## **How Do You Satisfy the Hunger of your Fellowmen?**

### A reflection on the 18<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time

A child goes to his mother who is busy working on some papers at their home.

“Mom let’s play!” says the child.

“No son just play by yourself. Mommy is busy right now!”

“What are you doing?” asked the child.

“Well mommy is working!”

“Why are you working? The child once again asked.

“I am working on some papers for my job.

“Why are you working on some papers for your job?” the child innocently asked again.

“Well son so that you and I will have lots and lots of money.”

“Why you and I want money?”

The mother getting annoyed at this time said,

“So that we can buy something to eat. Look son, can you please leave me alone? I’m busy.”

The child just stared at his mother and said, “Mom, I’m not hungry.”

Perhaps there is some truth about the child saying to his mother that he is not hungry. But if we look closer to how the child responded, there is a deeper meaning to it—that he is implying of a hunger that is more than food to satisfy him---the hunger for attention or the love and affection that only the mother can give to her child.

In life, there are many kinds of hunger that we usually experience. The hunger for food is only one of them. There are many people who hunger for love---who hunger for justice---who hunger for peace and so on and so forth.

Our Gospel today refers to another kind of hunger that Jesus saw on the thousands of people who were listening to his words of wisdom and at the same time wanting to be healed. He said to his disciples, “Give them some food yourselves.” Although Jesus multiplied the loaves and the fish for the people, the disciples were the reason why Jesus did the miracle.

Yes, only 5 loaves and 2 fish, Jesus used his disciples composed of simple, powerless, and uneducated followers to satisfy the hunger of thousands of people by performing a miracle.

You and I are also being used by Jesus to satisfy the hunger of many people in this world. Just like Jesus’ disciples, it doesn’t matter who you are and what you are: simple or rich, educated or not, powerful or not, we all have a role to play in caring for one another, satisfying the hunger or needs of each and every one of us. In other words, we all have something to share in our world. As the Church saying goes, “In this world, there is no rich person who does not need anything nor a poor person who doesn’t have anything to share.”

All of us are “bread and fish” to one another.

What can you do to satisfy the hunger of your fellowmen? And that hunger can be in any form such as hunger for food, hunger for love, hunger for attention, hunger for care, hunger for self-satisfaction in your job or career and so many other ways.

The other types of hunger can come out during moments of least expected. We just must be more sensitive to other fellowmen. That is the essence of love our Heavenly Father just commanded us to have and that is to love one another.
