PASTOR'S DESK

The Divine Mercy of Jesus

This Sunday is popularly known as Divine Mercy Sunday. The popular devotion to Jesus, the Lord of the Divine Mercy, originated in Poland where, on February 22, 1931, Sr. Faustina Kowalska, now a saint, experienced a new and life-changing vision of Christ. Sr. Faustina saw Jesus Christ wearing a white robe and raising his right hand in blessing with his left hand resting on his heart from which flowed two rays of light.

Sr. Faustina chronicled her visions and wrote her reflections. She wrote in her diary: "On one occasion, I heard these words: 'My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day, the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of my mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day, all the divine floodgates through which graces flow are opened.'"

Saint John Paul II of Poland promoted the message of St. Faustina. During the celebration of the Great Jubilee in the year 2000, particularly at the Mass for the Canonization of St. Faustina Kowalska, Saint John Paul II proclaimed to the world that "from now on throughout the Church, this Sunday will be called Divine Mercy Sunday." In his encyclical on God's mercy "Rich in Mercy," which he wrote in 1980, the

Polish pope developed a scriptural and doctrinal basis for our faith in the mercy of God. He highlighted Jesus' teaching mission to the poor, the sick, the sinners, and the neglected as the foundation of the Christian doctrine on mercy.

He wrote "Especially through His lifestyle and through His actions, Jesus revealed that love is present in the world in which we live... This love makes itself particularly noticed in contact with suffering." He added: "The genuine face of mercy has to be ever revealed anew. In spite of many prejudices, mercy seems particularly necessary for our times."

Pope Francis, echoing the words of his predecessor, emphasized that the world today is still in great need of mercy. "God never tires of forgiving us," Pope Francis said. "It is us who get tired of asking for forgiveness." Indeed, we need the mercy and compassion of God so that we too may be merciful and compassionate to others. This is the message of the Lord of the Divine Mercy: Receive God's forgiveness that we may forgive others.

Today, as we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday, may we discover anew the mercy and compassion of God. In the sacrament of Reconciliation, God waits for us to return to him. Let his healing grace transform us into new persons so that we may be ready to transmit that forgiveness to others, especially to those who have wronged us. Our society will become a better one if only we realize how much God truly is merciful and compassionate towards us.
