# How I Became a Divine Word Missionary

A reflection on the 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Since it is Mission Sunday, I might as well share with you my own story as to how I became a Divine Word Missionary. I am now celebrating my 25th Year Anniversary of my vows as a Divine Word Missionary. Here is an excerpt of the homily I delivered to my community when we celebrated our foundation of our Society on September 10.

As a young boy, I was deeply inspired by the SVD missionaries who came to manage our school in Laoag City, Ilocos Norte (Northern Philippines). Their friendly smiles, love, care, and constant encouragement for every student to study hard, along with their patience with mischievous boys like me, left a profound impression on our hearts. Moreover, their down-to-earth attitudes, such as Fr. Andrew Biller playing basketball in his white habit or Fr. Bernie Donaghey's wild laughter until he turned red, and their participation and support in our school programs showcasing the talents of young students like me, such as piano recitals, declamation, or oratorical contests, made the SVDs a joy during my elementary school years. That's why many of us dreamed of one day becoming like them.

Well, six of us from Laoag applied for the Minor Seminary in Christ the King in Quezon City. Unfortunately, my dream came to an abrupt end when my mother passed away, the first significant loss in my family. My father, not wanting me to be separated from the rest of the family, discouraged me from pursuing the priesthood.

Instead, I tried to follow in my father's footsteps as a General Practitioner and Surgeon. However, I ultimately found myself following my mother's path by studying Pharmacy at the University of the Philippines for five years. After passing the National Board Exams, ranked 4th in the country, I became a registered pharmacist and focused on Herbal Medicine.

After working as a Pharmacist for three years, I entered Medical School. However, after my Second Year, I realized that Medicine wasn't truly my calling. Furthermore, due to my associations while at the University of the Philippines, I became radicalized during a particularly tumultuous period in my country's history. My father intervened for my safety and sent me immediately to the U.S. My

brothers and superiors, please do not misunderstand me. I was still a young man at that time. I spent a few years in Hawaii and joined my sister in California to concentrate on my internship to become a registered pharmacist. I successfully passed the Foreign Pharmacy Licensure Examinations. It was during my internship that I realized there was a void deep within me and that God was still calling me to become a priest within the SVD Community. Despite my age, I thought there was still a chance I would be accepted for community life and priesthood. And indeed, I was, at the age of 38.

After completing my Philosophy at the Divine Word College in Iowa, God revealed his plan for me, and I knew that this direction in my life would continue until my death. The realization was so powerful that I sat and cried.

I thought that after becoming a priest, my vision would come to an end with the diagnosis of colorectal cancer. But God had other plans. He intended for me to continue serving Him—God planned for me to continue my ministry to the Native Americans of the Pala Reservation and subsequently my appointment as Pastor to the Barona, Viejas, and Sycuan Reservations of St. Kateri Tekakwitha Parish.

That is my story. Each and every one of us has our own unique story of how we were called to serve God as SVD Missionaries.

Every step of my life has prepared me for belonging to the SVD Community and for my current ministry with the Native Americans, the "KUMEYAAYS" of San Diego. Let me explain what I mean. You might think that the radicalization I mentioned was a coincidence, but it was actually part of God's design. My radicalization helped me to understand persecution, alienation, and suffering. It has enabled me to empathize more with the Native Americans, who were abused by both the government and the Catholic Church. Drawing on my earlier experiences, I was able to reconcile, offer counsel, and heal some of the wounds of the Native American people.

"Whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be the first among you will be the slave of all. For the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many."
