Meet Our Quartermaster Scott Munro

A few weeks ago, your editor approached our new quartermaster, Scott, about submitting an article for our next newsletter. Scott joined the IPB in 2019 and has been a great asset both as an accomplished snare drummer and as a member of our executive team. Here is Scott's contribution: he shares his history with pipe bands and his enthusiasm for the future.



"I was born in Fergus, Ontario and when I was nearing my 10th birthday, my mum and dad bought me a practice pad and my first pair of Alex Duthart sticks. This is when I joined the Fergus Pipe Band to be a snare drummer. Like the Ingersoll Pipe Band, Fergus also has military roots and was originally formed by veterans of the Seaforth Highlanders. Funnily enough, the first drum I got was an old rope tension drum just like the one we have in our band room. My dress uniform was much like what Pipe Major Gail wears except that my doublet was red."

I played with Fergus for many years at various highland games and parades; usually being the shortest in the massed bands when I was young!

The Orangeman's Day parade I remember vividly as the first parade where people were yelling and throwing tomatoes at me! I think that was in Stratford.

In addition to this, I continued to play the drum kit with my high school concert, stage and jazz bands. in 1978 we toured England, Ireland, Wales and Scotland in the International Stage band Festivals. We met so many great people and played so many huge venues!

As time marched on (and many uniform style/ size changes) our lead tip began to practice with the Guelph Pipe Band. At the time they were becoming a very strong Grade 1 outfit under the direction of the Nye brothers. I was lucky enough to sit in and practice with them and found it exhilarating to learn different scores and styles.



Early Years!

Fast forwarding into my late teens, the time had come when I was heading away for my first big summer job away from home and then onto university in the fall. Staying in the pipe band was something I couldn't balance any longer and had to make the difficult decision to move on.

As luck might have it, the summer job I took at a resort in Muskoka had a staff talent show component to it. I teamed up with young piper from Guelph whom I knew, donned our kilts and played weekly for the guests as the opening act. So much fun!

Once done university, like many of my friends, I headed to Toronto and worked for many years on Bay Street with stints back and forth to the US. It was years before I picked up a set of sticks.

Our oldest son MacGregor was a corporal in the Royal Highland Fusiliers of Canada (the old Highland Light Infantry) and one day about 4 years ago he came to me with the news that the unit was looking for a snare drummer. He told them I was a shoe in as I was old, retired and knew all the old military tunes! My immediate response was that boot camp will kill me. What I didn't realize was that he had already committed me to an audition Tuesday night that week.

Lucky for me, it was like getting on a bike again. Playing with such seasoned musicians has been a real pleasure.

One of the biggest highlights has been an annual assembly of military bands from all over the world to play in Fortissimo.

Daily we practice new scores for 5-6 hours and continue onto a full dress, 3 hour evening show for a week on Parliament Hill to thousands of people.





For the last few years, I have also been playing in a Celtic/ Jazz/ Rock fusion band called Skirl. It consists of highland pipes, trombone, accordion and various percussion players. We play a lot of festivals and some highland games.





Janie and I downsized (both boys are now in Alberta) and moved to Innerkip in 2018 and love the area.

I have thoroughly enjoyed being a member of the Ingersoll Pipe Band. Everyone has made it so welcoming to being a member of such a great band with such great musicians and a rich history.

I sure with this Covid thing would be done soon so we can get back to playing person!


Allen, William Arthur (Bill)

He was a lifelong resident of Ingersoll. He also continued to be a member of the Ingersoll Pipe Band for over 50 years.

Due to COVID standards he will be interred in a small service at the Ingersoll Rural Cemetery and be laid to rest.

What follows are some thoughts about Bill that have been shared by band members –

Mary Ellen Muterer writes:

"Bill first joined the band in 1962 and played until 1997. He then took about four years off until rejoining the band in 2001 and playing with us until this year. He had not been able to play with us as often as of late because he found carrying a drum was getting more difficult due to back pain.

Bill could play either tenor or bass drum depending on what the band needed him to play at an event. Bill was able to play a flourishing bass where he used tenor sticks to put on a show.

The 60's and 70's saw some band members staying after band practice (sometimes until 2:00 a.m.) to play euchre, discuss events and order Chinese food. In the 80's and 90's that changed into some bandmembers staying after band practice (again sometimes until 2:00 a.m.) to play Trivial Pursuit, discuss events and support the canteen. Each Thursday would see different members stay to engage in a battle of knowledge but a core group could be found there every week in the hunt. Bill was one of these members who stayed after practice most Thursdays whether a game was being played or just to talk.



More recently Bill would come and sit and visit with Dad, something Dad really enjoyed and we appreciated. All in all. Bill was an important and valuable member of our band for about 55 years. This is something for which the band is very arateful".

His 50 plus years as a valued member of the Ingersoll
Pipe Band speaks volumes of his dedication to the
band. Bill was a Tenor and Bass drummer with the

amongst the pictures on the walls of our Hall and will
allow us to keep him in our memories as a long-time
dedicated member. We played a tune in his honor at
last night's practice.

'Collin's Cattle'

Crodh Chailein (Colin's Cattle). Scottish, Slow Air (3/4 time). The melody is thought to have been composed by Isabel Cameron of Mull. It tells the story of Colin's beautiful bride who was enchanted by fairies on her wedding day. Her fate was to disappear from her home for a year, during which time she was allowed to return home once a day to milk the cows, invisible to her husband who had to content himself with hearing her sing. The spell was broken at the end of the year and the couple could live together at last.

Amazing Grace



'Amazing Grace'

The words to "Amazing Grace" were written in the 18th century by John Newton. He was born in London and after a life, which included being press-ganged into the navy, flogged and becoming a skipper of a boat plying the slave trade, was converted to religion and became a minister. He wrote many hymns and this one was propelled into the pop charts when a pipe band recorded the tune. The now familiar and traditional melody of the hymn was not composed by Newton, and the words were sung to a number of tunes before the now inseparable melody was chanced upon. They first appear united in a hymnal from 1831 called "Virginia Harmony," where the tune is called "New Britain." Any original words sung to the tune are now lost. The melody is believed to be Scottish or Irish in origin; it is pentatonic and suggests a bagpipe tune.

More History – International This Time!



So the Ingersoll Pipe Band often refers to itself as "the oldest continually performing non-military pipe band in North America"! And yes, in fact we are celebrating our 110th Anniversary. But hey, we're just youngsters compared to some of the UK bands. Piper Laurie Marson of the London Police Pipes and Drums, and who originally came to Canada from the UK, sent along this article from **The Bagpipe News** website. A very interesting read about all the claims to fame and longevity on the other side of the pond!



Breadalbane Pipe Band – possibly the oldest known civilian pipe band.

"A small number of civilian pipe bands claim to be the oldest - or, at least, among the oldest. Wallacestone, Inveraray, Kilsyth and Kirkintilloch, are among the small list and all four date to the mid-1880s. We think the latter two are in abeyance these days but Wallacestone is still competing (currently in Grade 2 under the leadership of its able Pipe Major, Neil Henderson) and Inveraray was reformed in 2005 and is doing rather well ...Then there's Lonach Pipe Band, which is mentioned in a Scottish newspaper report from 1868 although only one drummer is mentioned and it would be 1895 when another report states that a local parade "was headed by six pipers and four drummers". Other 'bands' of this period were comprised solely of a handful of pipers and no drummers." - In this article, piping historian Jeannie Campbell suggests the oldest proper civilian pipe band may actually have been founded in Perthshire in the late-Victorian period.
