PASTOR'S CORNER

"What Truly Lasts" Reflection on the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Peace and blessings to you on this Eighteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time.

Today's Gospel (Luke 12:13–21) tells the story of a man who stores up an abundance of wealth and comforts, only to learn that his life will be demanded of him that very night. Jesus uses this parable to warn us against becoming consumed with material possessions and worldly security. "Take care to guard against all greed," He says, "for though one may be rich, one's life does not consist of possessions."

This is a message we all need to hear, especially in our modern world where success is often measured by what we have rather than who we are. It is easy to be drawn into the belief that more money, more things, or more control over our future will bring us peace. But Jesus reminds us that life is fragile, and our hearts must be set not on earthly treasures but on what is eternal.

For many Native communities, including our own, we know that the true riches of life are found not in possessions but in relationships—our connection to one another, to our ancestors, to the land, and to the Creator. Our elders teach us that we come into this world with nothing and we leave with nothing except the love we have given and received, and the good we have done.

St. Paul, in the second reading (Colossians 3:1–5, 9–11), urges us to "seek what is above," to put aside old ways of selfishness and greed, and to live in the newness of life in Christ. This transformation begins with humility—a humble heart that recognizes everything we have is a gift, and everything we do should be an offering to the Creator.

Let us take time this week to reflect on what truly lasts. Are we growing rich in what matters

to God? Are we living in a way that honors the sacredness of life and the needs of others? Are we teaching our children and grandchildren not just how to make a living, but how to live with purpose, compassion, and gratitude?

May our hearts be filled with what cannot be taken away—faith, hope, and love—and may we walk gently on this earth, storing up treasures in heaven.

A Simple Prayer:

Creator of All, We come before you with humbled hearts, grateful for the wisdom of your Word and the sacred teachings passed down by our ancestors.

You remind us today through the words of Jesus that life is not measured by what we own, but by how we love, how we serve, and how we walk in harmony with you and all creation.

Forgive us, O Lord, for the times we have chased after things that do not last. Forgive us when we put our trust in wealth or status, instead of in you, who are the Source of all life.

Help us to live with open hands and generous hearts. Teach us to be rich in what matters to you—to cherish relationships, to protect the land, to honor our elders and care for the little ones.

May we seek what is above: the peace that flows like a river, the joy that springs from giving, the love that mirrors your own self-giving love.

Guide our steps this week. Let us live simply and walk gently upon the earth. Let us be known not for what we possess, but for how we pray, how we give, and how we love.

We ask this in the name of Jesus, the one who emptied himself so we might be filled with life everlasting.
