Justice and Fairness: Do we practice it?

A reflection on the 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Any landowner will naturally expect a rightful share of the fruits of the land he/she rented out to tenants. But there are abusive tenants who do not only cheat the landowner, but also act as if they own the land themselves. On the other hand, there are landowners who deprive the tenants of their rightful share.

Worse, some landowners treat their tenants as their “properties.” Hence, the Gospel this 27th Sunday in Ordinary time conveys the theme of justice and fairness. Underlying this theme is a spiritual message that can be formulated into a question: have we been just and fair to God for all the blessings he has given us?

The old adage, “Don’t kill the goose that lays the golden egg,” reminds us of the value of the source of a treasure. The Gospel tells us that the source of our treasure is God and the faithfulness of his love, as symbolized by the

landowner. Despite being cheated and his servants maltreated, God sends more of his servants to demand his share of the harvest. Too often, we treasure the gift and forget the great Giver. We enjoy the blessings but miss out the Giver. But despite our unfaithfulness and ingratitude, blessings continue to flow. That limit is represented by the Son.

The last straw to God’s patience is the maltreatment of the Son. God will mete out punishments to whoever maltreats his Son, similar to putting to death those wretched men who killed the Son, and then re-channel his blessings to those more-worthy of them, like leasing out His vineyard to other tenants. The wrath of God’s punishment will be unimaginably horrible.

The Gospel therefore challenges us to return God’s faithfulness with our faithfulness to Jesus Christ, his Son. The blessings that we receive from him are means to strengthen our resolve to love Jesus Christ more. If in the olden times the cornerstone, who is Jesus Christ, was rejected by the builders, we in these modern times resolve to keep Jesus Christ as the cornerstone of our lives.
