Some Thoughts from Me —Rev. David Williams



This past Sunday, as I looked over the prayer cards that had been placed into the offering plate, I was struck by one in particular. Each week there are cards asking for prayers for someone who is sick, facing or recovering from surgery, or dealing with the loss of a loved one. Some of the prayers are for family members, some for friends and neighbors, and others for co-workers. There are often cards seeking prayers for events on a more national or international scale. There are also cards that lift up the joy and celebration of answered prayer, birthdays and anniversaries, or some other milestone event in our lives. **But this card was different.** It lifted up the simple joy of being able to come in to the church and work in the sanctuary, and it got me to thinking.

In the Book of Lamentations the prophet Jeremiah writes, “*The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning: great is your faithfulness.*” 3:22-23) You and I are blessed every single day. It is easy to spot the big blessings—the birth of a baby, a new job, a marriage, being certified cancer free. It is easy to spot the big blessings because they are so important. But there are other blessings that we (or at least I) often miss; blessings that are smaller; blessings without which life

would be far less sweet.

The recent clothing sale brought many of us together to do the work of setting up, sorting, selling, and tearing down. The laughter and fellowship that took place during that time was a blessing indeed. The new fellowship dinners that we have been holding have also been a blessing as church members and families from outside our church gather together to enjoy a meal and watch children play. Every Sunday we are blessed by a choir that never fails to touch our soul with their offering. Trunk or Treat, the Living Nativity, decorating the sanctuary for Christmas, the Christmas Pageant, and the Christmas Eve Candlelight Service all bless us with their laughter, fellowship, and the depth of feelings they evoke. And of course, just the fellowship—the love and support—that we enjoy by belonging to this family of Jesus Christ is a powerful daily blessing in and of itself. Truly Jeremiah was right, God’s blessings are new every morning; his faithfulness is unmatched.

Every day you and I have the opportunity to pray to a God who has promised to listen to those prayers and answer them. Every day you and I have the opportunity to enjoy just the simple act of working, playing, and worshipping in this place. Every day you and I experience the blessings of a loving God,

who delights in amazing us—not just in the big things, but in the hundreds and thousands of small blessings that give life its flavor.

That prayer card reminded me of how blessed I am to simply walk through these doors every day and simply be your pastor. It reminded me of how blessed I am to have HUMC be “my congregation.” It reminded me that blessings come in all shapes and sizes, and that to only focus on the big blessings risks missing the joy of the small. What an awesome God we serve.

How has God blessed you today? It’s true, you know. His blessings are new every day. They are out there waiting to be discovered. They are out there waiting to lift your spirits and renew your hope. I hope you go looking for them and I hope you find them. And may God bless you in the journey.



Pancake Breakfast



Troop 108 – November 2019

Greetings from Troop 108 – the oldest continuously operating troop in Enfield for 81 years! With the days getting shorter and nights becoming cooler it surely an indication of fall weather that is approaching and many outdoor scout activities on the calendar.

Troop meetings have started and the 24 scouts are involved in many activities. In October the scouts will hold Troop Elections to elect new boy leaders. These boy leaders will continue with the planning and execution of the activities thru to the next Troop Elections in March 2020. This election process will give the scouts a good lesson in civic responsibility as we prepare to vote in our local elections in November. Stay tuned for next month’s edition of Steeple Tidings to learn of the election results.

September’s camp out was held at Hurd State Park in East Hampton, CT. The campout theme was Backpacking and Trail Meals. Camping, Cooking, & First Aid activities were also featured at the campout. The scouts also completed outdoor skills towards their next rank advancement.

October’s campout will be to the Troiano Property in Rhode Island. The program is still being developed but we are looking at a few merit badges that we could complete.

October will also see our 1st Court of Honor and a Halloween Party. The Court of Honor will recognize scouts who have earned awards since the June Court of Honor – a majority of those awards were earned at Yawgoog Summer Camp 2019. The Halloween Party will feature our scouts and their families dressed up in their “scariest” costumes and participate in several “creepy” and “ghoulish” games.

November’s Campout will be held at Yawgoog Scout Reservation in Rockville Rhode Island. This campout will feature visits from a Webelos den from a local pack as they visit various troops in Enfield prior to crossing over. Cooking skills will be the theme of the weekend and will culminate with our Troop’s Annual Thanksgiving Dinner in the field complete with homemade Pumpkin Pies. The scouts will be able to get several 2nd and 1st Class Rank Requirements for Cooking signed off after this weekend. In addition, scouts working on the Cooking Merit Badge will be able to get requirements signed off as well.

In late October the troop will be placing flags on the graves of veterans at St. Patrick’s Cemetery for Veteran’s Day. This is part of our Community Service honoring some of the deceased veterans who are buried in Enfield. It shows respect not only for those veterans but for the flag and country they served. Over 1400+ flags will be placed this fall on Saturday 26 October 2019.

The troop is also preparing for the annual Wreaths Across America Ceremony to be held at St. Patrick’s cemetery on Saturday December 14, 2019. This ceremony will also tie in to our December Campout famously called “Video Campout” as the scouts relax and enjoy playing video games. The scouts work hard over the course of the year and they asked many years ago to have one campout to do “what they want” so the December Video Game Campout was established. It’s a fun campout that is supporting a worthwhile cause with the Wreath Ceremony.

Troop 108 wants to thank all who recently purchased a Mum’s Plant during our sale. The proceeds that the scouts earn directly go into their scout account to help pay for fees, campouts, uniforms, camping equipment, etc. The 9th point of the Scout Law is “Thrifty” – a scouts earns money to pay his own way.

We are looking forward to seeing everyone at Troop 108's Pasta Dinner on Saturday September 21, 2019. The event is being held at the Mt. Carmel Hall from 5-7:30 PM. And tickets for this event are just \$5 for HUMC parishioners!! For more information or to purchase tickets please contact Kerry Fracasso.

And speaking of Kerry, please extend congratulations when you see him as he became Troop 108's 91st Eagle Scout on August 26, 2019! Kerry worked hard and successfully completed all requirements for the rank of Eagle Scout. His Eagle Service Project was to refurbish a room in the HUMC that now is useable space for storage and other activities.

As the Marine Corp's recruiting slogan says "we are looking for a few good men", so as Troop 108 is always" looking for a few good young men" who would like to become a Boy Scout. Troop 108 does accept new scouts (or scouts looking to transfer from another troop or have relocated to the area) at any time of the year. 


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Sermon Series



They need our love and acceptance, our support and dedication, seeing those around them as positive role models, having someone who will give them “time” and “listen” to what they are saying. The children of HWG are lucky to have so many in this church who truly care for them. This includes the HWG staff, the HUMC workers and you, its parishioners. Thank you for your support and most importantly for your prayers.

November is a time for thanksgiving. It is a time to celebrate with family and friends, a time to share and be grateful for the many blessings we have been given. May each of you have a wonderful holiday filled with all the joy of the season.


