Prayer Challenge

Where are we going as a church? Where should we be going? Where is God leading us? And what will it all look like? Those are questions that the leadership of this church is wrestling with. Our mission is to "Share the love of Jesus Christ with each other and the world" but just what does it look like and how do we go about it? One thing seems certain; we may need to change some things about how we operate and how we worship. And we all know that change, on any level, is difficult and sometimes painful. That is why we are inviting every member of the church to enter into a 30 day period of prayer over this. For the month of October (okay, that's 31 days instead of 30) we are asking every member of the church to engage in daily prayer; asking God to reveal what we need to be doing to be the church God is calling us to be. By bathing this issue in prayer we hope to see more clearly who and what we are to be and how we should go about achieving that goal. The Church Council began this challenge at their last meeting in September, and we have already seen some results as God, who is faithful, begins to answer our prayers. One month. 31 days. Just think of the possibilities.

"Ask, and it will be given you; seek, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who seeks finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened."

(Matthew 7:7-8)

Some Thoughts from Me —Rev. David Williams

In many ways this is the most difficult column I have ever had to write. It is difficult because my heart is breaking as I write it. The United Methodist Church that I was born into, raised in, and joyfully serve as an ordained elder is coming apart at the seams. Despite our name we have become a people divided over a single issue; the issue of human sexuality. And what tears at my heart and my soul is the knowledge that despite our best efforts we here in Hazardville will probably be swept up in the fight. Let me explain.

It was at the quadrennial General Conference of 1972 that language was inserted into our Book of Discipline that called homosexuality "incompatible with Christian teaching," forbade the ordination of gay persons, and implemented penalties for any pastor performing a same-sex union. Our world has changed since then as same-sex marriage has now become legal in every state and our understanding of human sexuality in all of its variations has changed. But our denomination's stance has not changed. Every four years battles would rage at General Conference over language, over tolerance, over who we are willing to allow God to use in our midst. And every four years the battle lines (an accurate term and one that breaks my heart to use) became more deeply entrenched. And at the recent specially called General Conference held this past February our

discrimination of people who are "different" was amplified. This became the breaking point for many United Methodists.

Recognizing that we have reached a breaking point, the special session of General Conference passed legislation that would allow a congregation to disassociate from The United Methodist Church for reasons of conscience. For many churches, including nearly a dozen here, in New England, that time has come. They have been meeting to develop a process for discerning where God is leading them and how God would have them respond to this issue. This plan is in keeping with the requirement that a congregation wishing to disassociate must spend eight months in a discernment process prior to leaving. As I write this they are presenting our bishop with a letter of intent to enter such a process, in effect starting the clock ticking on that eight month timeframe.

I continue to pray for our denomination, and I continue to hope that we can find a way for both the progressives and the traditionalists to coexist. I continue to look at our church and ask the question, "If we can span the spectrum of political, social, and economic opinions, if we can differ in our understanding of this and many other questions and still live, love, laugh, pray,

work, and worship together, why can't The United Methodist Church?" Can't the love of God and the

Gospel of Jesus Christ transcend our theological differences? I keep praying for these things. And yet, even as I pray I realize that the Hazardville United Methodist Church must begin to address this question. First, because should the last ditch effort to change our Discipline fail this coming February a General Conference our denomination will most assuredly split, and second, because the questions about who to welcome impacts some of our members directly. We need to talk about this issue and we need to do it in a way that allows for all to be heard and—just as importantly—all to be affirmed. That is why I am proposing that sometime in January we will begin a series of discussions using the discernment process that the churches exploring disassociation have developed. Please understand, I AM NOT SUGGESTING THAT WE DISASSOCIATE. I AM NOT PUSHING US IN ONE DIRECTION OR ANOTHER. I am merely encouraging us to have these difficult conversations in love so that we might be that light of love and fellowship that Jesus calls us to be. I am planning to use the discernment process that has been developed because I have seen it, have seen the work that went into developing it, and recognize it to be a great tool for informing and for allowing space for listening. We do not have to "start the clock ticking" to do this, and I do not intend to. But by having these conversations we expose the "elephant in the room," learn to listen to and hear each other, and perhaps grow in love with one another.

One final thing. There is no way to answer every question in a newsletter column, and I am sure that the very word "disassociate" has caused a million questions to swarm around your head. Please know my intention here is not to confuse or frighten. And please know that one of the purposes of the sessions we will be having is to answer your questions as best we can. This is merely an attempt on my part to acknowledge what is happening, to alert you to the possibility that we might be affected, and to start us on the path of a series of conversations that I hope will bless this church.

I will publish the schedule for these sessions (there will be 4-8 over a several month period) in the January Steeple Tidings. In the meantime please keep our denomination in prayer that we might find a way to truly be United as Methodists. Please keep me in prayer as I try to be a voice of reason and hope with my colleagues. And please keep our church in prayer as we continue to open our doors to ALL people, regardless of orientation or theological understanding.

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We have planned the Fall Calendar and Marc is willing to lead the charge on Dinners! We will be having Fellowship/Community Dinners at least once a month with special themes.



Greetings from Troop 108 – the oldest continuously operating troop in Enfield for 81 years! With the days getting shorter and nights becoming cooler it surely an indication of fall weather that is approaching and many outdoor scout activities on the calendar.

Troop meetings have started and the 24 scouts are involved in many activities. In October the scouts will hold Troop Elections to elect new boy leaders. These boy leaders will continue with the planning and execution of the activities thru to the next Troop Elections in March 2020. This election process will give the scouts a good lesson in civic responsibility as we prepare to vote in our local elections in November. September's camp out was held at Hurd State Park in East Hampton, CT. The campout theme was Backpacking and Trail Meals. Camping, Cooking, & First Aid activities were also featured at the campout. The scouts also completed outdoor skills towards their next rank advancement.

October's campout will be to the Troiano Property in Rhode Island. The program is still being developed but we are looking at a few merit badges that we could complete.

October will also see our 1st Court of Honor and a Halloween Party. The Court of Honor will recognize scouts who have earned awards since the June Court of Honor – a majority of those awards were earned at Yawgoog Summer Camp 2019. The Halloween Party will feature our scouts and their families dressed up in their "scariest" costumes and participate in several "creepy" and "ghoulish" games.

November's Campout will be held at Yawgoog Scout Reservation in Rockville Rhode Island. This campout will feature visits from a Webelos den from a local pack as they visit various troops in Enfield prior to crossing over. Cooking skills will be the theme of the weekend and will culminate with our Troop's Annual Thanksgiving Dinner in the field complete with homemade Pumpkin Pies. The scouts will be able to get several 2nd and 1st Class Rank Requirements for Cooking signed off after this weekend. In addition, scouts working on the Cooking Merit Badge will be able to get requirements signed off as well.

In late October the troop will be placing flags on the graves of veterans at St. Patrick's Cemetery for Veteran's Day. This is part of our Community Service honoring some of the deceased veterans who are buried in Enfield. It shows respect not only for those veterans but for the flag and country they served. Over 1400+ flags will be placed this fall on Saturday 26 October 2019.

The troop is also preparing for the annual Wreaths Across America Ceremony to be held at St. Patrick's cemetery on Saturday December 14, 2019. This ceremony will also tie in to our December Campout famously called "Video Campout" as the scouts relax and enjoy playing video games. The scouts work hard over the course of the year and they asked many years ago to have one campout to do "what they want" so the December Video Game Campout was established. It's a fun campout that is supporting a worthwhile cause with the Wreath Ceremony.

Troop 108 wants to thank all who recently purchased a Mum's Plant during our sale. The proceeds that the scouts earn directly go into their scout account to help pay for fees, campouts, uniforms, camping equipment, etc. The 9th point of the Scout Law is "Thrifty" – a scouts earns money to pay his own way.
