, this can be infectious, and spread to those around you. Although no year is perfect, 2025 could be the year in which you welcome the best pleasures in life and offer them generously to your loved ones.



"We'll take a cup o'kindness yet, For auld lang syne."

The most famous work by Robert Burns is of course 'Auld Lang Syne', typically sung as the clock strikes midnight and welcomes in a new year. The Scottish phrase "auld lang syne" directly translates to "old long since", and is used to describe a feeling of nostalgia for the times that have already passed.

This timeless quotation could remind us to keep kindness at the centre of our lives as the years go by. When you encounter hard times in this coming year and beyond, keep a "cup o' kindness" in your heart and you are bound to gain peace of mind on any situation you face.



Robert Burns' shortest poem is titled "The Selkirk Grace". "The Selkirk Grace" is a four-line poem that is now used as a prayer before meals. Specifically, the poem is used as a prayer before meals during the holiday which celebrates Burns' life, known as Burns Supper.

In connection with the poet's visit to the seat of the Earl of Selkirk, it is stated by Cunningham, that at one of the meals there, Burns was asked to say Grace, and he delivered what is usually styled 'The Selkirk Grace'.

Kraft Hockeyville is an annual competition sponsored by Kraft Heinz, the National Hockey League and the NHL Players' Association in which communities compete to demonstrate their commitment to the sport of ice hockey. The winning community gets a cash prize dedicated to upgrading their local home arena, as well as the opportunity to host an NHL preseason game. Runners-up also get smaller cash prizes to upgrade their ice rinks. The contest is normally held in the winter and spring during the latter half of the NHL regular season while the winner is announced in late March or April, with the pre-season game usually held in September before the following regular season. The winner receives \$250,000 for arena upgrades and the chance to host an NHL preseason game. Runners-up get \$25,000 and new hockey equipment.

This year the Ingersoll District Minor Hockey Association decided to enter the contest. The organization was looking for lots of community support. It used all of its social media and local contacts to drum up support for its bid.

Tremblett's Independent Grocer, Ingersoll Raila' House of Brews, The Kiwanis Club, Studio 73 Digital Media, and other groups and businesses joined minor hockey parents and families to promote the Ingersoll bid.

There was really quite a complicated formula to earn support for your home town group and arena. The Ingersoll Pipe Band decided to join in by supporting our local hockey organizers.

We put out a request to members and learners to wear a hockey jersey/sweater of one's own choice to

practice on Thursday February 27th. If you didn't own a jersey then no problem.

Our bass drummer, Doug Turvey, has a large collection at home and brought several to share. Other members like drummer, Tammi Minogue, has a spouse, Larry, who has several (his favourite being the local London Knights) and she brought in extra to practice. And finally, piper Don Gale, who sponsored multiple hockey teams in Belmont when he was operating a business there, brought in a whole team full of jerseys. 
