PASTOR'S CORNER

All Souls Day

A Day of Sacred Remembrance A reflection on the Commemoration of All Faithful Departed

Dear brothers and sisters, this weekend we pause as a faith community to do something both human and holy: we remember. All Souls Day is a tender moment in the life of the Church when we pray for our beloved dead and entrust them to the mercy of God. Grief is a journey that has no timetable, but faith allows us to walk that journey with hope. Today we remember not with despair, but with love—because love is stronger than death.

There is a saying among many Indigenous people: "Those who have walked on before us are never far; they walk with us in memory and spirit." Today, as we commemorate All Souls Day, we enter a sacred time of remembrance—not only in our Christian faith but also in the deep tradition of honoring ancestors found in Native culture.

We gather with candles, photos, stories, tears, and prayers. We remember parents and grandparents, sons and daughters, friends and elders—those who shaped our lives and carried us in love. Some left us suddenly, others after long suffering. Some we still grieve deeply. But today's readings remind us: death does not end the story.

The Book of Wisdom comforts us: "The souls of the just are in the hands of God... they are at peace." These words remind us that even though we experience separation, those who have gone before us have not disappeared—they live now in God.

Psalm 23 echoes this same hope: even when we walk "through the valley of the shadow of death," we do not walk alone. Christ, our Good Shepherd, leads us toward healing, hope, and reunion.

In the Gospel, Jesus promises something powerful and personal:

"I shall not reject anyone who comes to me... and I will raise them up on the last day."

This is not poetry. This is a promise—a promise of eternal life, reunion, and resurrection.

Today is not just about sorrow; it is about love that death cannot destroy. Like a campfire that still glows long after the flames die, the love of those who have gone before us continues to warm our hearts. Their stories, their prayers, and their spirit stay alive in us.

So today, let us pray for them—and ask them to pray for us. We are still one family—earth and heaven together.

Eternal rest grant unto them O Lord, and Let perpetual light shine upon them.

May they rest in peace. AMEN.
