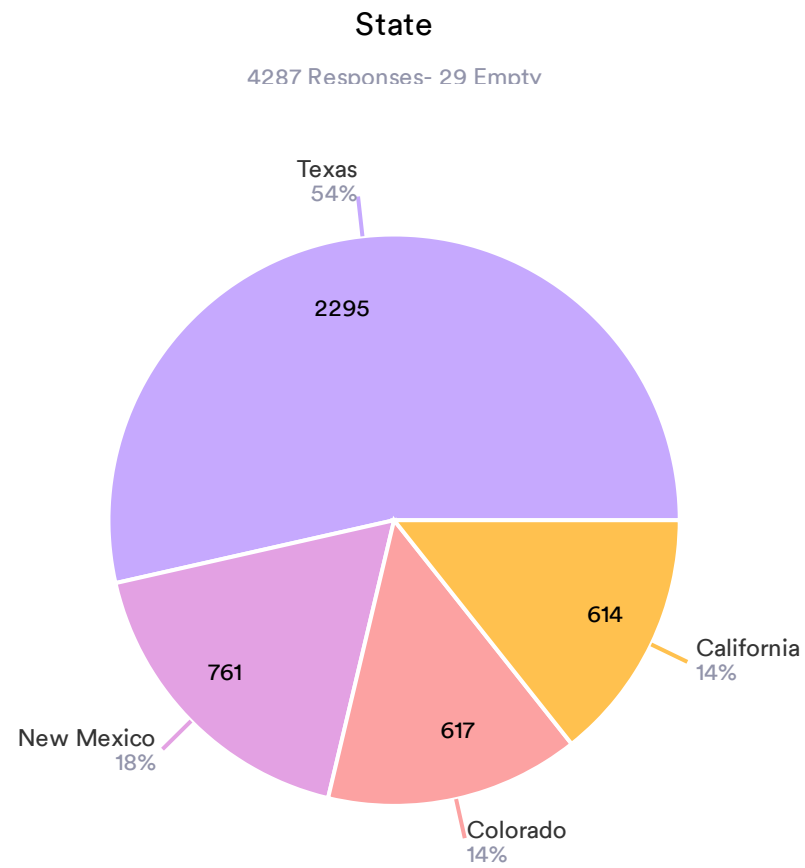


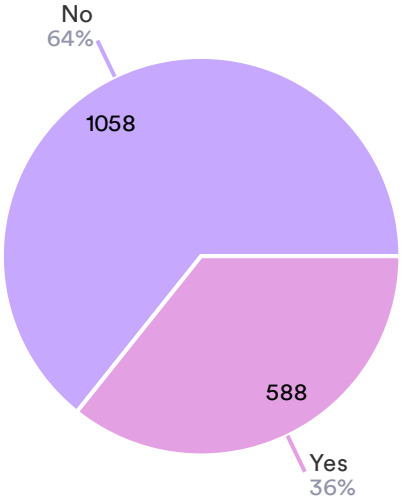

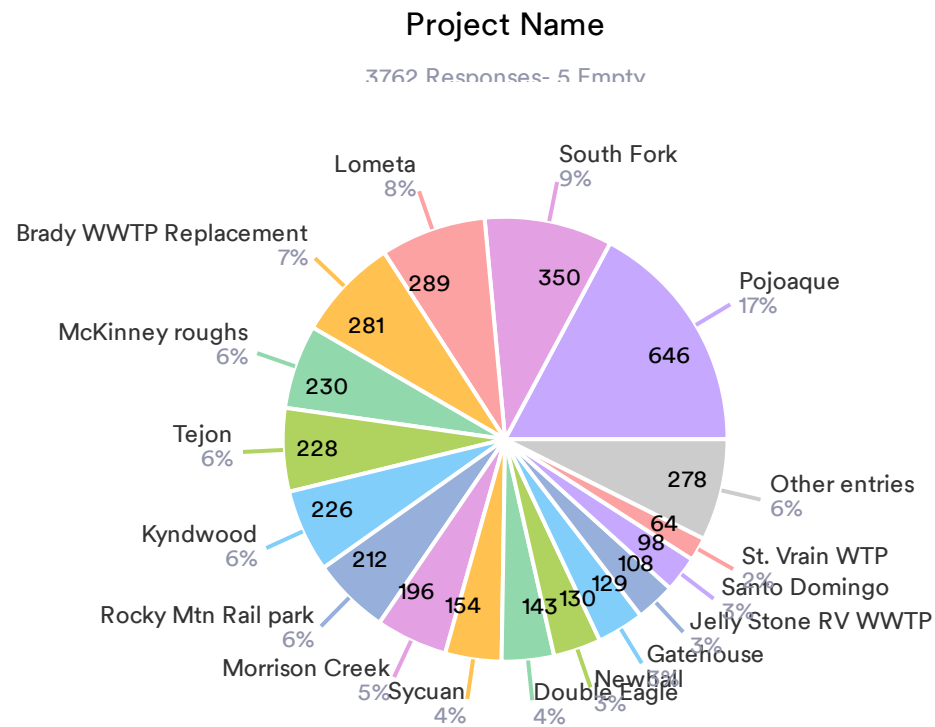

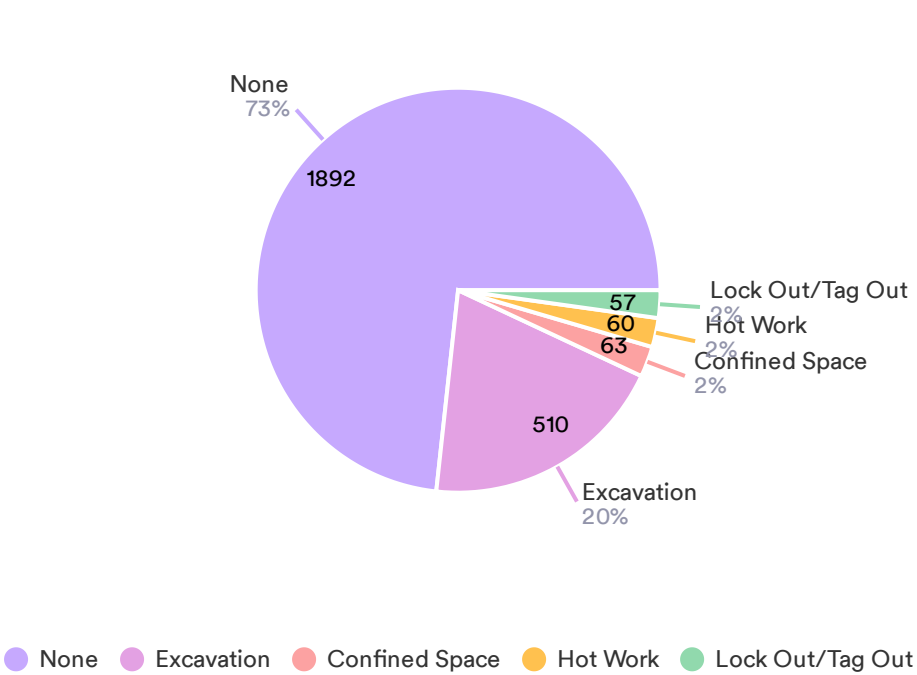

Stop Work Authority (SWA) is a critical component of a Job Hazard Assessment (JHA). It empowers workers to stop work when they identify unsafe conditions or behaviors. This chart illustrates the responses to a survey regarding SWA, showing that a majority of workers believe every worker understands the obligation to stop unsafe behaviors or conditions.

The survey results show that 52% of respondents (3,609) believe every worker understands the obligation to stop unsafe behaviors or conditions. Conversely, 48% of respondents (3,316) believe that the responsibility for stopping unsafe work lies with the individual worker, stating "You see it, you own it".

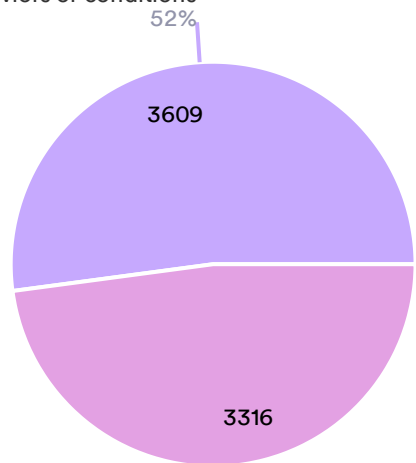
These findings highlight the importance of training and education in ensuring that all workers are fully aware of their responsibilities and the authority to stop work when necessary. This knowledge is essential for maintaining a safe and healthy work environment.
