er blooms into a confident Multi-Gun shooter. If you have any questions, you can contact



#### CAST BULLET MATCH REPORT

The first cast (lead) bullet match of the year is scheduled for Monday, June 29th, beginning at 8:00 am. Matches will continue on the last Monday of each month through November. Remember it is very hot at the Dillman Range, so bring water and supplies needed to keep you cool.

In May of this year, we had a small match featuring .22 LR only. We used smaller targets set much closer at 25-125 yards. Everyone seemed to enjoy it, so there is a good chance we might repeat the match in the future. Keep your eyes on the Club calendar and the Kinetic Energy for any announcements of future events.



"Cast" bullet refers to a solid lead projectile, having no copper jacket. To compete in the Cast Bullet Matches, a shooter will need a .22 LR rifle, a centerfire handgun sighted in at 50 yards, and a centerfire rifle, all shooting cast bullets @1700 FPS. Targets are all knock down metal plates and are shot from 50 YDS to 200 meters.

This is a long-standing competition at the Dillman Range and we invite anyone interested to come out and see what it is all about. You might want to come watch one time before you shoulder your firearm and take aim at those metal targets. Hope to see you there! Turnout this year was OK, with an average of six shooters at each match. We had hoped for an increase in participants, however, with the world in such a crazy state, we enjoyed the shooters that came out. I hope to see you all next year, in addition to some new faces. I will submit a match application for the shooting year of 2021, so in the meantime, be safe and try out a new match over the summer.

#### **VARMINT MATCH REPORT**

The Varmint match season has begun! We missed the opening in April due to the Range closure, but we had a good showing in May. It was a bit on the windy side, but that's life in the great outdoors! We had a good match and met some new shooters. There have been a number of prospective new shooters for the match. This is not an intimidating match only for the "pros". This is a fun match and is open to anyone. All you need is a rifle and 20 rounds of your favorite ammo. There is fun to be had shooting a rimfire (22LR or 17HMR) or a centerfire caliber of your choice. Or, for twice the fun, shoot in both categories!

We give 20 shots (5 shots each) at a varmint silhouette paper target at 100, 160, 200, 230 yards. Any position (prone, bench, standing) is allowed. Any front support is allowed, including bipods, sandbags, crossed sticks. Again, what you would use out in the field. No rear support is allowed, just your shoulder.

To help level the playing field, there will be two classes: Centerfire and Rimfire. The Centerfire will be split into two sub-classes: 1) open class. This is for those custom-built, heavy rifles, 2) varmint class. This if for those rifles that would actually be used hunting varmints (as opposed to the open class, which is basically a bench-rest rifle).

The Rimfire class will consist of two sub-classes: 1) 22LR, 2) 17HMR. The Rimfire class has the same rules as above, with reduced targets placed at 50 and 100 yards. Again, a total of 20 shots on 4 targets.

In addition to bragging rights, there are 1<sup>st</sup> through 3<sup>rd</sup> place aggregate awards and a high match award given at the LRC awards dinner in January. You must shoot a minimum of 4 matches to qualify for trophy consideration with the exception of the single high match score.

Matches are held at the Dillman outdoor range on the last Friday of the month, April through October. First relay starts at 5pm. Additional relays following completion of the first relay. You may shoot multiple relays, in multiple classes, if you want. There is a \$5 entry fee per relay.

Come on out and enjoy a fun shoot.





#### CIVILIAN MARKSMANSHIP PROGRAM MATCH REPORT

The first match we had after the COVID-19 (Wuhan Virus) shutdown was on Saturday, June 13<sup>th</sup>. The great news was we had nine shooters who had a fun, safe time shooting vintage military rifles and a few modern type military rifles that met specs. The good news was an LRC member **Alan Tier** shot the highest score of 268-5X using a scoped AR-15 which enters Alan in the unlimited modern military category. The bad news for **Alan** (only somewhat) is that in this category match scores are graded on a much steeper



curve-upward. To earn a bronze pin in unlimited modern military a minimum score of 275 is needed. If a shooter uses a 1903 Springfield bolt action rifle, a minimum score of 264 will earn a bronze pin. These scores are based on a 300 total match score.

We had two shooters using the '03 rifles. **David Crippen** from Folsom scored a 242-2X using cast bullets in the Springfield. **Dave** had earned a bronze medal in Phoenix, AZ at the CMP Western Games back in March. Also, on the line was an older AR-15A1, the civilian version of the military M-16A1 which was used in the Vietnam conflict 50+ years ago. The category for this rifle is modern military (regular) for CMP match purposes.

For competitors who are interested in shooting the unlimited modern military category, the rules state; a) the exterior configuration of the rifle must be similar to that of the original military, b) the trigger pull may not be less than 4.5 pounds, C) butt-stocks may vary in length, but adjustments to cheek piece height is NOT allowed, d) optical sights are allowed, but only up to 4.5 magnification with maximum lens diameter of 34mm, and e) weights are unlimited. For more detailed description of the rules, go on-line and check CMP Games rules 5.2.2 and 5.2.5.

**NOTE:** Due to the COVID-19 cancellation of our April match, the CMP has sanctioned a makeup match for LRC. Our Club Range Committee approved the date of July 11, 2020 for that makeup match, therefore, our next CMP match will be on July 11, 2020. We will skip the month of August due to "deer hunter sight in" event, scheduled for August 29<sup>th</sup>, and resume our matches on September 12, 2020.

#### HIGH POWER MATCH REPORT

In May we usually have a high power clinic instead of our normal match. It usually happens on the 4th Saturday rather than the 3rd Saturday (Memorial Day weekend). Due to the pent-up demand of people wanting to shoot and the Club needing the income, I was asked to push it back another week. We decided to try something new; a 3x600 all slow prone high power match. With only one week of notice, I was surprised by the turnout. Eleven shooters showed up. Normally in a 3x600 you would have 3 strings 20 rounds in each position. To expedite things, we tried 2 courses of 30 rounds; bad idea! Next time we'll do 3 strings. I think everybody agreed it was still a good day. **Mike Martin** was the winner with a 590-23x, 2nd was **Cary Triplett** with a 589-19x, **Gordon Taras** from Alameda had 583-24x thanks for making the trip Gordon! **Bill Diamond,** who is in the sharp-shooter class, got a 566-6x also deserves a mention. It was agreed that we should definitely do this again. E-mail me with feedback to **rosevilleglass@surewest.net**. It's an open match using typical high power equipment plus there is an F-class for shooters who prefer a rest over a sling, but they shoot at a smaller target. Next time I'd like to see some of our varmint match shooters show up.

In June we got back to our usual 50-shot match. Not the best turnout. Only five shooters, probably due to heat. In the second relay, **Scott Bonivert** and I had an amazing dual. I shot 194-5x in offhand, he shot a 195-4x. He cleaned both rapid strings, I dropped 4. Then I almost got him in slow prone by shooting a 99-4x to his 96-3x. In the end **Scott** had a 491-11x, I had 489-17x (argh those 2- 8's killed me). Oh well, I smashed my personal best and got my first high-master score. **Cary Triplet** was doing awesome but had ammo problems due to Hornady bullets and our new shooter **Greg Beauchamp** had a 389-3; nice work! Our matches are held on the 3rd Saturday of each month and all shooters are welcome.

#### CAMP PERRY: Camp Perry Held 6,000 POWs

More than 6,000 prisoners of war (POWs) were interned at Camp Perry during WWII. They were part of the more than 350,000 German and Italian POWs who were sent to more than 400 security locations in the US.

The Italians were the first group to arrive. Many of the Germans were veterans of Rommel's famous Afrika Korps

According to local news sources who visited the camp in July, 1944, the prisoners received essentially the same rations as the American troops and were housed in military style huts. They also maintained their own barber ship, shoe repair, and carpentry shop. Most of the POWs were skilled, hard workers with many trades. They worked on farms, fields and local industries, which included the Erie Proving Grounds located adjacent to the camp.

When there were complaints by a few workers concerning the discipline at the camp, the commander fired a cannon over the prisoners' heads. They went back to work promptly.

One prisoner escaped from the camp, but he was recaptured eventually. In 1946, the last of the POWs were repatriated.

I, for one, have been trying each day to focus on what I can control and not so much on those things I cannot control. The best way for me is to limit any watching of the News Media and spend more time with family and friends. I don't know the answer, but I do know that the daily challenges we now face have taken their toll on all of us in many different ways.

On Saturday, June 27th, the LSSF Weekend Trap team and the LRC Killer "B's" team took part in a fundraiser at Coon Creek to support youth shooting in our area and watch the future of our sport. These kids are so good; their eyes so sharp and their reflexes so quick. It is fun to watch such promise!
