

CAST BULLET SILHOUETTE MATCH



Coming soon!

Cast bullet match is returning March 27th, and will be held on the last Monday of the month, through November. (With a couple of exceptions, watch the calendar)

The March match will be a .22 LR only match, all you will need is a 22 rifle and pistol. Targets will be from 25 to 100+ yds. **Everyone has these guns, come join us!!**

Beginning in April, the standard matches will begin.

Competitors will *need*: Centerfire Rifle 22 LR rifle Centerfire Handgun Targets are steel silhouettes and are placed as follows:
50yd-22 rifle small pigs and turkeys
50yd handgun chickens
50yd rifle plates
200 meter rifle rams
100yd rifle pigs
150yd rifle turkeys

All firearms must use a **cast lead bullet** (gas check is ok, pistol can use a "plated" bullet".) No copper jackets or high velocity, over 1800 fps, are allowed. Shooting can be done offhand, or utilizing shooting sticks, or the support post for the range structure.

Scoring is simple if you hit the target and it falls down, it's a hit. Everything else is considered a miss.

Match starts promptly at 8:00am, and involves a lot of target set up, come out and join the fun!

SPORTING RIFLE

Sporting Rifle matches start back up on **Tuesday April 4**th, and continue every Tuesday through the end of June. Sporting Rifle matches are open to club members only, so if you think this could be a match for you, come on out and watch a match to familiarize yourself.

Sporting Rifle is a 3-position timed event requiring the shooter to shoot from the off-hand, seated and prone positions. If you have a 9.5 lbs. or lighter rifle with iron sights or a scope, then this is the match for you. This is a fun and challenging match that consists of 32 rounds at 100 yards. If you're interested in this match, head on out to the Dillman Range on **Tuesday evenings at 5pm**.

VARMINT MATCH

Attention all varmint shooters! Our 2023 shooting season starts **Friday**, **April 28th**. There is still time to perfect those custom loads, or to find the perfect rimfire ammo. (Or both!) This is not a shoot that is sanctioned by any governing body, just a fun shoot for bragging rights and good-natured boasting. This match includes center-fire calibers as well as rim-fire.

There are multiple shooting classes, giving an opportunity for everyone to join in the fun. The shooting distances are from 100 yds out to 220 yds for the **center-fire**. The **rim-fire** class shoots at 50 yds and 100 yds with multiple targets. With only 20 shots for record, this will not break your ammunition budget, either!

Plan to join us this year. The matches are held the last Friday of the month, April through October, starting at 5pm. If you can't decide which class to shoot then shoot multiple classes, as there are multiple relays per event. As in the past years: Any scope. Any front rest. Rear rest is your shoulder. Prone position, or off the bench. Any caliber for centerfire, with .22 or .17 for rimfire.

There are awards given for the top 3 shooters in each category, as well as single top scores for the year. You must shoot **at least 4 matches** to be entered for the awards consideration.

All this for a mere **\$5 per relay entry fee.** This match is open to the public, as well as members.

CLUB HIGH POWER

Get Ready for Club High Power!

Club High Power will be at the Dillman Range, on the 2nd & 4th Thursdays of each month, beginning in April through September, (October is the 2nd and 3rd Thursdays). Range closes at 4:30pm on these days, with the match starting around 5:00pm.

The Club High Power match is one of the longest, if not the longest running match sponsored by the LRC. It is conducted like a practice or clinic for shooters wishing to learn how to shoot high power competitively or just want to improve on their marksmanship skills.

The **1st match** of each month has shooters firing in the standing slow fire & rapid prone shooting positions. The **2nd match** of the month has shooters fire from the slow prone & rapid sitting positions. All courses of fire are fired on standard NRA 200 yd. targets. CMP & NRA high power rules allow for the use of scopes. While NRA specifies specific rules for the type of rifle used in the Service Rifle or Match Rifle categories, we are very lax on these rules for the club event since the scores are not sent into the NRA.



Please come with a rifle that can easily be reloaded with a magazine or striper clip that holds at least 5 rounds of ammunition and can easily fire 10 rounds in 60 seconds. You will need 25 rounds of ammunition for this match. Match fee for this match is \$5.00.

This match is a great way to improve your marksmanship skills with your rifle and have fun in the process. Most shooters are shooting some type of *AR-15 chambered in .223*. While this is not a requirement for this match, it is the easiest rifle type to use for these matches. We do have a limited number of Club Rifles that can be used for this match, but these will need to be requested in advance of the matches to be made available. Club ammo is also available for a fee. Please let me know in advance to make sure we have ammo available.

CONVENTIONAL PISTOL CONVENTIONAL PISTOL

Conventional Pistol runs every 2nd and 4th Wednesday at our indoor range located at 65 McBean Park Drive. Doors open at 2:30pm and the first relay begins at 3:00pm. Our Conventional Pistol Match is an amazing opportunity to shoot competitively for both new and experienced marksmen. This is a .22 caliber, sixty round, handgun match consisting of six courses of fire including slow, rapid, and timed fire. All matches are observed by qualified Directors who are available to help inexperienced shooters get started.

There is a \$10 registration fee with a \$5 per match participation fee and ammo can be purchased at the match for \$5.00 a box.

There's still plenty of time to start getting your scores in, so we hope to see some new shooters. Conventional Pistol is one of Lincoln Rifle Club's scored matches and awards for top shooters will be handed out at our Annual Awards Dinner. Like the Ladies Night event, this is a rare opportunity for Club members to visit our indoor range!

Lincoln Rifle Club has had 3 Gun matches for almost 20 years now. The earliest matches were held offsite and didn't move to the Dillman Range till about 2005. We used to set up 2 stages at the front of the Dillman Range, ran those, tore down, and set up 2 more stages. Later, the Ormsby Range was created at the back of the existing range and we have used the 5 shooting bays there for the past 10 years or so.

Past match directors have included **Don Bradway**, **Jay Luca**, **Dan Robinson**, **and Arnold Chin**. Each added their own particular spin to the matches. At different times our match has been affiliated with USPSA, 3 Gun Nation & the United Multi-Gun League. Currently our matches are run under our own in-house set of rules which are posted on the Lincoln Rifle Club website.

Requirements are pretty simple in the interest of making the match accessible to as many people as possible. There are only two divisions and there are relatively few restrictions for either. The **Open Division** uses the traditional trio of rifle, pistol, and shotgun. **Pistols must be 9mm or larger** (.38 for the occasional revolver shooter). Any capacity magazine, optics are allowed. **Rifle minimum caliber is 5.56/.223** though the competitor may elect to use a pistol caliber carbine that is 9mm or larger. Red dot sights or magnifying optics up to 4X may be used. You can even have one of each mounted. **Shotguns** are only limited in that they must be **20 gauge or larger**, typically semiauto but some of us run pump guns. **Last year's Open Division winner**, **Alex Lee**, ran a Mossberg 590M pump gun with 20 round magazines. **Note**: With California's ever-changing litany of firearms regulations it is the individual competitor's responsibility to ensure that their gear is legal.

Our second division is PCC which stands for pistol caliber carbine. The rules are the same, but the PCC is substituted for the pistol.

If you are not familiar with this type of competition, it differs from most traditional firearms events in that **your score is your TIME**. Faster equals better unless your penalties for inaccuracy outweigh your speed. For this reason, it is very much a thinking person's game. We tell the shooter what the problem is, and they figure out the fastest way to solve it.

For this reason, it tends to be a much more entertaining shooting sport for spectators than a pure accuracy match. spectators are welcome at our matches; just bring eye and ear protection. Most of our competitors come to a match as a spectator first.

Shooters with prior 3 Gun competition experience are welcome to join us. You do not have to be a club member to compete although your entry fee is discounted if you are. If you are experienced shooting all three weapon platforms but lack the competition experience, we offer an introductory course the Wednesday prior to the match, the MGD Q-Course.

CIVILIAN MARKSMANSHIP PROGRAM

CMP Report from the 02/11/2023 Match

Finally, we had a second Saturday of the month that wasn't pouring rain accompanied by 40 plus mph winds! The December 10th 2022 date and the January 14th 2023 dates were "stormed" out. Now in February we were presented with a chilly, but clear, sunny morning. There was a good turnout with **ten competitors** including one who has never shot at our range before. This competitor drove in from Orland and was very prepared for our match. He had done all of the research on the CMP website, watched You Tube videos on The John C. Garand Course "A" match and other videos on high power rifle match shooting.

Mike looked like a "regular" but this was his first time doing a CMP sanctioned match. He shot very respectable scores in the prone stages using an *issued M-1*. The only thing preventing him from earning a pin was his offhand score. This position requires a lot of practice, dry firing and concentration using the old service rifle.

Our highest score for this match was fired by **Jaime Bagtas** using a scoped AR-15 in the Unlimited Modern Military category. His score of 287-12X earned Jaime a silver award pin in that difficult category. If a shooter earns a Gold Pin they must drop only 6 points out of 300.

Then we had "a real vintage rifle" winner: **Cary Triplet** using a **Springfield 1903A3**, shooting a score of 270-2X out of 300 points. Very good shooting for an eight decade old platform that required a lot of bolt operating skill in the rapid fire stage.

Our next match is scheduled for Saturday 11th March 2023. In March, there is also the CMP Western

Games held in Phoenix, Arizona. Some of our competitors will be going to the Ben Avery Shooting Park in Phoenix to shoot in that event. I have a family obligation (helping my son move, and a Grandson birthday) so a club RSO along with one of the regular competitors will be running this match. Entries for the match will be taken at 7:30AM and **the match will begin at 8:00AM** Please check the CMP website or the Dillman Range bulletin board for the course of fire in this 35 shot match.

ACQUIRING AN M-1

Chris Moore from our Multi-gun Division came out and shot his newly rebuilt M-1 at the last CMP match.

Chris Moore shot his "new" CMP expert graded Springfield Armory M-1 Garand SA4371938 (Apr'38). Chris used Garands for drill and field training at the Air Force Academy from 1967-1971 and loved them, probably because this was his first gun having been raised in a "militia only" Air Force family (before there were "anti-gunners").

Nearing retirement in the late 90s, he bought **SA3823842** (Sep'38, so his "old" one was actually five months newer than his "new" gun) from his first-ever gun show at Cal Expo. That rifle had "Blue Sky" engraved on the barrel indicating use by the South Korean army then reimported probably in the '60s.

The old gun stopped working at Front Sight last fall and the estimate to repair & rebuild the \$500 gun was \$1250! Since he was in Alabama in January, he visited the CMP Talladega range and store and purchased the new gun for \$1150, paid CA transfer fees of about \$75, and saved a whole \$25 to get a genuine CMP rebuild in the deal!

TRAPSHOOTING LEGENDS

This article is a summary of what appeared in Trap and Field Magazine January 2022 called "The Secret": Past Legends: Merla Stockdale by Phil Kiner

Merle Stockdale was a master researcher (but his real profession was a farmer) and applied this study of how to smash a clay target to the fullest. He was the first shooter in the game of trap to make it to the 27 yard line when that threshold was established in 1955. Merle broke 96 clays at the old 26 yard line and then was "punched" up to the new 27 yard line. A guy that Merle regarded as a mentor, Arnold Riegger, was the top shooter when the 25 yard line was the maximum. Riegger was the first shooter to use an "adjustable comb" which in those days consisted of a laced on leather check piece in which he shoved cardboard box tops in to raise and lower the comb of the stock.

Merle's idea was to use a "Texas Ranger" shotgun, a single barrel, break open, exposed hammer firearm which was ordered from a Montgomery Ward Catalog. The price at that time was around \$25. The other high tech item he used was a draw bar hole on his John Deere Model G tractor. Merle reasoned that he needed to raise his point of impact a little higher to break more clays. So, he stuck the barrel of the Texas Ranger into the draw bar hole and bent the barrel upwards. He then tied the shotgun onto his trusty rusty old oil drum (also used as a patterning board), attached a string on the trigger, then hid behind his chicken coop. Merle fired the shotgun, and when it didn't blow up--all was good. Then he started breaking a lot more clays at the trap field. Competitors called this *Merle's "Tractor Gun."*



When other shooters started making fun of the Tractor Gun, Merle decided to "adjust" his Model 12 Winchester (my favorite) to the same point of impact as the Tractor Gun. Merle used his trusty old oil drum as a patterning board. He would step back about 16 yards, fire at a section of the drum, check the pattern, make adjustments to the barrel in the draw bar hole, rotate the drum to a rusty spot then fire another shot. After all parts of the drum were marked with shot. The drum was allowed to "rust over" for about a week. Thus creating a new patterning board.

Merle also invented a jig to make sure that his Model 12 barrel was bent the correct amount. He carried this tool to all of his trap meets. With this shotgun, he was able to earn enough money to completely pay off his farm. The shotgun was a tool to Merle. He cut on it, filed it, and tweaked it to make it shoot where he was looking. His adjustments showed much forward thinking to modernize the game of trapshooting.

Merle Stockdale was admitted to **The Trapshooting Hall of Fame in1982**. He was an **11** time All- American.
