The clues ranged from unlocking the screen of an iPad with a secret code, to solving a riddle that led to finding candles. This clue ended the game with a finale with Rabbi Kail lighting the official candle menorah with the team. They were then awarded the key to unlock the door and "escape" before the digital candle timer burned out. The teamwork demonstrated by those as young as 4 and as old as 17 was heartening.

Our event was then followed by a sing-along of various Chanukah songs, led by Rabbi Kail who played her guitar. We enjoyed a delicious breakfast and jelly donuts!

# From Our Rabbi:

Temple Or Elohim

# **Winter Air**

A small green spruce Struggles through gray brush, Near the shadow Of a winter-dead oak, And suns itself. While gently swaying To the air of God's love (Adam Fisher)

During this time of year, we spend an inordinate amount of time indoors, using heaters and draft-free windows to shield us from blistery winds and snowstorms. The middle of winter may seem like a peculiar time to celebrate Tu Bishvat, the birthday of the trees. And yet, we will celebrate this holiday from sundown on January 30<sup>th</sup> until sundown of January 31<sup>st</sup>. Unlike here, in the Land of Israel, the worst of the rainy winter season is coming to a close. Plants are beginning to struggle through heavy ceilings of soil and blossom on the other side. This is truly something to celebrate. Tu Bishvat is a day on which we can rejoice in this miracle by acknowledging the beauty of creation, eating fruits and nuts and planting seeds in anticipation of the spring.

Tu Bishvat was not always celebrated this way. It began as a day of delight in the full moon. Since Deuteronomy 14:22-23 teaches "Every year, you shall set aside a tenth part of the yield, so that you may learn to revere your God forever," as Israelites gathered their harvest, they gave 10% of their produce in order to support priests, their assistants (the Levites) and people who were poor. Hillel, a 1<sup>st</sup> century Rabbi, suggested that taxes be collected on Tu Bishvat, allowing everyone to celebrate in the beginning of the harvest and the miracles of nature. In this way, Tu Bishvat became the birthday of the trees. In the 16<sup>th</sup> century, Kabbalists created a Tu Bishvat seder, which many people follow today. While we no longer collect taxes on Tu Bishvat, the holiday remains alive as a celebration of a harvest, rejuvenation and life.

On January 30<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> and throughout the rest of this winter season, may we look beyond the bare trees on the horizon and open up our eyes to the miracles of creation happening just beneath the soil's surface—both in the Land of Israel and in our own backyards.



# Tidbits from Larry Jacobs:


This past July, Robert Kraft, owner of the New England Patriots led a group of 18 National Football League Hall of Famers and their wives on a week-long spiritual trip to Israel. Their first stop was to coach a mix of Jewish and Arab students playing football in Tel Aviv. The group visited typical tourist sites. Several players chose to be baptized in the Jordan River. The trip concluded with the dedication of the Kraft Family Sports Complex, a 6 million, 25 acre plot in Jerusalem that includes the first full sized American football field in Israel.

Four Jewish men were awarded the Nobel Prizes for 2017:

- Michael Rosbash, a 74 year old from Brandeis University. His father was a Cantor at a Reform Temple in Brookline, Massachusetts
- Rainer Weiss, an 85 year old professor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He worked on the same project as Barry Barish. Weiss was born in Berlin.
- Barry Barish, an 81 year old from the California Institute of Technology. Barish was born in the United States. He's the grandson of Polish immigrants.
- Richard Thaler, a 72 year old professor at the University of Chicago in the field of behavioral economics.

A scribbled note written by Albert Einstein in 1922 contained his theory of happiness. It read, "A quiet and modest life brings more joy than a pursuit of success bound with constant unrest." It sold for \$1.6 million at an auction in Israel. A second note written by Albert Einstein at the same time read, "Where there is a will, there is a way" sold for \$240,000.

Kabbalah is the most misunderstood part of our Jewish tradition. It is usually referred to as Jewish Mysticism. It was once under an ancient prohibition which restricted those who could learn it to only be men over the age of 40 who are married, fully observant and experts in every aspect of Judaism and Jewish Law. In the year 1540, the prohibition was lifted for the basic principles of Kabbalah. The Torah tells us how to practice Judaism...the Kabbalah tells us why.

### December 31- January 6 Shemot (Exodus 1:1-6:1)

A new Egyptian Pharaoh rose to power who did not remember the once positive relationship between the Hebrews and the Egyptians. Seeing Hebrews as a threat, he turned them into slaves and ordered them to drown male children in the Nile River. Somehow, a Levite woman was able to keep her son alive by placing him in a basket on the Nile. Pharaoh's daughter found Moses and decided to raise him in the palace as her own. As Moses grows up, he begins to wonder about his true identity. Feeling a connection to the Hebrew people, he kills an Egyptian on their behalf. He then flees for his life to Midian, where he settles down and had children. Years later God's calls to him out of a burning bush, insisting that he return to Egypt. After a substantial protest, he agrees.

### January 7-13 Vaera (Exodus 6:2-9:35)

God asks Moses and his brother Aaron to deliver the Hebrews from Egyptian bondage. After many years of slavery, the Hebrews aren't sure what to make of that promise. Moses and Aaron perform a miracle with a snake, and tell Pharaoh to let their people go. Again and again, Moses makes this plea. Each time Pharaoh fails to uphold his end of the bargain. This portion includes the first seven plagues.

#### January 14-20 Bo (Exodus 10:1-13:16)


The final three plagues rain down on Egypt, including locusts, and darkness. Before the final plague, God instructs Aaron and Moses about the Passover festival. God tells the people what to do to avoid being affected by the final and most gruesome plague yet: the death of the firstborn. After this plague, Pharaoh finally allows the Hebrews to leave Egypt. God repeats the commandments about Passover.

### January 21-27 Beshalach (Exodus 13:17-17:16)

The story of the Exodus from Egypt reaches its climax, as the Hebrews flee. Pharaoh changes his mind about letting the people go, and sends his army to retrieve them. The Hebrews come to the Sea of Reeds. Before them is a body of water too deep and long to cross. Behind them are Egyptian soldiers. They are trapped. Suddenly, the water begins to part and the Hebrews are able to pass through as if on dry land. The water then closes behind them so that the Egyptian army cannot follow. As the Israelites reach the other side, they joyously sing the words *Mi Chamocha* "Who is like you, O God?" God provides the Hebrews with food called Manna. When the people complain about water, Moses hits a rock with his rod and water gushes out.




