From the Pastor's Desk

The Love of Jesus A reflection on the 6th Sunday of Easter

Jesus says something similar to those words. In today's gospel, Jesus makes a startling announcement.

"If you love me, you will keep My Commandments."

First of all, the Jewish people did not recognize the Commandments as Jesus' Commandments. They believed that Yahweh, God Himself, had given the Commandments to Moses many centuries earlier. True, Jesus had preached that He was the Son of God but this was a direct reference to the fact that God was more than one person ... that Jesus and Yahweh were equal. I would imagine this statement was reported to the Scribes and the Pharisees and I would wager, it caused great anxiety among them.

Jesus, the miracle worker, was one thing but a direct reference to Himself as being on the same level as the Father was another.

However, it was just another incident that would later lead to Jesus' crucifixion because Jesus was assuming a different position among the people.

The other aspect of Jesus' statement was one that is common to all of us. He said, "If you love me" and then added a condition, "You will keep my commandments." It assumes that by one's expression of love to another, it indicates certain responsibilities. If a man says to a woman, or vice versa, "I love you" that is more than just idle chatter. It's not like saying, "Would you like to go to the movie with me."

If I love someone, that statement <u>presumes</u> <u>certain actions on my part.</u>

For example, a husband who loves his wife will show his affection toward her by sending long stemmed roses quite often, surprise her with little jewelry baubles and in general make her feel like she is a Queen (I know wives will love to hear this.)

But of course it goes without saying the wives will lavish their husbands with praise, will make

sure he's comfortable when he arrives home and will have a sumptuous meal prepared for him when he comes back (I know husbands will agree on this).

However, isn't it true that by saying the words, "I love you" it indicates that certain actions will follow. That husbands and wives and sons and daughters will not only say the words but their actions will indicate those words are meaningful. That's what love is.

So, when Jesus says, "IF YOU LOVE ME" He's not demanding our love but He presumes that we will obey the Commandments and will come to worship as we all do in the morning. Why would we use the word LOVE if it didn't mean anything?

His words apply to us as families. Mom and Dad love their children and they shower blessings upon them. They feed them, they house them, they clothe them, provide a good education for them and, in general protect them and make their lives as comfortable as possible. That's their responsibility. To say to your child "I love you" but continue it with the words, "you're on your own as far as any support from me" would be a contradiction. And if that would happen, the child has a right to question a parent's love.

But, by the same token, a child has the same responsibilities to a parent. That's also what Jesus says. Love is not just a word. Love is an indication of one's willingness to recognize one's responsibilities. And, therefore, children must recognize their responsibilities to their parents. If you would live in a fine house, partake of fine food your parents provide and accept your education it shows that you recognize the love your parents have for you. But you, in turn, must return that love be obeying them, by returning their love with visible signs that you appreciate them. Their wishes must be appreciated. Otherwise, you do not really love them.

And so, Jesus says to us today that His love is so great for all of us that we should keep His commandments. He is also saying that as we live our lives, we must have the same love for each other as we have for Him.
