PASTOR'S CORNER

"I have come to bring fire to the earth." A reflection on the 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's Gospel, Jesus says, "I have come to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already blazing!"
These are not the quiet words we might expect from the Prince of Peace.
But His peace is not the absence of struggle—it is the deep harmony that comes from living in the Creator's truth, even when that truth challenges old ways and causes division.

Our **Native ancestors** understood that **fire is sacred**. Fire gives light in the darkness, warmth in the cold, and it cooks the food that sustains life. But fire also **purifies**. It clears away what is dead so that new life can grow. Jesus speaks of this same kind of fire—the **fire of the Holy Spirit**—that burns away sin, fear, and falsehood, and sets our hearts ablaze with love for God and one another.

Jeremiah, in the first reading, was thrown into a muddy pit for **speaking the truth** God gave him. He stood firm, even when others rejected him. In our own history, many of our people faced hardship when they chose to walk in the ways of Christ—sometimes even rejected by their own families. Yet they persevered, keeping their eyes fixed on the Creator's promise.

In our tradition, the fire in the center of the camp or the council circle is not just for light—it is the heart of the community. When we tend that fire, we keep our people strong. The fire of Christ is like that. It must be cared for and fed by prayer, by acts of mercy, and by the courage to stand for what is right.

This week, let us ask ourselves: Is the fire of faith burning in my heart, or has it grown dim? Am I willing to stand in the Creator's light, even if it brings challenges or division? May the Holy Spirit's fire keep us warm in love, strong in truth, and united in hope until we walk together into the eternal camp of heaven.
