PASTOR'S CORNER

Welcoming Christ with a Listening Heart A Reflection on the 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

In this Sunday's Gospel (Luke 10:38–42), we encounter a moment of deep hospitality. Jesus visits the home of two sisters, Martha and Mary. Martha busies herself with all the preparations, while Mary simply sits at the feet of Jesus, listening to his words. Martha, feeling burdened, asks Jesus to tell Mary to help. But Jesus gently responds, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her."

This Gospel invites us to consider the balance between doing and being—between service and contemplation. Both are important. But in the eyes of Jesus, it is the heart that listens, that pays attention to the sacred, that opens itself to the presence of God that takes first place.

For many Native peoples, including the Kumeyaay and other tribes across this land, listening is a sacred act. From a young age, children are taught to listen to elders, to the earth, to the wind and water. Wisdom is passed not through rushing and noise, but through silence, patience, and respect. In this way, Mary's listening heart reflects something profoundly familiar in Native spirituality—the understanding that the voice of the Creator often comes quietly, like a whisper in the wind or the rustle of oak leaves.

Martha's anxiety also mirrors some of the struggles many of our community's face. We are often pulled in many directions—by work, by responsibilities, by the weight of past injustices and present challenges. But Jesus reminds us today: "There is need of only one thing." That one thing is a heart attentive to the presence of God in our midst.

In the First Reading (Genesis 18:1–10), Abraham offers hospitality to three mysterious visitors. Without knowing it, he welcomes the presence of God. This story honors the ancient value of welcoming the stranger, of recognizing the sacred in every guest. How fitting this is for Native communities where hospitality is a deeply rooted tradition, and where visitors are treated with generosity and respect.

Let us not forget the teaching of Saint Paul in the Second Reading (Colossians 1:24–28): that Christ is within us—the hope of glory. Our listening, our hospitality, our presence—all become ways we allow that inner light to grow, to be shared, and to heal our communities.

May we, like Mary, sit at the feet of the Creator. May we, like Abraham, welcome the sacred into our lives. And may we, like Paul, carry the presence of Christ in all we do.

Let us pray:

Creator God,

open our hearts to listen as Mary did.

Teach us to welcome you

not just with our hands,

but with our spirits.

Help us to see your sacred presence in our daily lives.

in our land, and in one another.

Strengthen our communities with the peace

that comes from listening, learning, and loving. Inyaage Hagepey (Amen).
