### The Joy of Being God-Centered

A reflection on 18th Week in Ordinary Time

All three of our readings including the psalm on the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time point to the never-ending joy of being God-centered in our lives versus being materially and worldly centered.

Ecclesiastes (also known as *Qoheleth*) was probably written between 300 B.C. and 200 B.C. Solomon is often given as its author in keeping with a tradition that he is the source of Israel's wisdom. The sentence "Vanity of vanities. All is vanity!" is famous for its power to remind us that in comparison with the things of God, human endeavors are fleeting and insubstantial. (The word for "vanity" in Hebrew means "vapor," and thus the author of Ecclesiastes gives us a vivid picture of human activity as amounting to nothing so much as water vapor that rises into the air and is quickly dispersed.) The passage selected in the liturgy goes on to apply this view even to the legitimate wealth gained by hard work. Death normally forces one who has toiled legitimately to leave the results of his toil to someone else. possibly to one who has not toiled at all.

The responsorial psalm replies to this somber but very realistic view by giving another realistic view that is not somber: the presentation of God as the one who gives us salvation. That is to say, the really important reality which is beyond any human power to reach is given freely by God to those who are willing to accept it by listening to God's word.

In the second reading St. Paul urges us to keep our eyes on Christ, who enjoys authority with God in heaven. The life won by Christ is the only truly imperishable treasure available to us. But it is a treasure which can be thrown away by serious sin. The opposite of running a risk of losing this life by committing serious sin is to set our sight on Christ and attempt to model our lives on His virtues. The more we "put on" our new self (the image is of putting on a fresh set of clothes) by

working with God's help to acquire virtues exemplified in Christ, the more certain we are that we shall eventually join Christ in heaven for all eternity.

The passage from Luke's Gospel begins by taking up the theme introduced by Ecclesiastes in the first reading: unnecessary abundance of material goods is no final guarantee of possession of the riches which really matter. The parable of the rich fool illustrates how fleeting the possession of material riches can be. Our goal should be to make ourselves rich with the things which God considers to be riches

Once I see what the inspired word of God wishes to teach me, it is up to me to see how this teaching can be applied to my life. A certain amount of material possessions is necessary in life. But the search for such possessions can easily degenerate into a mindless quest for more and more and still more. This is a well-known fact that many people spend their lives looking for ever larger bank accounts, ever grander life styles, ever richer friends. The fact that they feel compelled to engage in this endless quest is itself an indication of how unsatisfactory such goals are. That which is not yet possessed always seems more desirable than what already is. The process is never-ending. The single-minded quest of subordinating everything to a search for Jesus Christ is the only really satisfying way to live a Christian life, and the more single-mindedly it is centered on Christ, the more content the Christian will be. Christ is endlessly fascinating, but only to those who experience the search for him in the way they live.

Think about. More to the point, pray about it.
