How to Write Calaveras

- 1. Structure: Use simple rhymes (ABAB or AABB) and write in 4–12 lines, often in quatrains.
- 2. Tone: Be playful and satirical, highlighting quirks or traits.

 Personify death as witty and mischievous.
- 3. Subject: Tease death and celebrate the subject's traits in a lighthearted way, adding personal or cultural details.
- 4. Language: Use puns, clever wordplay, and references to traditions like marigolds or La Catrina.

Tips: Choose a subject, exaggerate their quirks, weave in death as a character, and finish with a twist. Writing calaveras is a fun way to embrace the humor in life and death—so keep it light and enjoy!
