PASTOR'S CORNER

Bread of Heaven, Bond of Earth A reflection on the Most Precious Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ

This Sunday, the Church invites us into the great mystery of the Eucharist, the very heart of our faith. The Solemnity of Corpus Christi calls us to remember that the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ are not mere symbols but a living reality—a sacred nourishment that sustains us not only in spirit, but as a people walking together on a journey of faith.

In today's Gospel, Jesus takes the small offerings of bread and fish, blesses them, and feeds a multitude. This miracle prefigures the Eucharist—where the simple elements of bread and wine become His Body and Blood, and through it, the Church is fed, united, and sent into the world.

Among many Native American cultures, including those of the Kumeyaay, Lakota, and Navajo, food is never taken for granted. It is often blessed before consumption, and the sharing of a meal becomes a communal act—something sacred, spiritual, and deeply tied to gratitude for the Creator's gifts.

Similarly, the Eucharist is our sacred meal—not just a personal devotion, but a communal act of thanksgiving and unity. The word "Eucharist" itself means thanksgiving. In Native traditions, the earth is not merely a resource—it is kin, a gift from the Creator to be honored and respected. When we approach the Eucharistic table, we are also invited to reclaim that reverence—for the Body of Christ, for one another, and for all creation.

The First Reading tells us of Melchizedek, priest and king, who offers bread and wine and blesses Abram. Like

Melchizedek, we are called to bless and offer—to take what we have received from God and return it with gratitude. In Native cultures, this exchange is deeply understood: everything is gift, and every gift carries responsibility—to care for others, to care for creation, and to care for the spirit within us.

In the Eucharist, we are reminded that God is not far from us. He is as close as the bread we break, as near as the cup we share. He meets us where we are—in the desert, in the village, in the sacred circle of community. Let us receive the Body of Christ with reverence, humility, and gratitude, and let it shape the way we live: in communion with God, one another, and the land entrusted to our care.

In the sacred act of Eucharist, heaven touches earth—and we are reminded that every place can be holy, every meal a moment of grace, every person a reflection of the Divine. May we walk in the footsteps of Christ, just as our Native ancestors walked in deep communion with the Great Spirit—reverent, grateful, and always aware that we are part of something larger, something sacred.
