Some Thoughts from Me —Rev. David Williams

From time to time I receive special e-mails from our Annual Conference. Some of these are from the Bishop, some are from our District Superintendent. Others originate with one of the program agencies that are so important to our Conference. One recently crossed my desk that got my attention, and I want to share it with you.

It came from the Committee on Finance and Administration and challenged people to make a difference by foregoing one cup of coffee every day for the month of December. The challenge went like this. Give up one cup of coffee every day for the month and put the money you would have spent on that cup aside. At the end of the month put that money in the plate to help pay our Mission Shares. Their estimate was that each cup of coffee was worth \$3, which I thought was a little high. After all, you can get decent coffee at McDonalds for a buck. If we split the difference and set aside \$2 each day, that would amount to \$60 for the month of December. If we could get 50 persons to take this challenge, that would amount to \$3,000 towards Mission Shares.

This is an important challenge, because we, as a congregation, are painfully behind on our Mission Shares giving. And Mission Shares are so vital to our denomination and our Annual Conference. Mission Shares funds church camps, educational opportunities,

new church starts, and mission programs such as Salem Economic Ministries. Mission Shares help churches that are struggling to pay their pastor and keep their doors open. Mission Shares reach out beyond our borders to make a difference around the globe. As I said, it's an important challenge.

Now I never like to put out a challenge like this and not participate myself. I don't drink coffee, so this challenge does not work for me. But I am looking into where I do spend my money so that I might also find a way to set aside \$2 each day. Advent and Christmas are truly the season for giving. I hope you will join in the holiday spirit by giving up that one cup of coffee and making a difference.



Entirely (Pledge) Envelopes

As we approach a new year, please note some changes being made regarding the weekly collection envelopes. Beginning next 2020 our envelope numbers will only go up to #150. Those of you who have had higher numbers will be reassigned a number within that range. We are sorry for any inconvenience this may pose but it is a good decision for the church for two reasons: 1. It is a substantial savings monetarily. 2. It lessons our ecological footprint by having less to recycle. New envelopes will be available in December.

When you use your envelope please indicate you monetary distribution in the spaces provided. Also include your name. Many of you have indicated your wishes on your pledge form. You should know that the counters only have the envelopes to work with. What is written there is the only information the counters have; it is also the only information that the financial secretary has been recording the individual accounts.



Please indicate your envelope number on your check; if cash, write CASH on the envelope.

If you send in your pledge without the church envelope, please be sure you indicate where you would like the funds recorded. If possible, use the church envelopes to simplify it for you and the church personnel.

There is a dedicated group of church members who record the envelope information on a weekly basis. Please to all that you can to ease their job. Also, if you are turning your envelop at church please do not seal or tape it.

Please note, the envelopes are saved for a number of years as part of the financial records. Having complete information is important for you personally and for the church. HUMC thanks you for your contributions. We want to sure your wishes are met and recorded properly.

It seems as I get older the years are just flying by! This year, 2019, was no exception. It's almost in the history books and the holidays are fast approaching. This year just seemed to

fly by with all the activities, meetings, campouts, community service projects, new faces, and Yawgoog summer camp that the scouts and leaders participated in! Troop 108 is in full throttle planning for more adventures for 2020 with our scouts and their leaders.

November's campout was at Yawgoog Scout Reservation in Rockville, Rhode Island. This is the camp we attend our week long summer camp at for the last 34 years. Ten scouts and 7 leaders, along with 5 Webelos and their parents from Pack 391 spent a weekend participating in many outdoor scout skills which included first aid, lashings & knot tying, fire building using "Fritos" (yes the snack food Fritos Corn Chips), hand sanitizer and pine cones, and a enjoyed a complete Thanksgiving Meal in the field. The Boy Scouts worked with the Webelos Scouts to finish up some requirements for their Arrow of Light award – the highest award a Webelos Scout can earn and the only Cub Scout award that can be worn on their Boy Scout uniform. Several scouts also completed requirements for Rank Advancement and Merit Badges that can only be accomplished outdoors. New friendships were established that hopefully will last a lifetime.

On Sunday October 26, 2019 Troop 108 and Pack 391 placed 1600+ US Flags on the graves of veterans in St. Patrick's Cemetery. Troop 108 has a deep commitment to honor our veterans and we welcome opportunities to assist in these types of events. A flag was also placed on the grave of William Munsell, Sr., as the troop remembers Mr. Munsell not only for his 73 years of service to Scouting and a lifetime member of the HUMC, but as one of the original 14 founding members of Troop 108 in 1938 and his wartime service during WWII and Korea.

And speaking of 1938, this coming year of 2020 will see Troop 108 celebrate 82 years of continuous operations! On January 12, 2020 we will celebrate our 82nd year of Chartered Membership with the Boy Scouts and also our 82nd year of proud sponsorship by the HUMC! Part of that milestone is the annual Scout Sunday Mass and Banquet which is scheduled for January 12, 2020.

December's campout will be our traditional Video Games overnighter and Wreaths Across America Ceremony. Also an after-hours activity promoting team building will be held. This campout rewards the scouts for their hard work on Scouting Skills throughout the year. The troop invites the HUMC Families to join us on Saturday December 14, 2019 for the wreath laying ceremonies at St. Patrick's Cemetery on Enfield Street on the graves of our deceased Veterans. In addition a Christmas Wreath will be placed on the grave of Bill Munsell at the Enfield Street Cemetery following the ceremonies at St. Patrick's. Bill was a veteran whose wartime service spanned WW II and Korea. Troop 108 and the Tanguay – McGill American Legion Post 80 also place a Christmas Wreath on the graves of the namesakes of Post 80.

The troop is looking forward to participating in the HUMC annual Cookie Walk on Saturday December 14, 2019. This is a great fundraiser for the HUMC and our troop eagerly looks forward to participating and enjoying the many
