- A It's very broad. The names, address, contact information, donations, prior history with

- 6 interested in. It also differs depending on the
- 7 nature of the donor. If somebody gives a \$50
- 8 annual donation, that is recorded. If somebody is
- 9 a \$3 million a year donor to the ACLU, a different
- 10 level of information is reported in this system --11 recorded in the system.
- 12 Q If someone makes a donation on behalf 13 of another person or to be credited to another 14 person, how is that recorded by the ACLU?
- A It is recorded as -- it is recorded as 16 such, as relating to. But there's many different 17 ways that that could -- somebody could give on 18 behalf of somebody else. People could make a gift 19 in honor of somebody else. People could make a 20 gift in order to fill someone else's pledge.
- 21 People can make a gift, you know, a donor may help 22 bring another donor to the ACLU. All of that

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1 information is recorded in our systems.

- Can a donor earmark his or her donations for a particular purpose? 3
  - A Absolutely.
- O After Ms. Heard announced her donation 6 to the ACLU, what, specifically, did the ACLU do to document that donation?
- A Well, we sent out a note to Amber 9 thanking her for the donation. That is, likely, 10 the contribution acknowledgment letter that Mimi 11 is referring to, and that information is kept in 12 our files. And the information regarding 13 Ms. Heard was recorded in our Salesforce – or, at 13 14 the time, PIDI database.
- O At the time that ACLU sent Ms. Heard 16 the acknowledgment letter, was it the ACLU's 17 expectation that the \$3.5 million be paid by 18 Ms. Heard all at once, in a lump sum?
- A No. I do not believe it was. I 20 believe that we believed that it would - based on 21 the - based on the Elon Musk email, we thought 22 that it might be – that it was intended to be

1 over a ten-year period, although, that was never specifically confirmed.

- 3 Q Well, that's interesting. 4 What email are you referring to?
- 5 A I believe that the first email from Elon Musk to Anthony Romero said that it was over a ten-year period.
- 8 O Anything else to make the ACLU believe 9 that Ms. Heard was not paying the money right away 10 out of her divorce settlement with Mr. Depp?

Rather 16 than just sending a check, there's a -- some kind 17 of varying levels of commitment made to give 18 amounts over a period of time, which is, excuse 19 me, useful for the charity to know so that it can 20 make future projections as to income.
