



Rob: “Thank you for doing all this! I would love to know the location of the grave to pay him a visit one day.”





An Update from Our Beginners’ Instructor



“ When Veronica asked me to write an article about our learners I immediately thought of a book called “The Music Lesson” recommended to us by piper and teacher Ken Eller.

In the book the teacher was part musical genius, part philosopher and part eccentric wise man. The teacher would guide the student on a spiritual journey, and teach them that the gifts we get from music mirror those from life, and every movement, phrase, and chord has its own meaning. I could only wish that I was that kind of teacher ... well maybe I could say that I am eccentric.

I have come to the conclusion that teaching probably is one of the most rewarding things a person can do. Teaching any kind of instrument provides a unique connection with your students. As a participant in a person’s quest to play the bagpipes I enjoy the best seat in the house. My front row seat allows me to guide him or her along their particular path of achievement and every student has their own path. As you sit on the edge of your seat you get to watch as they grasp a technique, cringe as they struggle and jump up and down with glee when they conquer a particular phrase or embellishment. I have to say that teaching music is the best adventure anyone can undertake and the best part is I do not have to go any further than Ingersoll (or my living room) to participate. I now understand why Wilson’s face lit up with joy every time he sat down with a student.

At present we have 4 students in the beginner's class. Each of them has decided to play the pipes for different reasons and each of the 4 women have different musical backgrounds. Lynn previously has taken chanter lessons and is familiar with the tutor book. She trains guide dogs and has taught her dog to howl in tune with the chanter.

Maureen who has a busy life plays golf, cross-country skis and has recently purchased a telescope so her and hubby can spend some time together under the stars.

Abby and Christie both belong to the Stratford Symphony Orchestra and both play several different instruments. I am not sure when they have time to practice the chanter as both of them work fulltime. Abby works at the hospital and is devoting most of her spare time transcribing our tunes into a music program that the orchestra uses. Can you imagine doing a throw on a clarinet? Christie works full time as an investment advisor and is holding her own against her daughter's get-up-and-go desire to learn. I suggested to Abby that she should take her chanter to work and practice at every break and on lunch, much like what Ken Webster did when he was driving bus. The look she gave me will be similar to the one she will give me when she reads this.

All and all teaching is so much fun. I hope it never ends."

A BRIEF HISTORY LESSON

Another history lesson about piping tunes from John Lynes. This first one is a 2/4 ; a tune that our beginners will quickly come to recognize and memorize.

The Barren Rocks of Aden

2/4 March



'Barren Rocks of Aden'

Britain was the first European power in the region to take possession of Aden (now in the Republic of Yemen) on the Arabian coast in 1839, in order to protect British trade routes and provide safe passage and anchorage for ships. Over the years many Scots regiments were based there. This tune was written during this time. In the mid-1870s Egypt, defying the claims of Turkey, occupied some of the towns on the Somali coast. When the Egyptian troops left in 1882 to respond to the revolt of the Mahdi in the Sudan, Great Britain occupied the territory. Britain was mainly concerned with keeping open the route to India through the Suez Canal, which had been opened in 1869. Then in 1887, Britain proclaimed it a British protectorate, and named it British Somaliland. Initially a dependency of Aden, it was placed under the administration of the colonial office in 1905. It is the regimental quick march of the Kings Own Scottish Borders.



Greetings from Glasgow, Scotland.
I've been trying to locate the pipe music for "The Bonnie Lass O' Bon Accord" for some time now but without success. However, I've just come across your band's YouTube channel and was delighted to hear them play it. It was a medley tune in my Boys Brigade band in the 60s and that was the last time I heard it on the pipes - prior to this morning. May I trouble you to email me a photo of the music if available or if in print advise who may have published it?

So the message was relayed to PM Doug Collins and here is his reply:

Good day Bill,
Greetings from Canada. A bit of history for this tune seems in order.
My name is Doug Collins current Pipe Major of the Ingersoll Pipe Band.
I am the third generation in my family to be the Pipe Major. My father Bob Collins was 65 year member and Pipe Major for over 45 years.
My Grand Father Alec Collins came to Canada after World War I in 1920 and served as pipe Major for over 37 years. Alec was a piper for a Colonel in the Scottish Army and trained as a sniper. While stationed in France during the war Alec heard a Pipe Band playing the "Bonnie Lass of Bon Accord". He sat on a hillside listening to this tune while they played, and hand wrote the music to what he was hearing. When he came to Canada he introduced this tune to our band and has been our signature tune ever since.
The music attached is what he had written.
The band is now in our 111th year and is one of the oldest non-military Pipe bands in North America.

In 2019 I was lucky enough to be at the Worlds in Glasgow and hope to return again in the future when the worlds are held again.
Small World some times when it comes to piping.
I hope you enjoy this tune as much as we do.
All the best to you in Piping.

*Hello Doug,
Many thanks for going to the trouble of forwarding the music and sharing the setting's wonderful provenance with me. It elevates the tune to another level and I now have a picture in my mind of Scottish soldier, on well-earned down-time: transcribing on some foreign hillside, with shells and bullets flying across no man's land probably a few miles in the distance. And of course at that moment in time, there's no way that Alec could ever have imagined that his band, and pipers like me would be seeking out and playing his setting more than a hundred years later.
On the subject of the Great War, The Scottish Pipers' Association held a series of concerts to commemorate the centenary. Jeannie Campbell who was our president for many years and curator of the College of Piping, produced a programme for the events. It refers to some WW1 tunes and composers. I have a copy and as it may be of interest and have posted to you at the band address.
I also look forward to the worlds back in Glasgow after the dreadful pandemic and for sure I'll be cheering the band on if you manage across.


You will also see in one of the pictures attached, members of the band playing at the crossing of the Rhine Nov 11th 1918 and there are 4 members of the Ingersoll band playing in the picture. In the picture is a W. Collins who was Alec's older brother. It's a pretty amazing picture.

The University of Aberdeen has an entire website devoted to him and if you click on his photo above you can visit it and get the whole story!

Meet James Scott Skinner (5 August 1843 – 17 March 1927) who was a Scottish dancing master, violinist, fiddler, and composer. He is considered to be one of the most influential fiddlers in Scottish traditional music, and was known as "the Strathspey King". Over 600 of his compositions were published, among the best known being "The Bonnie Lass of Bon Accord," "Cradle Song," "Bovaglie's Plaid," "The Music o' Spey," and "Hector the Hero." He made over 80 recordings.



Williamina Davidson Bell
1866 – 1938
"Mina" Bell, a farmer's daughter from Clayfolds by Stonehaven, was working as a house maid in Aberdeen when she inspired Skinner's "Bonnie Lass O' Bon Accord". In Skinner's memoirs, serialised in the People's Journal, February to April

1923, he recalls that in December 1884, after holding a dancing class in the Silver Street Hall, Aberdeen, he and some friends were invited to a house in nearby Union Terrace." There I found a girl performing the menial task of a servant, who it was plainly to be seen was a 'cut' above the ordinary servant lass of those days. I was both interested and surprised and my surprise was heightened when the floor was cleared for dancing, for Williamina proved herself a splendid 'tripper of the light fantastic toe'."





Bonnie Lass Of Bon Accord Song Information Video



Bon Accord – This reference is to Aberdeen; "Bon Accord", meaning "Good Agreement" is the motto of the city of Aberdeen, derived in the 14th century.



G Coy, 5th Battalion King's Own Scottish Borderers photographed outside the Territorial Army drill hall (now the town swimming pool) three days after the declaration of war in 1914. In the middle of the third row is Captain Ernest Switzer Forde, a local GP and provost of the burgh of Castle Douglas from 1925 to 1938. A veteran of the Egypt (1888) and Boer Wars (1899-1902), he served as a medical officer in the Dardanelles and France and was wounded at Cape Hellas. Seated on his left is Lt. Salmond, later the headmaster of Creetown School, who was invalided home from Gallipoli. The Battalion served with great distinction in the Gallipoli campaign of 1915 but bore very heavy casualties; out of 50 officers and 1082 men, the 1/5th Battalion lost 30 officers and 760 men in this disastrous campaign. They went on to fight in Egypt, Gaza and the Western Front. The most decorated Castle Douglas soldier was Pte. J.J. O'Haire who won the Military Medal and both the French Medaille Militaire and Croix de Guerre with Palms for continuous gallantry and devotion to duty at Beugneux. The French decorations were presented on the field. Pte. O'Haire was killed in action in 1918.

Hi all, I'm Jim Austin, grandson of James Galbraith and great grandson of Donald Galbraith. Both of them played with your band in the '30s to early '40s. I met you all by coincidence in 2002 at Decoration Day in Delhi.

More recently (a couple of years ago,) I posted a 1940ish photo of your band on your Facebook page.

Anyhow, the reason for this email is that the 'Bagpipe News' had an article about Donald Galbraith in their on-line Jan. 29 newsletter. I replied to them with a 1907-12 photo of Donald with an unknown band in Scotland.

Hi, James "aka Hamish",
Our new secretary, Lisa, for the Ingersoll Pipe Band forwarded to me your email about your grandfather, James and great grandfather, Donald. I look after the band newsletter and Facebook page so she thought I might be the best person to follow your email up. I will also send it along to our PM Doug Collins whose got lots of family connections to the band going back to 1910!

What great connections you have to the IPB!

I joined the band in 2007 so I didn't meet you in 2002 in Delhi. I have been to Delhi to participate in the past few years (pre Covid) at the Harvest Festival parade and Decoration Day at the local cemetery.

I spoke to Drum Major Gail MacKay and he says that your Grandfather and Great Grandfather were well before his time. Gail has been with the band 69 years and knows most of the band history.

He remembers your grandfather, James but not Donald. In our history book "Ingersoll Pipe Band 1910 to 2010" we have your grandfather listed as a member but not your great grandfather. James is listed as a piper from 1938 to 1943.

I searched through some local databases for both James and Duncan but came up empty handed. Did they move out of the Oxford County area at some point? Do you live in the Simcoe / Delhi area?

Very happy to hear that the piping genes are still coursing through your cousin's grandchildren's blood. What band will his / her granddaughter be interested in joining? Keep in touch and if we hear anything from Stewart Gardiner I will let you know, and if you have any additional info to share with us please do so. – Veronica Jackson

He indicates that he had no date for this photo but thought it was circa 1940. He also pointed out that his great grandfather, Donald Galbraith is "in the top left". His grandfather, James is "3 up on the right".

(Almost identical photos. Perhaps Donald had retired from piping "on parade". He would have been 76 years old!)

Hi Veronica,

Thank you for your follow-up email in regards to the Ingersoll Pipe Band.

I live in the Eganville which is in Ottawa Valley about 40 km. west of Renfrew. My wife, Paddy, plays with the Renfrew Highland Pipes and Drums. And I just putter with the pipes now on my own.

The Ingersoll Pipe Band photo in the Pipe Band Archive is marginally different from your book and is the one that was sent to the [Pipe Band Archives](#). (This is a Facebook Page that has been in contact with Jim)

I'm providing it to you as an attachment in case you don't have it. Donald Galbraith is in the top left and James Galbraith is 3 up on the right.

The second photo shows the band marching in Ingersoll. James Galbraith is distinctive because he is playing with the pipes on his right shoulder. This photo was stamped June 9 1941 on the back.

From 1938 to 1943, Donald (b. 1862) would have been 76-81 years of age. This could explain the jacket and tie.

My grandfather, James' house burned in Straffordville (south of Tillsonburg) in the thirties, resulting in James' pipes and kit being destroyed. He would have used Donald's pipes after that.

During the later thirties and early forties, the Galbraiths were in Straffordville (Elgin County). This included Donald and Catherine Galbraith, my grandfather James Galbraith with Mary and their family.

My grandfather's sister - great-aunt Janet Partington also lived there with husband Bill and family.

James Galbraith managed the Bank of Commerce in Straffordville and was transferred to Delhi during the war. Eventually, in 1950, there was one more transfer to St. Thomas. James, his wife Mary and most of both sides of my family are buried in Delhi Cemetery.

Donald and Catherine stayed in Straffordville. Catherine died in 1943, so Donald moved in with his daughter, Janey Partington. He passed away in 1947. They are both buried in Victoria Lawn Cemetery in St. Catharines. In 2005, Donald's pipes were restored by Dunbar's, a half km. away from the cemetery.



A Message from Our PM




Bill invested in some “real estate” and it paid off BIG time!


