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# Perseverance in Faith amid the Fires of Life

A reflection on the 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

As we come close to the end of the liturgical year, the readings turn our eyes toward the "end times." The tone may sound frightening — earthquakes, wars, persecutions — but

Jesus' words are not meant to sow fear. They are meant to plant *hope and endurance*.

In today's Gospel, Jesus foretells the destruction of the great Temple in Jerusalem. To the Jewish people, that Temple was the very center of their world — the sign of God's presence among them. But Jesus wants His disciples to see that no earthly structure, no human power, no nation or empire can last forever. What *does* last is faith — a steadfast trust in God that does not crumble even when the world shakes.

There's an old story about a blacksmith who struggled to understand why life was so hard even though he prayed daily. One day, a friend asked him, "Why does God let you go through so much trouble?"

The blacksmith smiled and pointed to the fire in his forge. "When I put a piece of iron in the fire, it's not to destroy it," he said. "The heat burns away the impurities. Then I hammer it into shape, cool it in water, and make it strong. That's what God does with us. The fire doesn't ruin the metal—it reveals its strength."

Faith is like that piece of iron — shaped and strengthened in the fire. Perseverance is not about never falling; it is about never giving up on the One who shapes us through life's challenges.

We all know what it is like to experience "earthquakes" in our lives — the loss of a loved one, the collapse of plans, the fear of what tomorrow may bring. Jesus never promised us a life without suffering. What he did promise is that we would never face it alone.

"By your perseverance, you will secure your lives." (Luke 21:19)

Perseverance — standing firm in faith — is not stubbornness; it is trust in motion. It is the quiet courage of a mother praying for her children, a grandfather who keeps serving others despite illness, or a young person choosing truth and kindness over popularity.

In his letter to the Thessalonians, St. Paul reminds us not to grow weary of doing good. The world often measures success by wealth, fame, or control, but Christ measures it by love, generosity, and fidelity. The smallest act of compassion — checking on an elder, volunteering at Mass, comforting someone in grief — builds something that endures far longer than any stone temple.

Here in our Native and parish communities — in Barona, Viejas, Sycuan — we know what it means to endure through generations. Our ancestors faced hardships, yet they held fast to faith, family, and community. They remind us that even when the fires of life seem to burn hot, the roots of faith run deeper.

May this Sunday's message strengthen us to keep building what lasts: our love for God, our service to others, and our hope in Christ's promise of new life.

### **Prayer**

Lord Jesus, when the world around us seems uncertain, help us to stand firm in faith.
When fear and hardship come, teach us to trust in your presence.
Give us strength to persevere in love, and hope that endures until the end.
Amen.
