

CMP REPORT

I thought that I would start this report out with a reminder to the CMP shooters, and all Lincoln Rifle Club members, that starting in the 2025 (next year) shooting season, the CMP matches will switch to the THIRD SATURDAY of each month. We will share the Dillman Range with the NRA High Power Match and Weekend Trap matches. The rifle/pistol side will be closed to non match shooting until 1:00PM. NRA High Power and CMP competitors will be firing their match "on the big end" (approximately benches 20 through 32) and trap will hold their match north of the concrete wall in a perpendicular direction.

Many of the CMP competitors are enthused with this change in that they can enjoy a match environment. We will be coordinating the line breaks and target changes with NRA High power directors. The trap shooting does not affect our operation at all and vice versa.

Now to what our box scores were: Our July match was surprisingly sparce in attendance, possibly people were afraid of the triple digit temps, or vacations going on? The weather actually turned out as a cloudy overcast, cool with a slight breeze, ie ideal shooting conditions. Then it got really hot after the match was over. Despite these guesses, there was bright metal awarded and a personal best score. Cary Triplet, using an M-1903A3 Springfield shot a 280/300 to earn a GOLD award pin in the Springfield category. He is really good at cranking that bolt gun in the rapid fire stage.

Jaime Bagtas, used an as-issued M-1 Garand and shot a 264-2X/300 to earn a BRONZE award pin for the as-issue Garand category. Alan Tier had a PERSONAL BEST!! he was using his scoped AR-15 in the Unlimited Modern Military category. His score was a 260/300. Our August 10th match got a few more people out, sure enough, vacations and weekend work took the toll last month. This time Cary Triplet decided to use his 1902 Swedish Mauser (6.5mmX55mm) in Vintage Foreign Military Bolt category. Cary shot a 280-5X/300 !! His stage scores were: 98-2X prone slow, 97-2X prone rapid, and 85-1X offhand. This is a GOLD award pin in the VMB category. After the match Cary said he was making his Estate Planning directives so that when he goes, he is buried with this rifle. King Tut has his Egyptian Gold, Cary Triplet has a great shooting 1902 Swedish Mauser.

Jaime Bagtas got one point shy of a BRONZE pin in the M-1 as-issue category, with a 257-1X/300 score. Dave Crippen, decided to just for fun, try a scoped K-31 Swiss which does not have a recognized category for this match, because it is a scoped vintage military rifle. He didn't quite get some cartridge extracting issues settled and did not medal. Alan Tier got snagged by "that dreaded offhand stage". He did dry fire much at home, but those match condition glitches sometimes play tricks on a guy.

But it was a lot of fun watching Alex in her last LRC Competition and even better that she shot a personal best on her last day.

After the matches, and following tradition, we took the kids to Cedar Point where they rode the largest and fastest roller coasters in the world, and I logged about 20k steps. I am so grateful for our team, the wonderful kids and the amazing parents they help make all this happen.

A MESSAGE ON DETERMINATION FROM TAMARA DUMONT

Facilitator of the Gold Country Chapter of A Girl & A Gun

Girl & A Gun has a value for each month. This month's value is Determined. I was asked by the President and CEO of A Girl & A Gun to give a talk about this value at our monthly Virtual Girls Night Out, broadcast to all the A Girl & A Gun Nation.

Determined: Resolved, having made a decision. Determination: Firm or fixed intention to achieve a desired end. Purposefulness, Stick-to-itveness, wanting something so much that you are not willing to let anyone or anything stand in your way. Determination is the mindset needed for success.

What are you determined to do? I know where my determination lies, and I hope it is apparent in all I do at Lincoln Rifle Club.

I am determined to train and encourage as many women in the shooting sports as I can. To protect themselves, to protect their families and to protect their communities if needed, but most of all to protect our second amendment rights.

We often hear people say that we need more youth in the shooting sports, I would agree. When I ask how they propose to do that, I am often greeted with blank looks, or different programs they think should be introduced. How is that going? How are you going to promote that?

Let me propose to you that we need more mothers and grandmothers, first. Mothers are the ones that have the children most of the time, mothers are the ones that generally make the schedule for the children, and mothers generally drive the children to their sporting events. Mom is the key. Get mom involved.

Our group of women is growing fast, and I am so grateful to those that have pitched in to help so I can have more events during the time slots that most women (and especially moms) show up.

So, what is A Girl & A Gun? A Girl & A Gun Women's Shooting League is a ladies-only organization established by women shooters for women pistol, rifle, and shotgun shooters! The league is designed to take beginners to whatever skill level they wish to achieve and provide experienced shooters with more opportunities. The objective of some is to improve their skill levels for self-defense and competitive shooting. Others also are interested in learning how to choose the right guns, gear, and accessories for long-term participation in the community.

Every month right here at Lincoln Rifle Club we have at least two opportunities to get together to practice. We have Breakfast & Bullets, "T" Time, or Girls Night Out. We periodically have classes: Women's Introduction to Handguns, Women's Introduction to Holsters, and Women's Introduction to Rifle. This coming year we will be adding workshops on gun cleaning, range bag necessities and Stop the Bleed events. Every time we get together, we go over safety rules and range etiquette. We are always looking for a few good men to help us learn.

Most of the ladies that have been joining lately have never handled a firearm in their lives, with a couple that were handed very large caliber guns at a party and are working through the fear. I welcome them

all. We have several ladies that are quite accomplished, and they love coming to not only help with the ladies less trained, but to hone their skills as well.

This month I hosted a Women's Intro to Handguns class in our indoor range. 8 women showed up. This class is different from any other beginner class, as it covers all the safety and range etiquette without presenting the brand new shooter to more information than they can process. I chose to use only .22 rimfire for this group as several of the women had never handled a gun, and thus their only knowledge of guns is what they hear from the media, a couple others had true trauma issues to resolve. The .22 is perfect for that. By the time the night was over, every one was smiling and giving High Fives and feeling empowered. I don't think I slept a wink that night due to the excitement I felt for them. My hope is to have more of these classes, including larger calibers.

A Girl & A Gun has several wonderful programs to help with learning. One is our Shooting Journal, it is a non- consumable book that has a skill set for each month and several layers of that skill so that the Journal is never outgrown. The newest learning tool we offer is our Pistol Marksmanship Program that has been greeted with much enthusiasm. The ladies learn skills that are organized to go in tandem with the Journal and earn very special rewards in the process.

Determination takes focus, my focus is women. We all need to have a focus to achieve the change we would like to see. I remember a famous politician once said: "It takes a village to raise a child" this politician was not wrong, It also takes a village, each with their determination to be the change they would like to see, in order to make a change for the better of the community.

BIOGRAPHY OF A MATCH DIRECTOR

think that Lincoln Rifle Club is somewhat unique in the wide variety of shooting disciplines and competitions that they offer. Indoor, outdoor, rifle, pistol, shotgun, rimfire and centerfire, traditional bullseye shooting as well as action shooting in the form of USPSA pistol matches and our own 3-Gun matches hosted by the Multi -Gun Division of Lincoln Rifle Club. I have participated in most of these but my preferred competition has always been 3-Gun.

I started shooting the Lincoln matches in 2006. I had retired from the Sacramento Sheriff's Department the year before and was still working part time as a firearms instructor. In the course of my law enforcement career I was a member of the pistol team, the SWAT team, the department rangemaster and a firearms instructor for both Basic Academy as well as Advanced Officer training. Based on this experience and success in other competitions, my confidence was pretty high going into my first match. It turns out that my confidence was misplaced. I didn't exactly embarrass myself but I wasn't kicking butt either. These guys could shoot!

Winning or not, this is some of the most fun you can have while shooting. Over the years we have had several different match directors and all have added their own individual flavor to the nature of the matches as well as different affiliations. We started out operating under our own set of rules that were probably closest to IDPA rules. Later affiliations included 3-Gun Nation, USPSA Multigun and UML. Today we are back to operating under our own in-house set of rules

as the Ormsby Action Range had not been created. We would shoot two stages, take a break and reset for the next two. Today's matches have five stages and a wider variety of targets. I took over as match director in August 2019 after the previous director had a falling out with the club. My goal was pretty simple: keep the matches entertaining, challenging and in light of my time as an instructor, educational. I think we succeeded.

In an effort to grow the matches we also created the MGD Q-Course to evaluate new shooter's eligibility for our matches. Safety is always paramount in this sport and we have not suffered any injuries due to competitor error. That being said, some of our targets create their own hazard in the form of ricochets or spalling. Steel targets tend to make bullets splatter and the flight of the little fragments is sometimes unpredictable. The usual result is a "stinger'.

Competition, even this type, is not combat. But they share a couple of elements; those being mental stress and the element of time pressure. Some people denigrate competition saying that "games" create habits that will get you killed. I would counter by saying that the "games" teach you skills that will keep you alive as long as you recognize the differences.

I'm moving to Tennessee. To borrow a line from the movie "Shooter", it's the patron state of shooting stuff. I'm sure I'll find new places to practice my skills but I will truly miss my fellow shooters and competitors here. Shoot safely and take a kid shooting.

He did a great deal of work and ran a challenging and complex match.

I have been shooting the 3 gun matches from approximately 2007 (at the time under Don Bradway). Since that time I have worked with 5 match directors and am on the MGD committee. I am honored to succeed such match directors as Jeff and Dan Robinson.

The August match, my first as match director, went smoothly despite the triple digit heat. We started early and finished before the real heat started. Being new to running the match I designed the stages simply which helped. Bay 3 which cannot be set up until the day of the match will now consist of a shooting drill (i.e. The Triple Nickel or The Mozambique Drill). They will be easier to set up, quicker to shoot and easier to break down. Let's hope the September 7th match is not so hot.

he Lincoln Rifle Club's Junior Precision Team is geared up and ready for the 2024 match season! In the coming weeks the kids will have the opportunity to compete against some of the best shooters the west has to offer. We'll be competing in matches all over Northern California for the next 7 weeks, including hosting a State Championship Match for the CRPA. So far this season we've shot the Best in the West for the CMP, a local 60 shot Small Bore match, and the American Legion Postal Match.

The American Legion Postal Match is shot in advancing stages, where the final 15 shooters are invited (all expenses paid) to shoot at the Olympic Training Center. With a total of 600 points available, the shooter must have shot a 575 to make the 2nd round and out of our 12 shooters, we had 3 make the cut for the 2nd round. Alex Watts shot a 580, Hypatia Shen shot a 581 and Logan Michael shot a whopping 597. If they make it to the 3rd round, they will have the opportunity to compete against the best junior shooters in the Country.

In addition to the American Legion, the kids are getting ready for the Junior Olympics. The qualifying matches are slated for February 11th and 18th, wherein
