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ARTIST STATEMENT

I am a multidisciplinary artist working across photography, sculpture, painting, ink, installation, video, sound, and poetry. Rooted in phenomenology, my practice explores how we experience the world—how perception, memory, and emotion shape the stories we tell ourselves and others. I examine the biases behind those stories and the shared truths that emerge when we strip away assumption.

Born in the UK to a Malaysian-Chinese mother and a Ugandan-South African father, I am drawn to cultural intersections and the complexities of identity, belonging, perception, and visibility. My work reflects this layered heritage and the fluid, often uncomfortable, spaces where meaning is negotiated.

Art, for me, is an active force—capable of shifting perspectives and dismantling barriers. I embrace imperfection as a method of truth-telling, allowing fractured forms, unfinished lines, and material tension to speak to the fragility of human experience.

Whether working in stoneware, ink, or immersive media, my process is intuitive and dialogic—led by concept and shaped by material. I seek to create work that confronts, connects, and resonates—emotionally and politically. Art as activism, art as witness, art as a site of transformation.

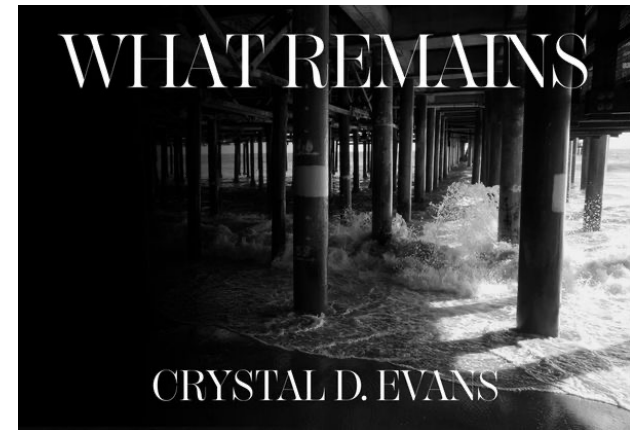

VISUAL DOCUMENTATION WHAT REMAINS PHOTO-POETRY

Before touring internationally in 2025, *What Remains* made its debut at the Herbert Read Gallery, UK, where Crystal D. Evans first garnered attention for her evocative black-and-white photography and sculpture paired with original poetry. Evans' previous experience, including a solo exhibition at COP29 and active involvement with The Arts Society, has contributed to the growing recognition of her work.

What Remains has resonated deeply with diverse audiences, sparking conversations on themes of identity, memory, and social change. The collection's emotional and intellectual depth, grounded in phenomenology and stoicism, continues to engage both critics and viewers, establishing Evans as a thoughtful voice in contemporary art.

LAYOUT

The exhibition layout is directly tied to Evans' published photography and poetry book, *What Remains*, and follows its thematic structure. Each section of the gallery is arranged according to the book's chapters, allowing viewers to move through a reflective journey of endurance, transition, and meaning.

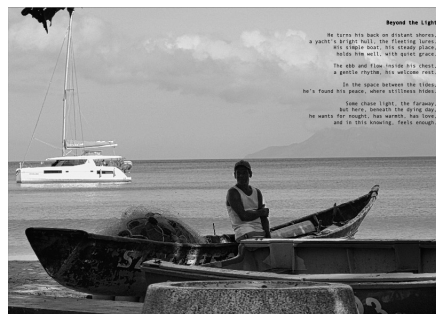
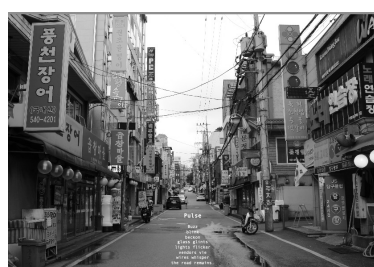

VISUAL DOCUMENTATION

VIDEO ART

Courage is a contemplative video art piece that weaves together visual storytelling and evocative original poetry, exploring the quiet resilience embedded in everyday life. Through layered imagery and meditative pacing, Evans captures moments of vulnerability, strength, and the collective spirit that arises in the face of adversity.

This piece invites viewers to immerse themselves in a rhythmic flow that challenges conventional notions of courage—shifting the focus from grand acts of heroism to the subtle, often unseen, endurance of the human spirit. In line with Evans' practice, *Courage* draws from phenomenology and stoicism, inviting contemplation on how we hold space for courage within ourselves and in shared spaces.

SCULPTURE

Evans' sculptural practice explores the intersections of identity, memory, and the human condition, using the tactile and enduring nature of stoneware to evoke a dialogue between permanence and impermanence.

Evans presents raw, unglazed surfaces to emphasise material honesty, allowing natural textures and imperfections to convey a sense of quiet resilience. Each piece embodies a meditation on time and transformation, inviting viewers to consider how form and matter coexist with narrative and meaning.

Evans' sculptures hold space for contemplation—evoking both the fragility and strength inherent in human experience.
