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PASTOR'S CORNER

Choice of Good over Evil: The Joy of Eternal Life

A reflection on the 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time

I would like to share a beautiful story about heaven and the joy that we feel when we get there

There was once a Benedictine monk who was the tailor for his community. One day, this religious became very ill, and as he waited for the end, he said to his fellow Brothers, "Bring me my key to heaven!" The brothers looked at each other in bewilderment. They did not know what he meant. But the Brother only repeated his request, "Bring me my key to heaven." Finally, the other Brothers grasped what he meant. They brought him his needle. A smile of contentment brightened the old Brother's face as he held the needle in his hand. "With this needle I worked day after day," he said, gazing at the needle, "for the honor and glory of God. Now, as I leave the world, it is for me the key to heaven."

On this 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time, our readings tell us about how we can gain eternal life

In our first reading, King Solomon asked God for wisdom and right judgment before anything else: "Give your servant, therefore, an understanding heart to judge your people and to distinguish right from wrong." He became famous for his wisdom and the Book of Proverbs is attributed to him. Sadly, in the end he forgot that his wisdom was not his own but God's gift and he died having sown the seeds of destruction of his Kingdom. Nevertheless, his prayer remains the perfect request for a ruler and God was pleased with it.

The comparison of the Kingdom of Heaven with the net that collects all kinds of fish in the Gospel shows us the necessity of wisdom. We live in a sinful world. Even within our own hearts we are conscious of the struggle between good and evil. Sadly, it is evil which often gains the upper hand. The difference between right and wrong can be very blurred at times and we need much wisdom to discern the bad from the good. We have to try to overcome evil within ourselves and in the world while at the same time realizing that the task will not be accomplished in our lifetime. We need to leave room for the kingdom to grow until its fulfillment in the final judgment.

Wisdom requires risk taking also, as illustrated in the parables of the treasure hidden in the field and the pearl of great price. When we discern God's will, we need to be prepared to pay any price to follow it. This will often mean contradicting the wisdom of the world, as Jesus dramatically declares when he says that we might have to renounce even the closest family ties for his sake. To be wise in the Kingdom of God is not just to always follow the old ways of doing things. God can also surprise us with new challenges. In such a case, the wise person will take the risk and follow the new path shown to him by God. This is to be

"like the head of a household who brings from his storeroom both the new and the old." Cardinal Newman puts it well: To live is to change and to be perfect is to have changed often."
