

Some Thoughts from Me —Rev. David Williams



See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?

I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland.
(Isaiah 43:19)

Pastors like to joke about the things they never taught us in seminary. A colleague of mine, serving her first appointment at a church lacking indoor plumbing discovered that part of the pastor's job was to take the roll of toilet paper out to the outhouse every Sunday morning and bring it back in after service. They never taught us that in seminary. A church where I pastored held an annual fundraiser called "The Ironman Competition," where the men of the church would don costumes and compete to see who could iron the most shirts in a set period of time. And while I won the competition two years in a row, they never taught us about that in seminary. (And no, you can't see the pictures of my costume. Somethings are better left unseen.) There are no courses for what to do if a parishioner passes out from the heat in the middle of the service. No courses on how to go about installing an elevator. And no courses on what to do if a global pandemic shuts everything down. They just never taught us about this stuff.

This past Sunday I had the chance to experience another aspect of ministry for which seminary had nothing to say. I stood in an empty

sanctuary, looking out at empty seats, and preached to a camera. Julie and I sang to a camera. And when we were done we shut down the camera, turned off the lights, and went home. It was without a doubt the weirdest and loneliest thing I have ever done as a minister. I was not alone. I have had the chance to talk with several of my colleagues in Enfield (through the wonder of on-line meetings) who experienced the same thing. And yet, even in the midst of the loneliness, in the midst of the isolation, we can see God doing something new, and it is amazing.

There are a variety of numbers that are made available to people who live stream. We can learn how many people were on at the same time at any given point in time. We are told how many individual computers accessed the stream at any point in time. We are told how long they watched on average. Of course we have no idea who these numbers represent, or where they live. But it allows us to have some idea of how successful we are being. Based on these numbers we were very successful on our first week of on-line worship. 83 computers accessed us at some point, and we are aware that in several of these homes there was more than one person watching. And we know that people have downloaded and viewed at least part of the service after it was over. And judging from the conversations that were taking place in the chat room during the service, it seems like people had a good time.

Some Thoughts , cont. Was it perfect? No. Was it a great first effort? I think so. Will it help us make it through this period of isolation? I think so. At least it will *help*. It is not the whole answer. We will continue to tinker with the sound, the picture, and the content of the service. But clearly God has provided something new and wonderful in our lives. Just think about our shut-ins and homebound who are able to worship with us now, and who will be able to continue worshipping with us when this crisis is over and we return to church.

Of course, Sunday morning technology alone that will get us through. Phone lines, Instant Messaging, Facebook, text messages, and e-mail are all being used to allow us to stay connected during this period of being separated. Those who can have made themselves available to run errands for those who cannot. The same technology that allows me to connect with my colleagues will allow us to continue to see to the business of being the Church. We are exploring ways to do a Bible Study using Zoom. Clearly God is doing something new and wonderful in our lives. It is springing forth even as we hunker down, and it is wonderful to behold.

I don't know what our church will look like when this is all over. Certainly we will be different in big and little ways. I know I will cherish the fellowship a little more and will not take your presence on Sunday for granted. We know that God causes all things to work together for the good of those who love Him. This virus issue is not different. God has already begun doing something new and amazing in our lives.

I look forward to the day I can look out and see you sitting in the pews. I look forward to gathering with you for Coffee Fellowship, monthly dinners, and Friday morning breakfasts. I look forward to returning to Bible Studies and the laughter and fellowship we enjoy in those settings. And I look forward to hearing our preschool in full operation again. Until that day arrives, please continue to listen to the advice from the experts. Stay inside. Stay safe. And know that you matter.
