Governor Newsom Makes Early Gun Crackdown Push

Gun control activists in California have found a good friend in the state's new governor, Gavin Newsom.

In his first few weeks in office, Newsom has quickly moved to reduce the number of Californians with firearms and given activists hope that a number of measures vetoed by former Gov. Jerry Brown will once again see the light of day.



“We have all the ingredients we need to make meaningful change,” state Assemblyman Jesse Gabriel said Monday at a press conference in Sacramento. “We have expanded Democratic majority in both houses. We have a bright and ambitious new governor with a real track record on this issue who wants to make this a priority.”

In his state budget plan, which was released just days after he took office in January, Newsom proposed an additional \$5.6 million in funding – about 50 percent more than Brown allocated in his last budget – to seize firearms from the thousands of people who are ineligible to be gun owners because of past criminal convictions or mental illness. The gun seizure program has been underfunded in the past, with the result being that around 10,000 people in the state were able to purchase firearms, but later were convicted of a felony or found to have a serious mental illness.

Newsom also wants state lawmakers to expand a California Department of Justice unit tasked with enforcing gun sale laws and, in his proposed budget, has asked for more funding for the Firearms Violence Research Center at the University of California, Davis.

In his inauguration speech, Newsom promised to be tough on “a gun lobby willing to sacrifice the lives of our children to line their pockets.”

Newsom's outspoken support for stricter firearm laws – he was the main supporter in 2016 of Proposition 63, a measure that outlawed large ammunition magazines, mandated background checks for people who buy bullets, handed out fines for failing to report when guns are stolen or lost, and created a process for taking guns away from people convicted of a felony – has many control activists and lawmakers in Sacramento seeing a new opportunity for legislation that was vetoed under Brown.

Despite having some of the country's toughest gun laws, California under Brown – a Democrat and gun owner – saw a number of measures struck down by the former governor's veto pen.

During a press conference on Monday, state lawmakers and activists rattled off a list of measures vetoed by Brown that they hope to revive now that Newsom has taken office – including limiting purchases of rifles and shotguns to one per month and putting more regulations on parts that can be turned into homemade weapons.

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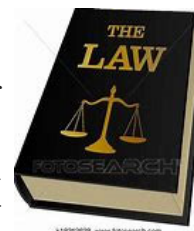
“Stopping gun violence takes courage — the courage to do what’s right,” former Arizona Rep. Gabby Giffords, who was seriously wounded during a 2011 assassination attempt, said at the press conference. “We must never stop fighting.”

Since the beginning of the year, California state legislators have already introduced measures to put a 10-year firearm prohibition on anyone convicted of two drug or alcohol crimes in a three-year period, requiring gun owners to lock up their weapons when they are not home, and a tax on gun sales that would help fund violence prevention programs.

A bill that would permit more people to seek a gun violence restraining order against someone they believe poses a danger to themselves or others has also been reintroduced. It was previously vetoed by Brown.

Newsom has so far remained quiet on the re-introduced pieces of legislation as they make their way through the statehouse, but spokesman Jesse Melgar said in an email to the San Francisco Chronicle that the new governor “is a big believer in strong gun safety laws.”

While Newsom’s ascension to governor’s mansion has gun control activists excited about the possibility of passing stricter regulations, gun rights groups have widely panned Newsom’s proposals and accuse the new governor of pandering to his base.



“Gavin Newsom has demonstrated he has little to no understanding of firearms and firearms policy,” Craig DeLuz, a spokesman for the Firearms Policy Coalition, told the Los Angeles Times. “For him this is a PR issue, meaning he will probably sign whatever is put in front of him. He wants to run for president.”

SPORTING RIFLE MATCHES SCHEDULED TO BEGIN IN APRIL

It’s no April fool; it is time for Sporting Rifle Matches to begin. This year’s matches are scheduled to begin on Tuesday, April 3, and continue for the next 12 weeks. Sporting rifle is held at the Dillman Range and registration begins immediately following the Range closure at 5 pm. Cost to shoot the match is a one-time registration fee of \$10 and \$5 match fee for each following match.

Following 1-8 sighting shots, the course of fire is 8 rounds/prone (8 mins.), 8 rounds/standing (8 mins.), 4 rounds/sitting (30 sec, twice), and 4 rounds prone (30 sec, twice). A sling, glove, and shooting mat are the only support equipment allowed. No shooting jackets or shooting mitts are allowed. Rifles must weight 9.5 lbs or less and be chambered for .223 up to 30 cal.

VARMINTS ARE BACK IN TOWN

Attention all varmint shooters! The 2019 shooting season is about to begin and we would like to see you on the firing line. The varmint matches are scheduled to begin on Friday, April 26th (last Friday of each month) and continue through October. Matches begin at 5 pm and the cost to shoot the match is \$5 per relay.



This year we will be splitting both the centerfire and the rimfire competitions into 2 sub-classes. The centerfire class will be; 1) heavy rifles, which are more of a bench rest style, and 2) light rifles, which are more of a true varmint style firearm. Any caliber ammo may be used for the centerfire competitions. The rimfire class will be split into; 1) .22 caliber, and 2) .17 caliber firearm competitions.

Centerfire course of fire; 20 shots total, 5 shots each at 100 yds, 160 yds, 200 yds, and 220 yds. Rimfire course of fire; 20 shots total, 2 targets at 50 yds and 2 targets at 100 yards, each with 1 target reduced in size to represent different distances.

As in the past, any scope and front rest is permitted. Rear rest is simply your shoulder. You may shoot from the prone position or off the bench.

ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING SCHEDULED FOR APRIL

The Club's annual business meeting will be held on Thursday, April 4th as prescribed by our by-laws. The meeting will report to the members an overview of the past year and its events as well as all financial data and budget issues relative to the Club. NRA and CRPA Attorneys Submit Comprehensive Comment Letter **Opposing Proposed Ammunition Background Check Regulations**

Ammunition sales and transfers in California will soon be subject to a complex and convoluted background check procedure beginning July 1, 2019, as a result of Proposition 63 and Senate Bill No. 1235. But before that can happen, the California Department of Justice (“DOJ”) must propose and implement necessary regulations to ensure gun owners and ammunition retailers have clear, adequate guidelines when transferring ammunition. Recently, DOJ introduced what is believed to be the first in a series of proposed regulations on that issue. And on Thursday, January 31, attorneys for NRA and CRPA submitted a comprehensive letter in opposition to DOJ’s proposal.



As currently drafted, DOJ’s proposed regulations suffer from significant and serious flaws. Most notable among these flaws is how the proposed regulations are incomplete, leaving many questions regarding the proper procedure for transferring ammunition unanswered. Under California law, any proposed regulation must be capable of being easily understood by those persons directly affected by them. DOJ’s proposed regulations fail to meet this standard.

In addition to submitting written comments, Dan Reid, Western Regional Director for NRA, provided oral testimony during a public hearing on DOJ’s proposal in Sacramento.

DOJ’s proposed regulations also conflict with state and federal law, as individuals will be required to provide their citizenship status in connection with the required background check. But such information can only be used to cross-reference federal databases, which DOJ is prohibited from accessing for the purposes of conducting ammunition sales background checks. What’s more, recently enacted state law expressly prohibits DOJ from inquiring into an individual’s immigration status.



DOJ is required to respond to all of the comments submitted by NRA and CRPA attorneys before submitting their proposal to California’s Office of Administrative Law (“OAL”) for final approval. And any substantive changes will require an additional public comment period before submission to OAL. To that end, NRA and CRPA attorneys will continue to monitor the status of the proposal and provide members with updates as they become available.

CRPA LEADS GUN SHOW PROTECTION EFFORT WITH LAWSUIT CHALLENGING GUN SHOW BANS AT DEL MAR FAIRGROUND

The California Rifle & Pistol Association has joined with several other plaintiffs to file a lawsuit in federal court challenging the decision by the Del Mar Fair Board in San Diego County to ban gun shows at the Del Mar Fairgrounds. The lawsuit was filed in U.S. District Court for the Southern District of California in San Diego.



The 41-page Complaint alleges that the Del Mar action has purposely violated the First Amendment free speech rights of the plaintiffs and constitutes a prior restraint on speech, along with the equal protection of the plaintiffs.

Anti-gun activists have launched efforts across the state to stop gun shows at several state-owned fairgrounds. They have admitted that the “gun culture” is something they want to eliminate. NRA and CRPA members have fought back against the false accusations that guns shows promote violence and are not “family friendly.” NRA and CRPA volunteers, staff, and attorneys have written letters and showed up to board meetings. The opposition to the ban far outweighs those who want to ban the gun shows.

Gun shows have been held at the Del Mar venue for more than 30 years, with no safety issues raised by local law enforcement or the Fair Board. In fact, the Fairground’s own head of security noted that the gun shows are operating in full compliance with the law and that there are no safety concerns with the show. Nonetheless, the Del Mar Fair Board bowed to the political pressure of anti-gun activists and gave in to those Board members with a particularly strong bias against the tens of thousands of individuals who attend these shows.

CRPA is joined in the case by B&L Productions, Inc., dba Crossroads of the West, the Second Amendment Foundation, South Bay Rod & Gun Club, Maximum Wholesale, dba Ammo Bros. and five private citizens. NRA is assisting in supporting the effort. Plaintiffs are represented by attorneys C. D. Michel, Anna M. Barvir and Tiffany D. Chevront with the law firm of Michel & Associates in Long Beach and attorney Donald Kilmer in San Jose.



JUNIOR DIVISION MATCH REPORT

The beginning stage for new shooters (ages 8-20) is held on Monday nights at the Indoor Range at McBean Park. This is where shooters learn the basics of marksmanship and firearm safety. The Monday night shooters progress through the different stages of marksmanship eventually learning the different positions required for Precision Rifle competition. All junior shooters begin their training here, including the many Junior Olympians and National Champions Lincoln has produced over the years..

The beginning juniors are back at the Indoor Range, honing their skills as they progress through the NRA Marksmanship Program. Our team of volunteer coaches are doing an excellent job teaching them the skills needed to compete at the highest levels in the State.



The advanced team continues to excel this year! Since the last update, six athletes received invitations to attend the National Junior Olympic Shooting Championships at the US Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs in April. On the Men's side, **Logan Michael** qualified in Air Rifle and Smallbore Rifle, while **Carleton Liden** qualified for Air Rifle. On the Women's side, **Natalie Katsuyama**, **Lilly Polakovic**, **Morgan Vander Linden** and **Tori Watts** earned invitations in both Air Rifle and Smallbore Rifle. Junior

Olympics is the premier shooting competition for the Juniors where they will compete with the best Junior athletes in America. This is one of the strongest group of athletes Lincoln has ever sent to compete at Junior Olympics!

In addition to the Junior Olympic qualifications, the team has seen some outstanding performances in recent matches with Lincoln earning team titles in the last 3 matches-- NRA Open 3P air rifle sectional, NRA Open Standing air rifle sectional and the NRA Open Metric Smallbore sectional. Individual awards are as follows:

NRA Open 3P air rifle sectional: Gold- **Lilly Polakovic** (589), Silver- **Natalie Katsuyama** (587)

NRA Open Standing air rifle sectional: Gold- **Natalie Katsuyama** (583), Bronze- **Morgan Vander Linden** (578)

NRA Open Metric Smallbore sectional: Gold- **Natalie Katsuyama** (1143), Silver- **Lilly Polakovic** (1140)

The local indoor season will continue through the end of March at which time the focus will transition to training for the National match competitions in April and June. This is an exciting time for our Junior team as they continue to achieve success and National recognition for their efforts. The Junior team wants to thank the LRC club members for all of the little things that you do-- from the coaches to the helpers that contribute their time and energy in helping out where help is needed. It truly takes our "village" to maintain the high level of performance and success that these young athletes are achieving!



CIVILIAN MARKSMANSHIP PROGRAM (CMP) MATCH REPORT

Our CMP group braved the threat of rain on the morning of Feb.9th to complete our second match of the year. **Cary Triplett** from our Club shot a 277-11X to a silver modern military CMP award pin. He used a scoped AR having CMP configurations. Chris Jen, our commuter shooter who drives up from Salinas, shot a 274-4X to earn a bronze pin. Most other shooters shot Garands; except me. I was there with my new toy, a K-31 Swiss. Because of the threatening looking weather, we had the Range to ourselves for most of the match. We finished in record time, before the rain came. Our next matches are scheduled for Saturday, March 9 and Saturday, April 13th.



For this edition, I was asked to explain what happens at our CMP matches. First of all, all people are safe and have fun. Here is what a CMP Garand Course "A" match consists of: There are categories of rifles that are used. Shooters indicate the approved rifle they are using on their scorecard. Some used are:M-1 Garand, US Springfield, Enfield, Foreign Vintage Bolt Action military, Mosin, Enfield, Mauser, Arisaka, etc. There is a modern military category: issue weight AR-15 with or without 4X scope, M1-A's, etc. A complete listing can be found on the CMP website.

You will need a minimum of 35 rounds of ammo and the match entry fee is \$15. Suggested equipment is a spotting scope, mat, extra clips or magazines that fit your rifle, a shooting jacket or tight-fitting sleeved coat. The course of fire: 5 sighting shots in 5 mins. single load; slow fire prone position, 10 shots in 10 mins. single load; rapid fire prone position, 10 shots in 70 sec. for semi-autos, 80 sec. for bolt rifles; finally, 10 shots offhand standing position (unsupported without sling) slow fire in 10 min. single load. You're done. The match takes about an hour and 20 mins to complete. The target is an SR-1, 100yard approved military type target.

ON A PERSONAL NOTE: I was listening to a San Francisco radio station KSFO this past week. They were discussing the June 2018 Primary elections for New York's 14th Congressional District held by Ocasio-Cortez. The district has just shy of 700,000 registered voters in its boundary. For the June 2018 primary election, only 28,000 voters showed up to cast ballots. "O.C." won a shot at the November 2018 General Election with a total of 15,000 votes to the next candidate's 11,000 votes. This realization along with an article in the California Rifle and Pistol Association magazine after Proposition 23 (the ammo initiative) passed in this state shows why shooters/sportsmen/women need to get out and vote. With all of the illegal firearm use going on and news articles referring to the 1,200 child deaths in a twelve-month period, you can bet there will be many proposed laws, not favoring the shooting sports.

NRA will be contacted to help draft an inquiry to the City. **Steve** reports that **the Junior Program received a \$5,000.00 grant from the NRA.**
