


Accomplishments

Congratulations to Bison Local Member, Drew Bousquet on being accepted into the UofM Medicine program!


Drew has ties to the Métis community of St. Laurent Manitoba and his family names include; Wilkie, Nadeau, and Gladu.

Miigwan Creations. Citizens were invited


to join free of charge and learn the

#### **Moccasin Workshop**

### Liberty Local is sponsoring a six-week moccasin making workshop for its members and their families.

Participants are learning how to sew leather moccasins, trimmed with rabbit fur, and beaded using the one-needle bead embroidery/flat stitch technique. Participants are all provided with the same leather, fur, and bead colours and a simple pattern to bead on their moccasins (with options to bring/buy own products if wish, instructor will explain during first class). 

Alternate facilities were found at the Ralph Brown Community Centre.

Council met on April 25, 2025, and the Spring meeting was delayed to August 26, 2025. The next meeting is scheduled for October 28, 2025, at the Ralph Brown Community Centre from 7-9PM. Thereafter, Council will be holding a short meeting prior to the 2025 Christmas party to be held on December 6, 2025 from 5-9PM at the Ralph Brown CC.

The August meeting was very well attended with returning and many new citizens who were very interested in the affairs of Council and MMF.

Council appointed Esther Ducharme as our new Elder Representative, replacing Doris Hayden who retired from Council. Margaret Barron was appointed as an alternate to Esther. Council also appointed Jera Krusp as our Youth Representative, who replaced April Lavallee. Council thanked Doris and April for their support and welcomed the new representatives.

# Recipe Conner



This Fall, we invited Citizens to share their favourite seasonal dishes, celebrating the flavours and traditions that bring our Métis community together.

This cherished recipe comes from Gisèle's grandmother. Sweet, comforting, and full of memories, this classic dessert captures the warmth of Métis home cooking. Whether it's served fresh from the oven or enjoyed the next day with a cup of tea, this pie is a true taste of tradition.



### **DELICIOUS RAISIN PIE**

RECIPE BY GISÉLE SIMMONS

Simmer for 10 minutes:

2 cups dark raisins

2 cups water

Mix together: ½ cup white sugar 2 tbsp flour 1 pinch salt

Gradually add to raisins
Cook until thick

Blend in: ½ tsp vanilla 1 tbsp butter 1 tbsp lemon juice

Bake for 30 minutes at 350F Enjoy!

Nothing says fall quite like a warm bowl of homemade pumpkin soup. The Prettie Family shared this cozy recipe, a seasonal favourite that's perfect for chilly evenings and family gatherings. Creamy, comforting, and full of autumn flavour, it's a wonderful way to celebrate the harvest and enjoy the simple pleasures of the season.

### **PUMPKIN SOUP**

#### RECIPE BY THE PRETTIE FAMILY

### Ingredients:

3 pound sugar pie pumpkin, cut into 1.5"chunks & skin/seeds off

2 tablespoons butter

1 onion, chopped

2-4 garlic cloves, peeled & minced or pressed

2 teaspoons curry powder

1 teaspoon cumin powder

1 quart Vegetable or chicken broth/stock (3 cup broth/stock and 1 cup water)

#### Instructions:

- 1. In a soup pot, melt butter and sauté the onion and garlic for two minutes.
- 2. Add curry and cumin.
- 3. Add the pumpkin and broth, bring to a boil, uncovered, then reduce heat and let simmer for 15 to 45 mins or until pumpkin is soft and flavors blend.
- 4. Remove from heat and use a stick blender to blend until smooth (If using a blender; make sure that the soup is cooled a bit before blending to avoid a soup explosion).
- 5. Season to taste with salt and pepper.



### PUMPKIN SOUP CONTINUED...

### RECIPE BY THE PRETTIE FAMILY



### Flavours to add to change things up:

**Thai red curry** – sauté 2 Tbsp. red curry paste in 1/2 Tbsp. oil over medium heat. Cook for 2 minutes until fragrant, then proceed with recipe. Try adding coconut cream before serving; it's delicious!

**Ginger**- include 1 Tbsp. finely chopped ginger with butter, onions & garlic.

**Lightly Spiced** - replace recipe spices with 1/2 tsp each cumin, coriander and smoked paprika.


**Turmeric** – replace recipe spices with 1 1/2 tsp each ground turmeric, coriander and 1/4 tsp cayenne pepper

**Touch of Sweetness** – replace recipe spices with ½ tsp ground cinnamon, ½ tsp ground nutmeg, 1/8 tsp cloves. After Blending add ½ cup milk/cream or coconut cream and 2 Tbsp. of maple syrup or honey.

#### Note:

- Using a carving pumpkin/Jack-O-Lanterns; while they are edible, they are not as tasty.
- This recipe works with butternut squash!
- For a chunky soup do not puree (could also add potato, carrots, sweet potatoes etc. to make the soup go further)
- Canned pumpkin puree (2 cans) OR frozen pumpkin Puree (about 4 cups worth); cook first for about 5 minutes to remove any tin or freezer flavors & pull out some of the excess water.
- Never boil soup after adding cream; it will separate!
