From Our Rabbi:

We have tasted the *matzah* and sung rousing renditions of “*dayenu*” and “*chad gadya*”. We have read and symbolically relived the story of the Exodus at our Passover Seders. Physically we are free but our spiritual journey has just begun. We wander in the desert, searching for our path in an ocean of unmarked sand. We wonder if we will ever find our way. Then Moses tells us what we long to hear: in 49 days we will receive the Torah, the word of God that will guide us as we walk through the wilderness of our lives.



Each year, beginning on the second night of Passover, our count begins. In 49 days, we too will receive the Torah on the Sacred holiday of Shavuot—a day of Torah, of spiritual seeking, of prayer and of course coffee and cheesecake.

Each evening, beginning on March 31, we will offer a prayer as we count upwards towards Shavuot:

בְּרִיךְ אַתָּה יי אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קִדְּשָׁנוּ
בְּמִצְוֹתָיו, וְצִוָּנוּ עַל סְפִירַת הָעוֹמֵר:

Baruch Ata Adonai Eloheinu Melech Haolam asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu al s'firat haomer.

Blessed are You, Eternal our God, Ruler of the Universe, who has sanctified us with God's commandments and commanded us concerning the counting of the Omer.

Rabbis encourage us not just to count but to go on a spiritual journey. After all, we may not be slaves in Egypt but are we truly free? Who among us does not have inner obstacles that hinder us and hold us back from reaching our true potential or from living lives of Torah and of Mitzvot?

One way of participating in this journey is to study middot (values) during the seven-week period between Passover and Shavuot, so that when we celebrate Shavuot on May 19th and 20th, we will be prepared to receive the Torah once again.

I will be offering classes about two of these middot during this seven-week period. On Thursday, April 19th at 8:00pm, we will discuss “Responding to fear.” On April 26th, we will talk about “learning in order to do.” Light refreshments will be offered. You can find more information about the middot at <http://www.reformjudaism.org/study-48-middot>, which provides short texts, commentaries, questions and reflections. They are ideal for people of all ages and can be studied individually, with a partner, in a group or as a family.

I hope you join me on this spiritual journey. May it prove to be inspiring, profound and worthwhile. Happy counting!




Bagels & Torah:



On Saturday, March 10th, guest speaker Rabbi Schwartz led our Bagels & Torah class. He presented interesting facts about Albert Einstein as a Jewish leader.

Rabbi Schwartz explained that Einstein had a unique view of religion. Due to Einstein's scientific reasoning, he believed that there was a higher power than humans that regulated the universe. He did not attend synagogue or enjoy other congregational activities.

Einstein raised a significant amount of money for the building of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. He became a Zionist a cause to which he was willing to help until the end of his life. He thought that Arab-Israeli problems could be dealt with by concessions. This put him at odds with many other Zionist leaders.

He refused the position of head of Hebrew University. He said that he didn't need the accolades of colleagues. Einstein proposed that Hebrew University become a haven for the many Jewish scientists that were being ousted from their positions. Hebrew University hired many of the Jewish scientists who were fired from their jobs due to their religion throughout the world.

With the continuation of anti-Semitism and Nazi persecution, Einstein realized that Jews needed a homeland. He started to take pride in being a Jew, openly acknowledging his Judaism and openly participating in synagogue congregational events.

Einstein and his family immigrated to the United States just before World War II. He was warmly received by the scientific world and the Jews as our advocate. He was given a position at Princeton University – virtually unheard of for a Jew during this era. He was embraced by the Jewish world as our intellectual champion.

When Israel's first President, Weizmann died, Einstein was offered the presidency of Israel. He rejected the offer stating, once again, that he did not need his colleague's flatter.

At the time, American immigration policies required that most expatriate Jews applying for visas be sponsored by 2 American citizens. Einstein personally wrote hundreds of such sponsorship letters.

Einstein was most certainly a great Jewish leader.

Torah Notes:

April 1 - April 7 - the 8th day of Passover (Deuteronomy 15:19-16:17)

During this week of Passover there are many Torah portions. The week culminates on Shabbat with verses from Deuteronomy that discuss the Passover sacrifice and the laws of Passover. The Torah reminds us not to eat *chumetz* (leavened bread) during the seven days of Passover. (Although Passover is a seven day holiday, many Jews in the diaspora choose to celebrate it for 8 days). Since our ancestors did not have time to wait for their bread to rise, we eat scrumptious unleavened bread as they did during the exodus. Beginning on the second day of Passover, the Torah then instructs us to “count off seven weeks” between Passover and the holiday of Shavuot. Shavuot marks the beginning of the grain harvest. It is also the date on which we receive the Torah from God each year. This year Shavuot will take place on May 19-20th.

April 8 – April 14 - Shemini (Leviticus 9:1-11:47)

This portion is primarily concerned with the Temple sacrifices, laws for the Coheinim (the Priests) and dietary laws of the Jewish people. It contains a fascinating story of two young priests who enthusiastically offer a sacrifice to God. The Torah calls this sacrifice “strange fire,” to which God responds by taking their lives. Their names were Nadav and Avihu. Their father, Aaron, struggles to mourn for the loss of his two sons while meeting the needs of the greater community. The portion concludes with an in depth discussion on kashrut, including its laws and potential reasons for them.

April 15 – April 21 - Tazria-Metzora (Leviticus 12:1-15:33)

This week we enter a discussion about impurity, purity and skin disease. Without the medical knowledge that we are fortunate to possess today, our ancestors struggled to make sense of illness. In an effort to stop people from spreading disease, they created communities where people could go until their infections had dissipated. Although their medical advice doesn't stand up to modern standards, the priests' unwavering dedication to those infected can teach us all a great deal about the way in which we can support one another during times of illness and hardship.

April 22 – April 28 - Acharei-Mot/Kedoshim (Leviticus 16:1-20:27)

This week we turn to the heart of the Torah. Located in the middle of the middle book of the Torah, this portion includes the holiness code (Leviticus 19), that strives to teach us about the ways we can bring holiness into our world. It includes teachings such as “love your neighbor as yourself” the importance of respecting our elders, of taking care of strangers and of creating a fair and just society.

Tidbits from Larry Jacobs

I have to start with this, which is amazing and unbelievable. An Israeli company developed a paint called Solcold. It protects surfaces from fire, water and extreme temperature. So, what makes this a special paint? Solcold uses the sun's power to activate a sense that provides air conditioning without the use of electricity. The double layered coating absorbs the hot rays of the sun and emits that energy in the form of cold. The hotter the solar radiation, the more the coating cools down. It is a solution for intensely sunny climates. The materials used are 100% green and free of carbon emissions. The paint could decrease electricity consumption by up to 60% and is expected to last for 10 to 15 years before needing a new coat. **HARD TO BELIEVE.**

GOING BACK.....In 1693, Pope Clement XIII was born. He rules that there is no substance to the claim that Jews use blood in the preparation of their unleavened bread. In 1697, in Great Britain, a site was acquired for the first Ashkenazi Cemetery. In 1901, Yasha Heifetz was born in Russia. He died in 1987 – performer of worldwide acclaim for 82 years. He was asked once why so many Jews play the violin. He answered, “Because it's a lot easier to carry than the bass fiddle when you are being chased out of a country.”

The following tells a little more of the suffering of our people – In 1349 Strasbourg, France, a riot began after corn prices fell. The Jews were accused. The entire Jewish population of 2,000 were dragged to the cemetery and burned to death. Those who accepted Christianity were allowed to live. A new Council was elected which decreed that Jews could not return for 100 years. The Jewish people's property and possessions were divided amongst the population. Twenty years later, Jews were readmitted. The first recording of Jews settling in Florida was in 1763 in Pensacola. Less than a dozen individual Jews moved to Florida during the next few decades. By 1845, when Florida became the 27th state to join the union, there were no more than 100 Jews out of a population of 66,500 living there. David Levy Yulee, a Jew, was the first U.S. Senator from Florida.

Coca Cola was initially introduced, in 1886, at the fountain in Jacobs Pharmacy in Atlanta, Georgia. The establishment was owned by Dr. Joe Jacobs, who later became one of Atlanta's most prominent Jews. In 1894, Coca Cola was sold in bottles for the first time. In 1935, Coca Cola is certified as kosher and kosher for Passover. This was done through the efforts of Atlanta Rabbi Tobias Geffen.




