PASTOR'S CORNER

The Prayer God Loves Most A reflection on the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time

A little boy once knelt beside his bed and prayed:

"Dear God, please make me a good boy... but if You can't, don't worry — I think my teacher already gave up!"

His mom smiled, but it is a prayer many of us could relate to. Sometimes, our prayers are half-honest and half-hopeful — but at least they are real! God listens more to the humble heart than to fancy words or long speeches.

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells the story of two men praying in the Temple — one a Pharisee, the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood tall and proud, listing all his good deeds as if reading out his spiritual résumé to God. The tax collector, on the other hand, stood at a distance, bowed his head, and whispered the simplest and most powerful prayer in Scripture:

"O God, be merciful to me, a sinner."

Jesus says it clearly — "the humble man went home justified."

This story reminds us that the prayer God loves most is not the one that sounds the most beautiful, but the one that comes from a humble and honest heart. God is not impressed by how much we know, but by how much we trust. He does not count our accomplishments, but our willingness to admit our need for Him.

In our community gatherings — whether at Barona, Viejas, or Sycuan — we are invited to come before the Creator not with pride, but

with gratitude. The humble heart makes room for grace. The proud heart leaves no space for God.

Let us then pray like the tax collector — not because we are worthless, but because we know we are loved despite our weakness. In that moment of humility, we find freedom, healing, and peace.

Here are some points of reflection for you on this 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time:

- When was the last time I prayed with complete honesty before God?
- Do I sometimes compare my faith journey to others instead of focusing on my own walk with God?
- How can humility make me more open to the Creator's love this week?

Let us pray:

Creator God,

You see the heart more than the words on our lips.

Teach us to pray with humility like the tax collector —

to bow before You not in shame, but in truth and love.

May our hearts be free from pride, and our spirits open to Your mercy.

Walk with our people at Barona, Viejas, and Sycuan.

and make our community a place of healing and grace.

Through Christ our Lord. Amen.
