PASTOR'S CORNER

The Living Temple of God

A reflection on the Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica

Today we celebrate not just a building of stone and marble, but the living faith of the Church—the Dedication of the Basilica of St. John Lateran, the cathedral of the Pope, the Bishop of Rome. Though it stands in Rome, this feast is celebrated by Catholics throughout the world because it symbolizes the unity of all believers with the successor of Peter.

St. John Lateran is called the “Mother and Head of all Churches,” reminding us that every parish—whether it’s a grand basilica or a humble mission chapel—is a reflection of the one Church built on the foundation of Christ himself.

In the first reading, the prophet Ezekiel envisions a river flowing from the temple, bringing life wherever it goes. Trees grow on its banks, and its waters make everything fresh again. This is a powerful image of God’s grace flowing from His dwelling—His Church—into the world.

When we gather as a community, we too become that flowing river. Our prayers, our acts of kindness, our forgiveness and compassion—these are the living waters that bring healing to our families, our reservations, our neighborhoods, and our nation.

St. Paul reminds us in the second reading that *“you are God’s building... the temple of God, and the Spirit of God dwells in you.”* This is a humbling and powerful truth: God’s presence no longer dwells in

stone sanctuaries alone but in each baptized soul. Wherever love is lived, wherever mercy triumphs, God’s temple is standing strong.

We are therefore called to keep our inner temple holy—not by perfection, but by openness to God’s Spirit. When our hearts are filled with faith, our community becomes truly alive and radiant.

In the Gospel, Jesus drives out the money changers and declares, *“Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up.”* He was speaking of the temple of His Body—foretelling His death and resurrection. Christ himself is the new and eternal temple, and through baptism, we become part of that risen Body.

So, this feast is not about walls and pillars; it’s about renewal. It invites us to ask:

Is my heart open as a place where God can dwell?

Do I make space for prayer, service, and forgiveness in my daily life?

Do I help others find the living water of God’s love?

Just as the Lateran Basilica stands as a mother church for all, our chapels and gathering places of Barona, Viejas and Sycuan are living signs of faith on this sacred Kumeyaay land. When we pray, sing, and serve together, we make this holy ground even more radiant with God’s presence. May we continue to build, not only with wood and stone, but with hearts united in love.
