This fall also marked the 140th anniversary of Louis Riel's execution, commemorated in St. Boniface during a historic ceremony attended for the first time by a Prime Minister of Canada, alongside Manitoba Premier Wab Kinew. During the evening, MMF also announced a \$50,000 donation to the Christmas Cheer Board, continuing a partnership of more than 25 years dedicated to supporting families and ensuring children experience the joy of the holiday season.

We closed the season by celebrating Métis excellence at the Red River Métis Business Excellence Awards Gala, honouring the achievements of Métis entrepreneurs across the Region.

The Manitoba Métis Federation, led by the Red River Métis Veterans Department, hosted its 4th Annual Indigenous Veterans Day Ceremony at the Royal Canadian Legion Branch #164 in Lac du Bonnet. The gathering honoured Red River Métis Veterans past and present and featured Red River Métis music, Youth jiggers from Kinew Local, and the premiere of a documentary highlighting the service of WWII Veteran Lawrence LaLiberté.

The Winnipeg Region was proud to be represented at the ceremony by Minister Carrier, Minister Beaudin, and Minister Remillard. Their attendance reflected the Region's ongoing commitment to honouring the service, sacrifices, and legacy of Red River Métis Veterans and to standing alongside Veterans and their families.

# LOUIS RIEL COMMEMORATION CEREMONY

In 2025, we marked the 140th anniversary of Louis Riel's execution with a meaningful commemoration at his gravesite in St. Boniface. The day was an opportunity to honour our leader, reflect on our history, and look toward our future.

For the first time, the current Prime Minister attended the ceremony, marking a historic moment in the relationship between the MMF and the Federal Government, 140 years since the Canadian Government executed Louis Riel. Manitoba Premier Wab Kinew was warmly welcomed as the first Premier to officially recognize Louis Riel as the first Premier of Manitoba.

The commemoration was filled with hope and optimism for the future of the Red River Métis. The Culture & Heritage Department was proud to assist the President's office in organizing this historic event and honour our leader's enduring legacy.



# LIGHTING UP THE HEART OF THE HOMELAND



On December 1, we were proud to illuminate the Red River Métis Christmas lighting display at 200 Main Street, sharing warmth, goodwill, and festive cheer with Citizens, neighbours, and visitors in the heart of our Homeland. # RECIPE CORNER

This Winter, we invited Citizens to share their favourite seasonal dishes, celebrating the flavours and traditions that bring our Métis community together.

## SASKATOON BUTTER TARTS RECIPE BY SHAUNA SIMPSON

12 Frozen tart shells, each about 3 inches in diameter  
1 egg, lightly beaten  
1/2 cup corn syrup  
1 tsp lemon juice, bottled or fresh  
3/4 tsp vanilla  
1/3 cup brown sugar  
1 tbsp flour  
3 tbsp melted butter, allowed to cool slightly  
1 & 1/2 cups Saskatoons, fresh or frozen

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F

Leave shells in foil cups and place on a baking sheet. I also put down a silicone baking mat first for easy cleanup.

In a large bowl, whisk egg with syrup, juice and vanilla.

In another bowl, stir sugar with flour.

Stir into egg mixture along with melted butter.

Divide berries equally among shells. Pour in egg mixture, filling each shell right to the top. Bake on bottom rack of oven until bubbly and top is a bit crusty, from 18 to 23 minutes.

Tarts will firm up when cooler and can be refrigerated 2 days. Don't worry, there won't be any left over.

They will be HOT when first out - be careful!  
Makes 12 tarts (doubles easily - which I always do as they are yummy!!)
