

Remembrance Day Friday November 11th

Remembrance Day Thoughts



Remembrance Day is a memorial day observed in Canada since the end of the First World War to honour armed forces members who have died in the line of duty. I have always worn a poppy, but for the past two years I have also lined my walkway with poppies. I thought I would share a picture.

Every year I attend a Remembrance observation at a Cenotaph. I find it very meaningful. Both my Grandfathers were in the first World War. My paternal Grandfather enlisted at the London Armories having lied about his age when he was 14 years old. My Father was in the Second World War. My Uncle was also in the Second World War, but did not make it back to Canada. He died during the War and is buried in England. I have visited his Grave.

During a river cruise to France, Catherine and I were fortunate to have the opportunity to visit the First World War Vimy War Memorial and the Juno Beach Centre where Canadian Troops landed on D Day in the Second World War. I wish that every Canadian could have these experiences.



A Hero Lived Here












Tillsonburg Santa Claus Parade








Destination Sunday Night December 4th - Belmont

A Travel Report from Pipe Sergeant Charlie and His Trip to Scotland

In our last issue, Charlie gave us a very interesting travel report about his time in the Hebrides. In this short essay he is giving us some insights about Largs where he also hung out in the fall.

"Largs, a brief history of a North Ayrshire seaside town"

Here is a short history of the town of Largs.

After my last article about my bicycle trip to Scotland, I mentioned that my trip started and ended in the town of Largs, I have been asked about the town so here is a brief history of this historic and desirable destination.

Largs is a town of 12,000 people, approximately 30 miles or 50 Kms from Glasgow and its ancient Gaelic name is " An Leargaidh " which means " the slopes"

Modern day Largs developed in the 17th century when Sir Robert Montgomery built the ancient Kirk (Church)

of Largs in 1636 but there is evidence of civilization in the area dating back to 3,000 B.C.

One of the more historical events to occur in the past was the Battle of Largs which took place between King Haakon Haakonson of Norway and Alexander III of Scotland in1263 when King Alexander was only 23 years old.

The Norwegians were attempting to claim sovereignty and a fleet of about 160 Viking ships were moored just off Largs. On September 30th, during particularly stormy weather, several of these boats were driven ashore just south of Largs. On October 2nd when the Norwegians were trying to salvage their boats, the Scottish army, led by King Alexander III arrived. For several hours fierce fighting took place resulting in the Norwegians retreating to their moored vessels and eventually sailing off.

In 1912 a monument was built to commemorate the battle; this monument is a half scale replica of a similar tower built in 1012-1100 at Brechin. These towers were built as bell towers, treasury or refuge as you may notice by the door's location approximately 10 ft off the ground. These refuge buildings were accessed by a retractable ladder.

The monument itself, known as the Pencil Monument, is 57 feet in height with a diameter of 10 ft at its base and 8ft at its top. The stone used for the tower is whinstone with the top part made from red sandstone. Each year in September Largs hosts a weeklong Viking Festival at the end of which a boat burning and firework display takes place.



During World War 2, the Hollywood Hotel was designated HMS Warren. A conference was held there between June 28th and July 2nd, 1943, under Lord Louis Mountbatten. It was known as the 'Field of the Cloth Gold" because of the number of high-ranking officers taking part. The decision that the invasion of Europe would take place in Normandy was made at this conference.

"Magnus the Viking": this Viking sculpture was created to commemorate the 750th, anniversary of the battle of Largs, and presented to the town in 2013. The giant statue is 16 feet (5 meters) tall and was named Magnus in honour of the first Patron of the Viking festival.

Largs doesn't have the fast-food outlets we are so used to here, but retains the traditional restaurants, tea rooms, pubs and fish and chip shops. Which just adds to the pleasant atmosphere of the town.
