"I was at the Remembrance Day at the Cenotaph in London with the London Police Pipes and Drums. In the attached video you can see the London Police Pipes and Drums leading the Parade. I am in the last row furthest from the camera.

It is very meaningful to me to be at the Cenotaph in London on November 11th. Both my Grandfathers were in the first World War. One was in the Royal Artillery. The other lied about his age when he was 14 and jointed at the Armouries in London. My Father and my Uncle, who was killed and I never met, were in the second World War and signed up in London. Catherine's Son and my Step-Son is a serving member in the Armed Forces. "





Springfield Santa Claus parade synopsis – "A little foggy on the way there but no rain, no snow, no wind, sleet or hail! Best Springfield Parade weather ever! 12 pipers piping and 6 drummers drumming!"

The History of Springfield - Malahide is a municipal township in Elgin County in Southwestern Ontario, Canada. Malahide Township was named for Malahide Castle in Malahide, Ireland, birthplace of land grant administrator Colonel Thomas Talbot in 1810. The village of Springfield was incorporated as a separate municipality in 1878. The current municipality was formed in 1998 through an amalgamation of the original Township of Malahide, the former Township of South Dorchester and the former Village of Springfield.

Every year the Springfield parade draws in spectators from around Malahide Township.




