

#### "Huge crowd converges on Victoria Park for 34th annual Massed Band event in Kincardine"

A huge crowd gathered in Victoria Park, Kincardine, for the 34th annual Massed Band event, Saturday afternoon.

It was warm, with a cool breeze, and there was a threat of rain, but it held off so people could enjoy a wonderful afternoon of music in the park.

"It was the most successful event yet," said John McManus, president of the Kincardine Scottish Pipe Band which hosts the event as a thank-you to the community for its ongoing, unwavering support.

"The band is very appreciative of the community support, and we were pleased to see such a huge turn-out this year."

The entertainment began with the Kincardine Community Concert Band, followed by the impressive Toronto All-Star Big Band which has been in attendance for more than 30 years.

Also performing, were the Teeswater Highlanders Pipe Band, Clinton Legion Pipe Band, Ingersoll Pipe Band, Sarnia Legion Pipe Band, and the Eliza Jane Ceilidh Band. Later, the City of Brantford Pipes and Drums joined in the massed band parade.

Norm Gauthier did a great job as MC for the show.

McManus said the hungry crowd went through 3,200 hot dogs, 2,600 cobs of corn, 17 pounds of butter and 55 pounds of onions.

He gave a shout-out to all the sponsors of the event, and the many, many volunteers, for their ongoing support of this appreciation event. Special mention goes to Rob Parker of Bruce Beach who cooks the corn.

Following the afternoon of entertainment, the visiting bands formed up along Durham Market North, beside Victoria Park, to join the Kincardine Scottish Pipe Band in the traditional Saturday Night Parade through downtown Kincardine. There were about 170 pipers and drummers taking part in the massed band parade.

Unfortunately, the rain that had been threatening all day, finally poured down just as the parade was lining up. And for the first time ever, the Saturday Night Parade headed out before 8 p.m. (about 10 minutes early), marching through the heavy rain to Quinn Plaza and then back to the park for a brief concert.

#### Battle of Britain Ceremony Sunday September 21st



Members and Executives of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch #119 held a Memorial Service on Sunday for the 85th anniversary of the Battle of Britain. Councillor Kristy Van Kooten-Bossence, Councillor Mike Bowman, Mayor Brian Petrie, and MPP Ernie Hardeman were in attendance. The Padre for the Legion, Rev'd Marty Keatings, took part in the service as well. The Battle of Britain was a crucial conflict during the Second World War, where Canadian pilots played a significant role in defending the United Kingdom against the German Luftwaffe. This battle, fought from July to October 1940, marked the first major defeat of Nazi military forces. The bravery and skill of the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) pilots were instrumental in securing victory, showcasing Canada's vital contribution to the Allied war effort.

## October 18th Founder's Festival Tillsonburg



The Founder's Festival in Tillsonburg celebrated the town's 200th anniversary, honoring its founder, George Tillson, and the history of settlement that began in 1825. The event featured family-friendly activities, historical experiences, and entertainment to bring the town's story to life.

- 200th Anniversary: The festival celebrated the 200th birthday of the founding of Tillsonburg, which was originally called Dereham Forge.
- Founder's Legacy: It honored the vision and spirit of George Tillson, who cleared the land to build the first forge in 1825.
- Community and History: The festival brought the community together to celebrate its rich heritage through a day of historical experiences, entertainment, and local vendors.

The Ingersoll Pipe Band was invited to the official opening ceremony of the Founder's Festival. There were several speakers representing the Town of Tillsonburg, The Tillsonburg Historical Society, representatives of the Founder's Festival organizing committee, and other levels of government. Before our concert, it was explained to the audience the connection between bagpipes and the family business. The Tillson Pan Dried Oats packaging featured a Scottish piper!

## **Business Ventures of E.D. Tillson**

The son of George Tillson, Edwin Delevan Tillson began his business career in Tillsonburg in 1846 when he formed a partnership with Wright Barker and Charles Cody to construct a sawmill on Clear Creek. Through this venture, E.D. Tillson was able to acquire enough capital to build a second sawmill, and later was able to buy his father's mills and water-rights. By the 1860s, he was operating a sawmill, a grist mill, a planing mill, a sash-and-door factory, and even a store. Beginning in 1865, he expanded his operations to include an oat-mill and flour mill, and adopted new technological advances in milling, which included a shift from millstones to rollers.

Tillson's most well-known business endeavor was the development and marketing of the patented Tillson Pan-Dried Oats. Following a bout with typhoid, it was said a doctor recommended that he eat oatmeal after his recovery. However, as the food staple wasn't available locally, Tillson took it upon himself to build his own mill. Constructed in 1873, the mill produced 125 barrels of rolled oatmeal per day using traditional methods. Following a fire in 1878, the mill was replaced with a larger structure which incorporated Tillson's patented method of dry kiln-preparation, which greatly improved the processing and, more importantly, the taste of the oatmeal.



Tillson's Pan-Dried Oats soon became the number one cereal in Canada and led to Tillsonburg being nicknamed "the Pan-Dried Town". In addition, Tillson's oats were soon internationally known with barrels of oatmeal being shipped to countries in Europe and South America, and even as far as South Africa. Due to its popularity, the mill would often run 24 hour shifts to meet the demands and is said to have produced upwards of 200 barrels a day. A large advertisement and marketing scheme also helped to ensure the product's popularity.

# Around The Band Hall and Members' News

#### **TREATS**

In September, Lois Turvey sent me an email with an interesting story . This is what she wrote –

"Hi Veronica,
