# SCHOOL OF THE MONTH! BROOK MEAD ACADEMY, LEICESTER



The pupils love the characters, stories and gradual introduction to Latin grammar. They enjoy learning about Pompeii and using the textbooks to further their understanding of key Roman civilization topics such as slavery.

Brook Mead Academy is a new free school in the heart of Leicester city. They currently have Years 7 to 9, and a very diverse cohort of pupils. As part of a broad and rich curriculum offer, we teach Latin to every pupil in year 7 for one period per week.

All of Year 7 study Latin using the Cambridge Latin Course, reaching approximately the end of Stage 7. They can then opt to continue learning Latin in Year 8, during their compulsory extra-curricular sessions. In weekly 40 minute sessions Year 8s continue to use the Cambridge Latin Course to complete requirements for the OCR Entry Level Latin qualification. As part of this, they also complete Roman Life coursework focused on the Roman poet Catullus. From September 2024 the school has also offered pupils the chance to study GCSE Latin on timetable. Congratulations to everyone at Brook Mead for making Latin such a success!



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#### **WORD ROOT OF THE MONTH:**

(I do these for Primary Schools, and thought you might enjoy them too!) What does a mouse have to do with a muscle?!

I read this somewhere recently, and can't remember where it was, but it made me chuckle, so I thought I would share it with you all too!

"Muscle" and "muscular" both come from the Latin word "musculus", which is the diminutive form of "mus", which means mouse. So "musculus" means "little mouse". The Romans thought that a muscle looked like a "little mouse" and now I can't unsee it either!
