#### From Our Rabbi:

Purim is a curious holiday. It is based on the Book of Esther, which documents a dark time in the Jewish narrative. Motivated by a thirst for power and his own narcissism, Haman plots to annihilate the Jews. Worse still, he nearly succeeds when he earns the respect of King Achashverosh. Nonetheless, our Purim celebration is anything but solemn. Filled with costumes, Purim spiels, festive meals, carnivals and even alcohol (for some), Purim is often billed as the most fun holiday of the year.



Just as truth is foundation for good comedy, Jewish values are the foundation of our most joyous Purim celebrations.

The book of Esther teaches:

ָיָמֵי מִשָּׁתֵּה וְשִּׂמְחָה, וּמִשְׁלֹחַ מָנוֹת אִישׁ לְרֵעֲהוּ, וּמַתָּנוֹת לָאֵבְיֹנִים.

These are days for feasting and joy, an occasion for sending gifts (*Mishloach Manot*) to one another and presents (*matanot*) to people who are poor (*la'ev'yonim*).

Haman wished to destroy us, just as so many oppressors have in the past. Just as we overcome Haman by coming together as a community, on Purim we continue to strengthen our sense of community. Purim is our holiday of resilience. We celebrate together, hear the shared story of our people, offer one another gifts of food and provide for people in our community who are in need. We do this because of the Jewish teaching "All Jews are responsible for one another" and because if history has taught us anything it is that we are stronger together.

This year, Temple Or Elohim is proud to offer some exciting ways to celebrate the joy of Purim, while taking in its deeper meanings and lessons.

Beginning with community, you are encouraged to purchase mishloach manot baskets for friends and fellow congregants. A community of people who love food, there are few things that can bring us together more than packages of delicious treats.

Purim begins on the evening of February 28<sup>th</sup>. That night we will meet in the library at 7pm where I will do a short megillah reading and lead a class entitled "Where was God? A study into God's absence in the Book of Esther."

On Friday night, March 2<sup>nd</sup>, our Shabbat services will include a Purim spiel and a more complete reading of the Megillah.

In order to fulfill the mitzvah of caring for people who are in need, I encourage everyone to bring donations of food to the service. Instead of a grogger, bring a box of pasta. In addition to being a great noisemaker, it will make a wonderful contribution to Hatzilu's food bank.

On Sunday, March 11<sup>th</sup>, Temple Or Elohim will have what I'm sure will be another phenomenal Purim Carnival and 5<sup>th</sup> grade wax museum, filled with fun, festivity and food.


My family and I look forward to seeing you at some of the wonderful events and we wish you a joyous and meaningful Purim.

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

#### Torak Notes:

#### January 29-February 3 Yitro (Exodus 18:1-20:23)

The portion is named for Moses' father in law, Yitro (Jethro), who comes to the Israelite camp with Moses' wife Zipporah and their two sons. Yitro watches Moses working in his role as judge and convinces him to create a hierarchy of courts filled with many judges. The newly liberated Israelites walk through the desert until they arrive at Mount Sinai. They agree to God's law and prepare for God's holy instructions. On the third day of preparation, Moses begins to climb up Mt. Sinai. He receives the Ten Commandments, all of which appear in this Torah portion.

#### February 4-10 Mishpatim (Exodus 21:1-24:18)

Roughly translated as "laws" or "judgements" the Torah portion *Mishpatim* contains civil and criminal laws, as well as ritual-related provisions. The Torah discusses slavery, serfdom and injury law. Laws about theft, property, idolatry, false rumors and treatment of an enemy also appear in this text. There is particular focus on how we treat those most vulnerable in our society, which at that time included strangers, orphans and widows. Finally, the text turns to ritual matters such as Shabbat and the three festivals (Sukkot, Pesach and Shavuot). God then instructs Moses on how to approach Mount Sinai so that he can receive the Ten Commandments.

#### February 11-17 Terumah (Exodus 25:1-27:19)

God asks the Israelites to "make for Me a sanctuary so I may dwell amongst them." This portion contains a blueprint for construction of this Tabernacle. It discusses some important symbols that should appear in the tabernacle, including the menorah ark and altar. Complete with materials, dimensions and detailed instructions, this portion is any architect's delight.

#### February 18-24 Tetzaveh (Exodus 27:20-30:10). Shabbat Zachor

Moses receives instructions for kindling the sanctuary's eternal light, the *ner tamid*. This text is the origin for the eternal light that appears in most Jewish sanctuaries, including our own. Aaron and his sons are introduced as priests and the Israelites are asked to create for them sacred vestments to wear while performing their duties in and around the tabernacle. The priests are ordained through a ritual ceremony, that includes sacrifice.

<u>The Shabbat before Purim</u>: This week's Torah portion includes a maftir (Deuteronomy 25:17-19), that describes the brutality with which the Amalekites attacked the Israelites as they were leaving Egypt. Based on the Talmudic teaching that Haman descended from the Amalekites, we take this opportunity just before Purim to remember their attack. The Torah teaches "Do not forget."

#### Tidbits from Larry Jacobs

According to researchers at Israel's Ben Gurion University, waste produced by turkeys, chickens and other poultry could partially replace coal. The excrements could be converted to biofuels and replace 10 percent of coal used in generating electricity. Converting poultry waste to solid fuel is an environmentally superior alternative that reduces reliance on fossil fuels. The Poop Test showed 24 percent higher net energy generation than with coal alone and significantly reduced methane and ammonia emissions. Would there be enough poop to make a difference? 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
