


So, what is a pipe band to do????????












## The Paris Tour Saturday July 25th



# Final Stop in Tillsonburg – Maple Manor



## Meet Some of Our Learners

Over the past couple of years, we have had numerous dedicated students sign up for both piping and drumming lessons.

Until Wilson McBeath's death, most piping Beginners started their studies with Wilson. He was a dedicated teacher who brought out the best in all his pupils.

John Lynes took over the role as the instructor for Beginners. He had several students continue and new ones registered so Mary Ellen Muterer also contributed to their instruction.

Jack Habkirk is in charge of the Intermediate group and takes these students onto the "parade ready" level. These students eventually come to the band table for chanter practices.

Since Covid arrived on our doorstep teaching methods had to change and Zoom became part of the story. John Lynes continued with the Beginners group and Doug Collins worked online with the Intermediates.

All of our pipe teachers are continuing their roles as we make our way back to some sense of normalcy at the band hall. "In person" socially-distanced lessons for individuals has begun again this month.



So in mid-July the newsletter editor sent out an email to all of students who are receiving instruction and asked for their input for this newsletter! Here's what I wrote:

Dear Piping / Drumming Fans and Students: All of you have registered over the last few months and / or years to take piping or drumming lessons with the Ingersoll Pipe Band. Some of you are still at the beginning of learning how to play and others are quickly advancing to becoming full time "parading" members of the band. Unfortunately, the Covid 19 situation that arrived on our doorsteps last spring has not helped with allowing you to move through various stages at a quicker pace. But definitely through Zoom sessions and lots of practice hours on your own, you have made significant gains. In the next issue of the pipe band newsletter, which will come out around the third week of August, I would like (with your assistance) to profile as many of you as possible. Several years ago, when Doug Glover was editor of the newsletter, I and several newbies were asked to write down a few thoughts as well about how our love for pipes and drums led us down this road to the IPB hall.

So, if you would humour me and like to take part in this venture I would appreciate your input."

Five individuals rose to the occasion and shared with me a little bit of their piping stories. Thanks to Lois, Angus, Liam, Sammy and Maureen for their responses.

#### Maureen Jansen – Beginner

"After seeing a notice in the paper for lessons for pipes or drums at the Pipe band hall, I called to inquire.

I started chanter lessons Jan. 2020. The time seemed right. I thought "it's now or never".

I live in Ingersoll. I started lessons with Mary Ellen, then Covid happened. I was practising on my own until John Lynes contacted me. We are doing lessons on Zoom.

My fingers had a mind of their own in the beginning but have slowly found the right movements. When I am practising it is actually starting to sound like music lol.






# **Practice Sessions**
