PASTOR'S CORNER

LOVE is... A reflection on the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Love is a commandment. How can love be commanded? Isn't love something essentially spontaneous and free? Isn't love that wonderful feeling that makes the world go round? How can you order someone to have a feeling?

Jesus is not speaking of a love-feeling or a love-emotion. This is where the mass media is misleading us; they present love as basically a feeling, a romantic-feeling, or at most, a temporary attraction. In its pure essence, love is the steady, disciplined will to seek the good of another. It is a commitment even when the senses, feelings, and emotions dictate the opposite. Yes, it can even be accompanied by emotions of affection, tenderness and pleasure. But not always.

Love is the decision to use oneself for the good of the other. Invert it and end up using the other for your own good. People often say hatred is the opposite of love. The opposite of love rather is selfishness

In the Gospels, the verb "to love" is used 62 times, whereas the noun "love" is only used 9 times. As a verb therefore, it means that love is action, it expresses itself in deeds. Loving God is not only

uttering prayers to Him, but living a life according to His will. Loving your neighbor is actively treating him or her as you would like him or her to treat you.

Love is a decision of the will to keep on treating others well, even when you don't like the way they are treating you. That's why Jesus eventually gave a new commandment of love, "Love one another as I have loved you." The measure of loving is no longer how you love yourself, or how you want others to love you. It is how Jesus loved you. It is love that is not conditioned by others' behavior, not by his feelings and emotions, or senses. It is a love based on his will to love. This is the love that can do the impossible, life forgiving.

Learning to love as Jesus loves is not an easy task. It runs against our self-centered nature. That's why it takes a lifetime to learn it. As Mother Teresa said, "It is not what you do in life, but how much love you put into it that matters." For at the end of life, God will judge us according to the love that we gave (Mt. 25:49).
