PASTOR'S CORNER

The King Who Walks With
His People
The Solemnity of Christ the King

As we reach the final Sunday of the Church year, we are invited to look upon Christ our King—but not the kind of king the world expects. He does not sit on a throne of gold or surround himself with warriors. Instead, his throne is the cross, his crown is of thorns, and his power is shown not in force, but in love. Christ shows us that true leadership is not about domination—it is about sacrifice, compassion, and carrying the people.

In today's Gospel, Jesus hangs between two criminals. One mocks him, unable to see anything but weakness. But the other sees the truth: "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." And Jesus, even in his suffering, offers mercy: "Today you will be with me in paradise." This is the kind of King we have—a King whose greatest authority is forgiveness, a King who welcomes the broken and lifts up the suffering.

Our Native communities understand this kind of leadership. In Kumeyaay and neighboring traditions, a true leader was the one who walked with the people, protected the land, honored the ancestors, and strengthened the families. A real chief knew how to listen before speaking, how to heal before commanding, how to bring peace instead of fear. Christ is this kind of leader: steady, faithful, living close to His people.

His kingdom is not far away. It grows wherever reconciliation is chosen over revenge, wherever families come together, wherever healing begins, wherever we honor the Creator's gifts and care for one another. His kingdom rises like new dawn over the mountains—quiet, faithful, gentle, yet filled with power.

Here are some points of reflection as we end the liturgical year today:

Do I allow Christ to be the one who guides my path?

Do I let him bring peace into my home, my heart, my community?

My brothers and sisters, to follow Christ the King is to choose his way of healing, forgiveness, and courage. It is to stand with him even when the world misunderstands. It is to let his light shine in us so we can be peacemakers in our tribal families and protectors of the sacred land entrusted to us.

May Christ our King walk with us on these hills and valleys, bless our communities, and lead us into a new year of hope.

Christus vincit! Christus regnat! Christus imperat!
Christ conquers! Christ rules! Christ reigns!
