Who do you say that I am? A reflection on the 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time

I want to write something that, at first it may sound secular. I would like to explain a term that is common in the pharmaceutical world. I use this as an example because before I became a priest, everybody knows that I was a registered pharmacist. In my pharmaceutical practice in a drugstore before, I used to be challenged by patients/customers the real score between brand and generic names. And usually I tell them to get the generic drugs to help them save money. However, in spite of the costly price of the brand name of drugs which are either prescribed by their doctor or sold over the counter, they still preferred the brand names because in their experience, these are more of superior quality.

Brand Name is given by the maker to a product or range of products, especially a trademark. A generic drug is a medication created to be the same as an existing approved brand name drug in dosage form, safety, strength, route of administration, quality and performance characteristics. Take for example Tylenol versus Acetaminophen 500 mg tablets of 100 count. The former is about \$10.00 whereas the latter is 5 dollars cheaper. Customers still prefer the brand name because according to them, they are fast acting and very effective and therefore they are superior to its generic name.

Jesus asks his disciples in the gospel today: "Who do you say that I am?"

Jesus asks and Peter answers, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God!" Now where does Peter get this idea? Well, he gets it from being with Jesus all the time. Peter came to understand that all the things Jesus does such as healing, helping, forgiving, loving, teaching, living out life in a certain, specific way were all aspects put together on how he defined Jesus as the Son of God and the Messiah.

In the world of business today...specifically in the pharmaceutical world as I mentioned earlier.....we would say that Jesus has a brand image that we like just like his disciples. Think about it...when I say "Jesus" it triggers within each person a whole series of thoughts that contain within them the essence of how to live out a Christian way of life.

So how do we respond then when we are being asked who we are, what faith do we follow or whom do we follow? Well, we should proudly say, "As followers of Jesus, we follow a Christian way of living and we are Catholics!

However, what is more proper to say is, as a follower of Jesus, my life should reflect the same things that Jesus did...I need to be kind, loving, forgiving, patient, caring and generous to the poor and the outcast and fight for the marginalized. Most of all, sacrifice as Jesus sacrificed.

How can we attract people to join in our Church? Members of the Church should be living examples of faith and good followers of Christ. They should follow the commandments that God has given them, be respectful and loving and forgiving to one another, be compassionate and generous to the poor, the outcast and the marginalized. With all of these, they can attract many people to join the Church.

I am truly happy and proud of being a pastor at St. Kateri Tekakwitha Parish. Every time visitors come to any of our Churches in Barona, Viejas and Sycuan, they not only enjoy our Eucharistic Celebrations, but they also feel at home. Though our Churches are small, they provide an excellent atmosphere for praying and devotion. They say they will always come back because our Native American parishioners are "very accommodating, hospitable and always smiling" not to mention their greeting to anyone who

comes for the first time: "Thank you for joining us." Visitors are welcomed and relieved of all the stresses of the day or the week. The smallness of our Churches seems to provide a closer relationship to God and neighbor.
