Luzerne County Fair Queen Contest

The Luzerne County Fair will sponsor the Official Fair Queen Contest on Saturday, August 19th, at 7:00 PM in conjunction with the Fair V.I.P. / Volunteer reception.

The winner of this Pageant will compete for the State Queen Title, sponsored by the Pennsylvania State Association of County Fairs. The State Queen Pageant will take place at the State Fair Association Convention, held in January 2024, in Hershey, PA.

EACH FAIR QUEEN CONTESTANT MUST:

- 1. Be a female who is a U.S. citizen and a resident of Luzerne County.
- 2. Be at least age 16, but no older than 20 years of age as of June 1st of the year entering the local contest.
- 3. Be willing to be the certified representative of the local fair where she is crowned.
- 4. Have not been a former local Fair Queen winner, nor a former State Fair Queen contestant.
- 5. Not hold any other title for any other commodity group or pageant.
- 6. Have her parent(s) or guardian(s) consent to enter the PA State competition.
- 7. Be single, have never been married, have not been pregnant nor given birth to a child.
- 8. Act in accordance with the PA State Fair Queen "Behavior Policy". This will be furnished to contestants.
- 9. Be able to meet all time commitments, Queen obligations, and Dress Code as set forth by the PA State Fair Queen Program.

IN ADDITION, EACH CONTESTANT WILL:

- A. Submit a signed agreement form and application, along with a written essay entitled, "What My Fair Means to My Community" (300 words or less).
- B. Submit one (1) color photograph (portrait type) along with proof of age (copy of a valid driver's license or birth certificate) and mailed along with the application.
- C. Present a three to five-minute persuasive speech on the topic, "Why You Should Come to My Fair". Props that enhance the speech are allowed. Overhead projectors and PowerPoint presentations are not permitted. This is judged on content (to include agriculture). Each contestant will be interviewed and asked questions regarding the Fair. Each contestant will have a private interview with the judges prior to the contest at a time and location to be named.
- D. Agree to participate in the 2023 Luzerne County Fair, September 6th through the 10th, and participate in the January 2024 State Fair Queen event, as well as participate in promotional activities throughout the 2024 year. The first runner-up succeeds the winner should she, for whatever reason, not fulfill her obligations.

Contestants will be judged on Poise, Appearance (must be attired in a dress), Neatness, and Ability to Communicate, (in a written essay, speech given during the contest, and private interview with the judges).

- 6.Refrigeration is NOT available at the Fair or PA Farm Show. Any cake entry that requires refrigeration after baking must be so noted on the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned, or otherwise distributed for consumption after the judging for food safety reasons.
- 7. The entire cake entry must be submitted for judging on cardboard or other food-safe disposable settings. No pans will be returned.
- 8. Recipe(s) listing the ingredients and the preparation instructions must be submitted with the entry (printed or typed on one side of 8 1/2" x 11" paper). Entrant's name, address, and phone number must be printed on the back side of all recipe pages. (All recipes and cakes will become the property of the Fair or PAFarm Show and will not be returned.)
- 9. Cakes will be judged on flavor (30 pts), inside characteristics (25 pts), overall appearance (20 pts), creativity (15 pts), and topping, icing, or decoration (10 pts).





- 2. Exhibitor must be an individual amateur baker aged 8 through and including 18 years who is a PA resident; one entry per person.
- 3. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred® Junior Baking Contest at any other fair in 2022.
- 4. Entry must be a plate of six (6) individual-sized portions of the baked entry item made from "scratch". Pre-made mixes are not acceptable ingredients. All ingredients and decorations must be edible.
- 5. At least two (2) PA Preferred® ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients are PA Preferred® grains (such as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits, and/or vegetables.

GENERAL RULES

NOTE: Special rules may apply to each individual department. Refer to those individual sections for specific information. **Absolutely no parking allowed in front of the small animal barn or alongside horse ring.**

- 1. All entries must be grown, produced, or made in Luzerne County or surrounding counties since the last Fair (with the exception of Livestock entries, see individual species).
- 2. Entry forms are furnished with all Premium Booklets. Entry forms may be photocopied if needed.
- 3. All entry forms are to be completed with name, address, phone number, and if available E-mail addresses.
- 4. Each entry, must include the department number, section number, class number, and description of that entry.
- 5. Your first entry list is final **NO ADDED LISTS WILL BE ACCEPTED.**
- 6. No exhibitor may enter no more than TWO (2) items in each class unless noted otherwise.
- 7. After the ENTRY FORM is completed entirely, please mail it, with your entry fee(s), **All entry forms will incur a \$2.00 processing fee.** There will be a \$35 charge for any checks returned for non-sufficient funds. Entry forms with postage due will be declined.
- 8. Students are encouraged to enter arts & crafts as listed in Department 11. Entrants will be judged and awarded ribbons in 5 groups: **Group 1**-age 3-5; **Group 2**-age 6-9; **Group 3**-age 10-12; **Group 4**-age 13-15; **Group 5**-age 16-18; as marked on the entry form. **THE FEE FOR STUDENTS IS \$1.00 TOTAL**, **per student** UNLESS THEY ENTER IN THE ADULT CATEGORIES, AS AN ADULT. **The fee for ADULTS is \$2.00 per adult.** Please note your age group on the entry form.
- 9. Exhibit tickets will not be mailed. They will be at the fairgrounds at the time of entry acceptance.
- 10. The Fair Committee reserves the right of refusing to accept any entry or item that is improperly entered; to bar from competition articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition. The Committee may at any time remove any exhibit in poor condition. Food products cannot be polluted with any substance that causes them to become unfit to be used as food.
- 11. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display, day and night, from any injury or damage. The Fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss, or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise; whatever may be the cause or extent of damage or loss.
- 12. **The decision of the judges is FINAL** in all cases except where mistakes, fraud, or misrepresentation, not discovered at the time of award, is proven.
- 13. During judging, the area will be closed to everyone except Fair Officials, Judges, Pennsylvania Fair Fund Officials, and necessary attendants. NO exhibitors shall communicate with the judges during the time of judging except to answer questions posed by the judges. Otherwise, the exhibitors shall forfeit any ribbons(s) and premium(s) to which the exhibitor would be entitled.
- 14. Judges will not award prizes to any unworthy exhibit. In the **absence of competition** in any class, the **premium awarded will be MERIT OF EXHIBIT**.
- 15. Cash prizes are listed for each class. Ribbons will be awarded in each, if worthy. A **ROSETTE** will be awarded for an outstanding exhibit if warranted. **THERE WILL BE NO CASH AWARD FOR A ROSETTE. Student arts & crafts will be awarded appropriate ribbons and cash awards as follows**: 1st place \$3.00; 2nd place \$2.00; 3rd place \$1.50; 4th place \$1.00; Honorable Mention no cash award.
- 16. All livestock and small animals must be stabled, penned, caged, or cooped in the barns, remain on the Fairgrounds for the entire fair, and may not be removed before 8 pm on Sunday, September 10th. In the event an exhibitor lives more than 1 hour away, more than 25 miles away, or must make 2 trips, the exhibitor must request prior approval from the department chairperson if an exemption to this rule is needed. In cases of emergency or an act of God, the release may be granted by the chairperson of the livestock committee. Failure to abide by this rule will result in forfeiture of ribbons and premiums and may affect your privilege to enter your livestock and small animals at future fairs. Open Arts and Crafts entries WILL NOT BE RELEASED until Monday.

September 11th, from 6:30 pm to 8:30 pm.

- 17. No premiums will be paid until after the close of the Fair. PREMIUM PAYMENTS WILL BE MAILED TO THE EXHIBITORS at the address listed on the entry forms. Checks will be sent within 30 days after the closing of the Fair. 18. The Fair management reserves the right to eject any person from the fairgrounds who does not comply with Fair rules or is creating a disturbance of any kind.
- 19. By entering, you agree to abide by the rules and regulations as set forth by the Fair Committee. Failure to abide by these rules and regulations may result in forfeiture of premiums and ribbons and the inability to enter in future years. The Fair Committee reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as their judgment may determine.
- 20. The Internal Revenue Service requires all payments of \$600 or more to be reported on Form 1099-MISC using the recipient's Taxpayer Identification Number. In order to receive a prize or premium of \$600 or more, without backup withholding, a Form W-9 will need to be completed. Please consult a tax professional for more information.

ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS

Pennsylvania law requires that a "veterinarian-client-patient relationship" exists and is verified for each exhibitor. To meet this requirement, a signed verification from the animal owner or caretaker, as indicated on each animal entry form must be completed by each exhibitor.

- IMPORTANT: ALL HEALTH PAPERS MUST BE CHECKED BEFORE UNLOADING.
 The fair reserves the right to have a veterinarian check the animals at any time prior to, or during, the Fair. Animals presented for the exhibition will be subject to inspection by show officials and/or a veterinarian and will be rejected if evidence of infectious, contagious, or parasitic disease is apparent or if health certification or identification documentation is not acceptable. Check with department chairpersons for special regulations that may apply to out-of-
- Fair management reserves the right to require health inspections and/or diagnostic tests be made before, during, or after animals are on the fairgrounds and to implement disease control procedures which may become necessary in emergencies. The health of the animals when determined by the official veterinarian shall be final and cannot be protested. Exhibitors who refuse to allow their animals to be examined shall be disqualified. No refunds will be made.
- Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is a residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals, do not use it! If upon slaughter, treatment with drugs, biologics or any chemical from fitting products is the cause of condemnation of the carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor.

HORSES

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued After May 1, 2023, is required. Equine infectious Anemia (EIA) test results and date of test must be included in the CVI.

- All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds. All equine animals must have tested negative for EIA by an official test within 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. A copy of the official test results must accompany each animal to its final destination. Foals less than 6 months of age accompanies by a dam which meets the above requirements are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
- A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older. All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies-vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain the legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.
- Luzerne County Fair follows equine liability law SB618. The exhibitor assumes the risk of equine actions pursuant to Pennsylvania law.

ALL OPEN CLASS LIVESTOCK CATEGORIES ARE OPEN TO EXHIBITORS FROM ALL COUNTIES

DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023, is required.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
- 3. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
 - a. A USDA-issued metal ear tag, having a US shield.
 - b. A breed registration tattoo is not acceptable.
 - c. A ISO -compliant 15-digit ear tag starting with "840" and having a US Shield.
- 4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is recommended for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies-vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain a legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

RABBITS

- 1. Rabbits will be screened on arrival for health and show condition. No rabbits showing signs of contagious or infectious disease will be admitted to the Fair. Exhibitors shall sign a statement that the animal is free of known health disorders. ANIMAL HEALTH REGULATIONS
- 2. While on exhibit or at any time following the exhibition, you are obligated to report all mass mortality events and all rabbits who are ill and bleeding from eyes, nose, mouth, or have bloody stools to the department emergency line 717-772-2852 option 1. We need your help to quickly identify and stop dangerous transmissible diseases such as Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease Type 2 (RHDD-2) from spreading.

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023 is required.

1. All animals must be free of evidence of infection and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.

All goats must have an individual official animal identification. Official ID includes:

- · A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
- A legible tattoo with the herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database; or
- Goats having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by registration certificates are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.

All animals will be health checked upon arrival. No goats will be admitted to the fair that show signs of contagious, infectious diseases, or an animal with an appearance that would make for a poor display.

- 2. For post-exhibition sales, the following requirements apply:
- a. Market goats must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information:
- Official identification (as described above)
- · Sale Date
- Sale Location
- · Name, address, and phone number of the exhibitor
- Hauler contact information
- Destination name and contact information
- · Total number of animals in the shipment
- Type of goat (i.e. meat, dairy, specific breed)
- · Signature of consignee, agent, or hauler

Those slips or a document capturing all of the above must follow the sheet to their destination (including slaughter facilities)

- b. Goats which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (ICVI) prior to movement to the destination state.
- c. A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any ICVI (in b. above) must be kept by the sale organizer/extension for 5 years.

ID Requirements specific to the Farm Show complex: Market goats entering the complex must be identified with a 15-digit 840 isocompliant RFID ear tag. This can be in addition to the forms of ID listed above so long as only one 840 ID is used. No exceptions will be granted. If you wish to exhibit at the complex please distinguish between 840 tags with RFID capabilities versus 840 tags that do not have those capabilities prior to placing identification on your animal.

SWINE
Beginning January 1, 2023, no swine species shall be exhibited in Pennsylvania unless each animal:

- 1. Is accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 14 days of the fair;
- 2. Is permanently identified by an official 840 series radio frequency identification (RFID); ear tag and the ear tag number are recorded on the CVI:
- 3. Has been visually inspected and found to be free contagious diseases immediately prior to unloading at the exhibition by an accredited veterinarian or swine health monitor appointed by the fair board or livestock show committee.

SHEEP

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued After May 1, 2023.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is preprinted on the CVI). Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
- 3. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany each animal and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
- 4. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required.

Official scrapie ID includes:

- · A USDA ear tag with a US shield; or
- A legible tattoo with the herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database; or
- Sheep having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.
- 5. For post-exhibition sales the following requirements apply:
- a. Market sheet must be documented on sales slips which contain the following information:
- Official identification (as described above)
- Sale Date
- · Sale Location
- Name, address, and phone number of the exhibitor
- · Hauler contact information
- · Destination name and contact information
- Total number of animals in the shipment

Those slips or a document capturing all of the above must follow the sheet to their destination (including slaughter facilities) b. Sheep which are purchased with the intent of breeding and are traveling via interstate movement must have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) prior to moving to the destination state.

c. A copy of the sale records slips as delineated above and a copy of any CVI (in b. above) must be kept by the sale organizer/extension for 5 years.

POULTRY

All poultry entering must bear a unique individual identification official PDA-issued leg band. An owner-endorsed health certificate must accompany all Pennsylvania poultry and must include:

- Name and location of the exhibition
- Name, address, and telephone number of the owner
- · A statement that their entries and their flock of origin are free of
- · evidence of contagious diseases
- Owner signature and date of that signature
- Verification of testing for Al and Pullorum

Avian Influenza Clean Testing and Verification (all samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or an Accredited Veterinarian):

All poultry for exhibition must originate from a flock in good standing in the Pennsylvania Avian Influenza Monitored Flock Program, or the NPIP U.S. Al Clean Program and must be accompanied by the most recent negative test report (copy acceptable). The NPIP or Al MF number must be noted on the report;

OR

The poultry must originate from a flock in which a minimum of thirty (30) birds, three (3) weeks of age or older, were tested negative for avian influenza within the **30 days** prior to the opening date of the exhibition and the birds must be accompanied by the negative test report. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds.

Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Testing and Verification (all samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or an Accredited Veterinarian):

All poultry must originate from a flock in good standing in the NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Program or from a flock in good standing in the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program and the birds must be accompanied by the most recent negative test report (copy acceptable). The NPIP number must be noted on the report for NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flocks. If bird-side testing was done, the 9-2 or state equivalent form must accompany the birds (copy acceptable);

OR

Individual birds for exhibition must have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within the 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the negative test report (copy acceptable). The following age restrictions apply to comply with NPIP standards: a) chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older. b) Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older. c) Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first. d) Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older. All birds not meeting these age restrictions are exempt from the pullorum testing requirements.

Verification of NPIP U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flock status or a current official test status form must accompany all poultry.

The Fair Management will eliminate birds from competition that are not in a suitable condition.

CERTIFIED BLOOD TESTS ARE REQUIRED -NO OUT-OF-STATE POULTRY WILL BE ACCEPTED.

Pennsylvania Camelids Requirements:

ALPACAS

PDA has no specific requirements for Pennsylvania camelids at fairs. However, fair management has the authority to impose requirements designed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases.

Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023.
- 2. All animals must be free of evidence of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this should be written on the CVI.
- 3. Individual official identification (ID). Official ID will have a US shield and includes:
- A United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)-issued National Uniform Ear tagging System (NUES) tag; or
- A 15-digit Animal Identification Number ear tag starting with "840"; or
- An electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader); or
- Other official identification approved by USDA (brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable); or
- For animals without any of the ID options listed in number 3 above...on the PA Department of Agriculture CVI (Form AAI-113 Rev. 7/18) accredited veterinarians simply need to:
- Check "OTHER" and write in box number 5;
- Write the animal's color in box number 14;
- Record gender in box number 16;
- Record age in box number 17; and
- Record either "llama" or "alpaca" in box number 15 *In addition to veterinarians including all forms of identification present on their CVI, they are encouraged to write down any distinguishing markings that are present on the animal or include a photo to accompany the CVI.

Guidelines for care of animals

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical. Some guidelines for the treatment of animals exhibited at the fairgrounds are as follows:

Restraining Animals:

- Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way.
- Animals should be tied so all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand comfortably and lie down.
- Animals should be tied so they cannot injure animals tied near them.
- Animals unaccustomed to each other should not be penned together.

Handling - any type of rough handling which could harm the animal is prohibited. The use of whips, canes, and show sticks should be restricted to showing only and then be used only to guide, not punish the animals. The animals will respond quicker and better to quiet, gentle handling, than loud, rough handling. **Bedding** - all animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding, such as carpet is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.

Feeding & Water - animals should be well fed and have access to clean water regularly. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disqualified from the event.

Transportation - animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well-being.

Blanket/sweat collars - any type of material such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking, or lying down.

Health - it is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If medication is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.

Note: ALL LIVESTOCK are ONLY allowed in the show area, wash rack are OR their designated barn. Anyone taking an animal BEYOND these areas will loose premiums and NOT allowed to show in future fairs. <u>MUST</u> have authorization to leave designated areas.

EXHIBITOR ETHICS GUIDELINES

IMPORTANT TO ALL EXHIBITORS - EVERYONE MUST READ! SECTION 1 - IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

- Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classed of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics", fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.
- All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibitions in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations, and rules. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample is taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medications, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved, and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden of proof on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except the external application of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. This application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

EXHIBITOR ETHICS GUIDELINES SECTION 2 - P.D.C.A. SHOWING CODE OF ETHICS (COURTESY OF P.D.C.A.)

- The showing of registered dairy cattle is an important part of the promotion, merchandising, and breeding program of many breeders. Additionally, it is an important part of the program of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association to stimulate and sustain interest in breeding registered dairy cattle. This relates to both spectators and exhibitors. In this connection, the P.D.C.A. believes that it is in the best interests of the breeders of registered dairy cattle to maintain a reputation of integrity and to present a wholesome and progressive image of their cattle in the show ring. It is recognized that there are certain practices in the proper care and management of dairy cattle, which are advisable to keep them in a sound, healthy condition so that they might be presented in the show ring in a natural, normal appearance and condition. Conversely, it recognizes certain practices in the cataloging, handling, and presentation of cattle in the show ring which are unacceptable.
- The following practices or procedures are considered unacceptable and defined as being unethical in the showing of registered dairy cattle:
- 1. Misrepresenting the age and/or milking status of the animal for the class in which it is shown. In any female classes, animals may not be exhibited that are in milk due to an unnaturally induced lactation.
- 2. Balancing the udder by any means other than by leaving naturally produced milk in any or all quarters.
- 3. Setting the teats with a mechanical contrivance.
- 4. Treating or massaging any part of the animal's body, particularly the udder, internally or externally with an irritant, counter-irritant, or other substance to temporarily improve conformation or produce unnatural animation.
- 5. Minimizing the effect of crampiness by feeding or injecting drugs, depressants or applying packs, or using any artificial contrivance or therapeutic treatment except normal exercise.
- 6. Blocking the nerves to the foot to prevent limping by injecting drugs.
- 7. Striking the animal to cause swelling in a depressed area.
- 8. Surgery of any kind performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, hide, or hair. Not included is the removal of warts, teats, and horns, clipping and dressing of hair, and trimming of hooves.
- 9. Insertion of foreign material under the skin.
- 10. Changing the color of hair at any point, spot, or area on the animal's body.
- 11. The use of alcoholic beverages in the feed or administered as a drench.
- 12. Administration of a drug of any kind or description either internally or externally prior to entering the show ring, except for treating a recognized disease or injury and for tranquilizing females in heat. For the purpose of this Code, the term "drug" shall mean any substance, the sale, possession, or use of which is controlled by license under federal, state, or local laws or regulations; and any substance commonly used by the medical or veterinary professions which affects the circulatory, respiratory, or central nervous system of a cow.
- 13. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, show management, or other exhibitors while in the show ring or other conduct detrimental to the breed or show.

In keeping with the basic philosophy of the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association, ethics are an individual responsibility of the owner or each animal shown. Violations of this Code are subject to the disciplinary provisions of the appropriate dairy breed association and/or show management.









Livestock

GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1.Be sure to read the HEALTH RULES and GENERAL RULES as they also apply.
- 2.NEW REQUIREMENT Be sure to read and comply with the Exhibitor Ethics Guidelines
- 3. All animals must be on the grounds during the times specified in the rules or they will not be allowed to participate in any classes. If due to an emergency situation you cannot meet the arrival time, contact the barn chairpersons and/or Fair Office with the estimated time of arrival.
- 4.No youth under the age of 21 will be permitted to stay overnight on the fairgrounds without **PARENTAL** supervision and camping permission.
- 5. No appliances used for heating or cooking will be allowed in the barns.
- 6.Dogs will NOT be allowed on the fairgrounds except to aid the handicapped or to be part of an exhibit or scheduled show.
- 7. NO SMOKING in or around the barns.
- 8. Campers and trailers must park in areas designated by the department chairpersons, based on space availability. There is a fee for campers requiring electricity and/or water. The fee is payable, and permits are available, at the Fair Office. The fee is waived for livestock exhibitors who live more than 25 miles from the fairgrounds.
- 9.Exhibitors are responsible for cleaning pens on the last night of the fair. Non-compliance will result in a loss of premiums.
- 10. All livestock and small animals must be stabled, penned, caged, or cooped in the barns, remain on the Fairgrounds for the entire fair, and may not be removed before 8 pm on Sunday, September 13th. In the event an exhibitor lives more than 1 hour away, more than 25 miles away, or must make 2 trips, the exhibitor must request prior approval from the department chairperson if an exemption to this rule is needed. In cases of emergency or an act of God, the release may be granted by the chairperson of the livestock committee. Failure to abide by this rule will result in forfeiture of ribbons and premiums and may affect your privilege to enter your livestock and small animals at future fairs.

- 2. No horse or pony shall be entitled to a premium unless serviceably sound.
- 3. A copy of your negative coggins, rabies certification, and breed registration papers must be sent in with your entry form. Entries are not considered accepted until all paperwork and payment have been received.
- 4. Entries are accepted in the order received and the barn is filled in this order. Open Class entries will be accepted according to the dates listed on the entry form. No entries will be accepted after the deadlines.
- 5. All exhibitors must furnish their own hay, grain, and bedding. The stall must be stripped before leaving the fairgrounds. YOU MUST FURNISH YOUR OWN STALL CLEANING EQUIPMENT.

BARN RULES

- 1.Barn is closed between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. with the exception of Saturday. Saturday the barn will open at 6:00 a.m. NO ONE shall be in the barn during "closed hours".
- 2. The ring will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. pending the show ring schedule of events.
- 3. Riding boots or hard-soled shoes with heels are required at all times when working in the ring. Regulation Hard Hats are required at all times. No bareback riding on the grounds.

- 1. Purebred animals must be recorded in Registry Association for the respective breed. Animals with papers pending will not be allowed in the show ring. All animals must have registration certificates issued by one of the following breed associations: American Guernsey Association, American Jersey Cattle club, American Milking Shorthorn Society, Ayrshire Breeders Association, Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders Association, Holstein Association of America, or Red & White Dairy Cattle Association Jerseys: Animals with Genetic Recovery (fully registered) certificates are eligible. This does not include Original Animals (OAF) or Provisional Registry (PR) animals. Guernseys: Females in step 4 of the Genetic Recovery program are eligible. Step four females have a "PR" prefix in their name. No other prefixes are eligible. Holsteins: Any animal identified with Holstein Association, USB, Inc., that is 87% or higher Registered Holstein Ancestry (RHEA) is eligible. Previous animals identified as Qualified Entry (QED) animals are eligible. Eligible animals will have a Qualified Holstein certificate with a red border. Only QED animals with a red-border certificate (fourth generation) will be eligible. Green certificates or IF certificates are not eligible. Red & White Dairy Cattle Association: These animals must be true red in hair color and have a registration certificate from the Red & White Dairy Cattle Association (ph# 814-735-4221). Registration certificates from other breeds will not be accepted for the Red & White classes. Brown Swiss: Step IJ IE Identity Enrollment animals which have a 379 plus six-digit registration number are eligible to be shown. The registration certificate is green with a black border. Milking Shorthorn: Cattle must have full herdbook six-digit Milking Shorthorn Registry Certificates. Tattoo numbers must correspond with registry certificates. Milking Shorthorn females with nine-digit Birth Record certificates (beginning with 36,000 or 37,000) are not eligible to show. Canadian registry certificates will not be accepted.
- 2. All animals must be owned by the exhibitor 30 days prior to this show. No dairy animal born after May 31, 2021, may be shown.
- 3. The Dairy Superintendent reserves the right of declining to receive any entry. Furthermore, the Dairy Superintendent reserves the right to bar from competition animals of decidedly inferior conformation of type, and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
- 4.No exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with the Judge while awards are being done, except to answer questions proposed by the Judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the Judge while making awards shall forfeit any premium to which he would otherwise be entitled.
- 5.No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged except judge, Superintendent, and necessary attendants.
- 6. Where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered, the Judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the animals deserve.
- 7.In the event of no competition in any class, a ribbon and premium is awarded at the discretion of the Judge.
- 8.Responsibility for accident The Fair Association shall not be responsible for any accident which may occur to any animal

- exhibited at the show, the exhibitor shall hold it blameless and indemnify it against any legal proceeding arising from any such accident.
- 9. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position, if, in the opinion of the Judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
- 10. The management reserves the right to withhold premiums awarded in any case in which it appears that the regulations have not been complied with, or that fraud or deception have been practiced or attempted.
- 11. The decision of the Judges shall be final in all cases, except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proved. In such cases, the Dairy Superintendent, Manager, or Secretary of the Fair or such referee as he may appoint may make the decision, or with his approval, the case may be appealed to the Fair Management or Show Commission, from whose the decision there can be no appeal. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify the animal from competition.
- 12. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter, and in charge by owner or employee.
- 13. Premiums will be paid only on classes listed in catalog.
- 14. All entries subject to available space.
- 15. ANYONE protesting must put the protest in writing with \$25 and submit it to the Dairy Show Committee before the class is pinned (awarded ribbons).
- 16. If proper conduct is not displayed by exhibitors, they will be asked to leave and will be disqualified from further showings.
- 17. Substitution If an animal entered in unable to show, a substitute is allowed only in the same class.
- 18. No Exhibitor or his/her agent may associate with any judge prior to judging of articles or animals that said exhibitors may have entered.
- 19. Exhibitors will be expected to display or parade their animals as directed by the chairperson; to accept the stall assigned without controversy; to keep their animals in an attractive appearance; & to cooperate with the Department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show.
- 20. Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves as to when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call and a failure to comply with the order renders exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competing.
- 21. Decorations with ribbons or ornaments previously won by animals at shows shall be prohibited until after the awards have been made in their respective classes by the judge.
- 22. The exhibitors will be expected to keep the space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and to remove all their equipment promptly as the chairperson may direct.
- 23. All entry applications must be accompanied by the registration name and number of the animal and the names of the owner, breeder, sire, and dam.
- 24. Registration papers and health certificates must accompany the animal and must be checked and approved before the animal can be unloaded at the fairgrounds.
- 25. Exhibitors will furnish hay and bedding.
- 26. Exhibitors are limited to 10 animals per breed, 15 maximum from same farm unit.
- 27. When there are less than 5 exhibitors of a breed, premiums will be paid although prizes and/or awards may not be presented.

SECTION 3 4-H And Vocational Dairy Cattle Rules and Regulations

4-H Dairy Club member with animals enrolled in the leasing program prior to May 1 of the project year must follow the leasing rules and are eligible to show at the Luzerne County Fair. The Luzerne County Fair follows the Pennsylvania 4-H Code of Conduct for 4-H volunteer leaders and 4-H members.

Health Rules listed under "Dairy" apply to 4-H and vocational cattle.

Entries must be filled out for 4-H and F.F.A classes with a separate entry for open classes.

4-H classes will be judged in conjunction with the Open classes and placed according to each department and breed.

All animals entered in group classes must have been shown in a previous class, To qualify for any "Bred and Owned" class, an animal may be co-owned and co-bred by no more than two owners/breeders. However, at least on of the owners must be listed as a breeder on the registration paper or have the use of the breeder's prefix.



WHAT'S THE REAL PURPOSE OF YOUTH(4-H & FFA) LIVESTOCK PROJECTS

One purpose is to teach young people how to feed, fit and show their animals. The more important purpose is to provide an opportunity for personal growth and development of the young person.

The Josephson Institute of Ethics has developed a curriculum which identifies six core values which may help to better describe the value of youth livestock projects. This curriculum also presents the idea that people develop and strengthen character by practicing certain behaviors just as muscles are built through exercise. Therefore, the purpose of the youth livestock program (4-H & FFA) is to provide opportunities for young people to develop character. The character traits identified and some practices (exercises) that may build character follow:

- A) **Trustworthiness** includes honesty, promise keeping and loyalty * daily feeding, watering of animals (promise keeping) * adheres to possession deadlines (honesty) *adheres to withdrawal times on drugs and de-wormer * only the appropriate use of approved drugs
- B) **Respect** includes courtesy and proper treatment of people and things * proper handling of animals, treat humanely * proper care of animals * listens to and follows advice of advisors * recognizes that animal projects are dependent on 4-H'er and provides daily feed and water
- C) **Responsibility** includes the pursuit of excellence, accountability and perseverance * daily feeding and watering (even on the busy, difficult days) * goes beyond providing the daily needs of the animal in giving additional time and attention to produce a winner * adheres to deadlines for entry forms and for arrival at livestock shows * never gives up in the show ring (perseverance)
- D) Fairness involves consistently applying rules and standard appropriately for different age groups and ability levels * feed only approved livestock rations * only the appropriate use of approved drugs * accepts winning or losing with grace * conduct in the show ring follows recommended procedure * fitting and grooming of animals follows recommended procedures
- E) **Caring** promoting the well being of people and things in a young person's world. It denotes action and not just feelings. * daily feeding and watering * provides clean barn/stall for animal * treats animal humanely at all times
- F) Citizenship includes making the home community and county a better place to live for themselves and others * accepting instructions * winning and losing with grace * helping others at stock shows * teaching younger members * treating animals humanely * ensuring that your meat animal is safe for consumption



- 4. Read premium material carefully, following all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for 5 specimens be sure to exhibit that number. Do not enter 4 or 6! An incorrect number of specimens will result in disqualification.



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



A completed owner-endorsed avian health certificate or a certificate of veterinary inspection must accompany all avian species and their hatching eggs to an exhibition. The certificate must be presented to exhibition management prior to cooping of the birds or display of hatching eggs. This certificate must be endorsed with the bird owner's signature. 3. Verification of Testing for all poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, game birds (such as pheasants, partridge, quail, grouse and guineas), ratites, and hatching eggs (All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or a Category II Accredited Veterinarian):

A. Avian Influenza testing and verification:

- i. National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) protocols for sample collection, including the number of swabs/tube of viral transport media (see vi and vii below), and testing shall be followed. All samples must be tested at a NAHLN laboratory.
- ii. All poultry, including chickens, turkeys, waterfowl, game birds, and ratites, and their hatching eggs must originate from a flocking which a minimum of 30 birds, three (3) weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 30 days prior to opening date of the exhibition.
- iii. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, all birds of age must be tested.
- vi. Test results must be negative.
- v. All poultry and
 - hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent test report (photocopies are acceptable).
- vi. Chickens, turkeys, game birds, and ratites may meet the requirements with blood testing or tracheal/oropharyngeal swab testing. If swab samples are collected, swabs from different species --e.g. chickens and turkeys--may not be combined in a tube of viral transport media (BHI). If 5 or fewer swabs are collected per tube are collected, the swab tips may be left in the tube. If between 5 and 11 swabs are collected per tube, swirl the swab tip in the BHI liquid, press the swab tip against the inner surface of the tube to move excess material into the tube, and discard the swab in a bio-secure manner.
- vii. Waterfowl such as ducks and geese must be tested with cloacal swab samples. Swabs from different species --e.g. ducks and geese may not be combined in a tube of viral transport media (BHI). Up to 5 swabs may be placed per tube for waterfowl testing. Swab tips may be left in the tube.
- viii. Poultry not meeting the testing requirements shall not be comingled with or added to the tested flock after negative samples have been collected and before poultry or hatching eggs enter the exhibition.

B. Pullorum-Typhoid Testing and Verification:

- i. National Animal Health Laboratory Network (NAHLN) protocols for sample collection and testing shall be followed.
- ii. Poultry, including chickens, turkeys, game birds, and ratites (waterfowl excluded), and their hatching eggs: (1). Must originate from a flock currently enrolled, tested and in good standing in the NPIP Pullorum-typhoid Clean Program, with no break in the chain of ownership by NPIP participants, and the poultry or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent laboratory test report or 9-3 form (Report of Sales of Hatching Eggs, Chicks, or Poults) which includes the NPIP number, or NPIP form 9-2 (Flock Selecting and Testing Report) for the rapid whole blood agglutination plate test which includes the NPIP number (photocopies are acceptable); or (2). Must originate from a flock currently enrolled, tested, and in good standing on the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program with no break in the chain of ownership by program participants, and the poultry or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent laboratory test report which includes the program enrollment number, or state rapid whole blood agglutination plate test which includes the program enrollment number (photocopies are acceptable); or (3). All individual poultry, including chickens, turkeys, game birds, and ratites (waterfowl excluded), or poultry providing hatching eggs (maximum of 300 from a flock) entering a Pennsylvania exhibition must have had a pullorum-typhoid test within (90) days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The poultry or hatching eggs must be accompanied by the most recent testing report; or the Department's rapid test reporting form for the rapid whole blood agglutination plate test for pullorum-typhoid performed on non-NPIP birds (photocopies are acceptable): (4). Test results must be negative. (5). The following age restrictions apply for pullorum-typhoid testing. Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older. Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older. Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first . Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older. Poultry which is individually tested for pullorum for exhibition must have a negative pullorum test if of age at the time of entry into the exhibition All birds not meeting these age restrictions are exempt from pullorum-typhoid testing requirements.


