

CMP REPORT

This was probably due to a big high power match held on that same day at The Sacramento Valley Shooting Center. Most of our CMP competitors shoot high power rifles that will be "legal" in NRA High Power competition as well as CMP competition. With the John C. Garand Course "A" match at Dillman Range, rifles have to be "as issued" by military standard or be categorized as Unlimited Modern Military (again with certain limits). Then some guys have rifle (s) for each game.

This match, one of our shooters used a Foreign Unlimited Modern Military rifle/carbine. This was a Steyr "bull pup" design that met the trigger pull and as issue weight requirement. He did tell me that he just wanted to shoot for fun. This was the first time he shot it in competition. This was revealed in the dreaded stage three.

As true with the rest of the competitors, most did very well with the prone slow fire stage, even the prone rapid fire stage. Then, it happens... the offhand (standing) position. This prevented any award pins from being issued. JAIME Bagtas came real close this time, with a score of 256-2X. This is two points shy of a bronze pin using the as-issued M-! Garand he shot.

Offhand (unsupported standing) shooting requires a lot of practice shooting, dry firing, practice standing using an air rifle, and to add to the mix, stamina. As I am finding out with maturity (old age), good eyesight also helps greatly.

Our next match is Saturday July 13th. Entries taken at 7:30AM, shooting at 8AM. If this sounds interesting to you, come on out!!!

During this past reporting period, we received good news that our friend and partner Coon Creek has been successfully sold to Fred Jensen and he has begun making some nice improvements to the venue. The first notable change is to the name of the club. No longer carrying the familiar name of Coon Creek, this shooting ranch is now known as the GOLDEN STATE SHOOTING CENTER @ AHART RANCH (GSSC)! The new owners felt it was time for a fresh start for the business and decided to keep Ahart Ranch as part of the name for historical reasons.

Currently, they have improved and reopened the sporting clays track and the 5-stand shooting competition area. Also, the skeet machines have been replaced and several of the trap machines have undergone refurbishment/repair and all are working wonderfully. If you would like to try your shotgun in some very interesting and challenging scenarios, come on out and have some fun at GSSC. Most prices

have remained very close to previous amounts, so your wallet will be happy. On June 29th, at the GSSC, there will be a George Ahart memorial shoot, and everyone is invited. Bring the family out for a fun day, plenty of food and lots of friendly faces.

The LRC Weekend Trap group is finishing our second competition quarter for this year. The Blind Boogey competition started in April and will end on Thursday, June 27. It has come down to a 2-man race between **Rich Venegas** and **Bill Harvey**, so the next report will reveal the winner. We will be starting our third competition on Sunday, July 7 which will be all of us competing for the best overall average using a sub-gauge shorten. Sub-gauge is a 20, 28 or 410 gauge shotgun. This competition will last until the end of September.

We continue to have our matches on the first and second Sunday, second and fourth Thursday, and the third Friday of each month at the Dillman Range. The cost is still \$5 per relay, and everyone is welcome to participate. Hope to see you there!

MULTI GUN DIVISION

JUNE 1ST MATCH

ur June match was blessed with beautiful weather (May was rained out after 2 stages. It's hard to go prone when there is a stream running through your short. That seems like a recipe for a pretty shooting position) Since we were unable to complete the stages from the May match they were resurrected for June. It turns out they are a lot more fun to shoot when you aren't hypothermic! Bay 1 is our longest and typically requires rifle and one other platform. June was rifle and shotgun with the ever popular (with the match director anyway) spinner target. It had to be engaged with both rifle and shotgun and as the name implies the target must turn over with the bottom plate making a full revolution. We also had a bonus target at 85 yards which was a half pound container of Tannerite. For those not familiar, Tannerite is a binary compound that is impact sensitive. When you hit it with a centerfire rifle cartridge, it makes a nice "boom". About three fourths of our competitors were able to hit it which is impressive considering the plastic jar containing it is only about 4 inches high.

Bays 2,3 and 4 are a little shorter and are typically adorned with walls and other obstacles that the shooters must negotiate to

get into position to engage the target. From a pure accuracy standpoint, our targets are pretty large and the distances are pretty easy match. It would be if all we had to do is simply hit the targets. In fact, when we bring newcomers out they often comment that it doesn't seem all that difficult. What makes it difficult is that your score is only partly based on your accuracy: your time to complete the stage is how your score is computed. Raw time, plus penalty time for misses or procedural errors, minus any bonus time, is what gives you your final result.

June's results were bookended by individuals who had one thing in common, Both had taken the MGD Q-Course to get approval to shoot our matches. Our match winner, Spencer Fowler, took one of the first Q-Courses offered several years ago when he didn't look old enough to shave. Actually, I'm not sure he does now but he definitely knows how to shoot. Spencer won all 5 stages, often by a comfortable margin. Our other Q-Course graduate, Phil Divinagracia is a senior member of law enforcement who acquitted himself well in his first match but withdrew early to avoid over-

-stressing a knee that is already scheduled for surgery!

While it's nice to be at the top of the leaderboard (like Spencer) it is arguable whether he had any more fun than the rest of us who are competing with ourselves (and father time).

the coming weeks the kids will have the

competing in matches all over Northern
California for the next 7 weeks, including
hosting a State Championship Match for the
CRPA. So far this season we've shot the
Best in the West for the CMP, a local 60 shot
Small Bore match, and the American Legion
Postal Match.

The American Legion Postal Match is shot in advancing stages, where the final 15 shooters are invited (all expenses paid) to shoot at the Olympic Training Center. With a total of 600 points available, the shooter must have shot a 575 to make the 2nd round and out of our 12 shooters, we had 3 make the cut for the 2nd round. Alex Watts shot a 580, Hypatia Shen shot a 581 and Logan Michael shot a whopping 597. If they make it to the 3rd round, they will have the opportunity to compete against the best junior shooters in the Country.

In addition to the American Legion, the kids are getting ready for the Junior Olympics. The qualifying matches are slated for February 11th and 18th, wherein
