In 2021, the irrigation system was fully charged and in use until December 5th, with our blowout taking place the following week. Immediately following blowout, the golf course received a 6" blanket of snow. It would be the only measurable snow of the winter. Around Christmas, we covered our greens with the usual hydromulch for protection and hoped for the best. Prairie Club full time staff consisting of Director Brandon Arens, Superintendent DJ Shallenberger, Assistant AJ Wrage, and myself worked on continuously watering some aspect of the property anytime the temperatures were above 40° Fahrenheit. We fought the wind that was continuously blowing sand out of bunkers and on to greens and fairways. We did anything we could to help the turf survive until we turned the irrigation system back on and washed the greens covers off in mid March of 2022.

had internal discussions about how much we should worry about snow mold and ice damage. The wind had been tranquil by our standards, and the constant presence of moisture has tamed the ever-shifting bunker sands. To summarize, this winter has been different.

This winter has been a season to recharge our bodies and minds. Was it needed? Who knows? As with everyone in this industry, we would've gladly worked the long hours and braved the conditions all season long if Mother Nature had dealt us that hand. Instead, she gave us the flexibility to spend more time with family and
