## Did You Know?

The tail of the lemur is longer than its body. Lemurs often point their stomachs toward the sun for warmth as their bellies have less fur than the rest of their bodies. They live in troops of 15-20, which are led by the females. Ring-tailed lemurs can only be found on the island of Madagascar and smaller nearby islands (in the Indian Ocean, off the eastern coast of Africa).



Lifeguards are responsible for the safety of individuals around water areas (traditionally swimming pools, lakes, and oceans). The job outlook for lifeguards over the next decade is good, with expected growth of 10% (which is above average).
